Sen. Hugh A. Butler, R., Neb., as "a cat's paw in a bit of journalistic ghost-writing" for Reader's Digest, the periodical in which Butler elaborated on charges that the administration had spent \$6,000,000,000 on a "boondoggling" program in South America.

Guffey suggested that it was "unfortunate he (Butler) was not aware of the extent to which the editors of Reader's Digest were abusing his trust and employing his personal prestige to foist on America and the world a mass of misinformation."

Says Apology Owed Butler made a tour of South America during the summer recess of congress.

Guffey said that the editors of the magazine owe an apology to Butler, "whom they have made to appear as an international fool," to the senate, the American people at large and the government and people of every friendly American nation.

"The senator's trip was, in fact, undertaken under the auspices of Reader's Digest," Guffey said. "He was accompanied on his trip by a Mr. Maurice K. Mumford, a member of the Reader's Digest research staff, as a rewrite man to put the senator's report into acceptable magazine form, the Reader's Digest utilized the service of Dr. Stanley High."

Guffey said he wouldn't guess as to the magazine's motive "or guess that the editor hopes by

overthrowing this administration to be relieved of part of his income tax, or that he may have decided to cultivate pro-Axis circulation for his Spanish edition in the Argentine."

Reader's Digest editors, Guffey said, supplied Butler with most of the figures used to support his claims that South American expenditures are in the neighborhood of \$6,000,000,000.

Some figures, Guffey contended, were juggled to misrepresent the facts and others were outright false.

Guffey sought to have his speech made a part of a senate document in which Butler's report to the senate will be published but Sen. Arthur H. Vandenberg, R., Mich., objected, declaring that Guffey's speech "violates the rules of the senate in many respects."

Butler walked into the senate chamber during Guffey's speech and sat through it silently. When Guffey concluded Butler announced that he did not intend to make a formal answer yet.

"The only thing I want to say now is that I don't even know some of the persons the senator mentioned," Butler said.

AMERICANS STILL TO BE BEST FED AND BEST CLOTHED AND HOUSED OF ALL.

Washington (U.P.)—The home front is going to find it tough going in the third year of the war, but it may not be as bad as had been anticipated.

It is pretty certain that the public will not receive any major home front bonanzas until the last bomb has exploded—in Europe, at least.

Nevertheless, authorities said, the American public will be the best fed, best clothed, best housed of any of the warring powers.

Here's how the civilian is likely to fare next year:

Consumer goods: The only commodities that positively will reappear are the two-way stretch, garters, suspenders and such elastic goods which now can be made of synthetic rubber. These will come around Easter time, under present plans. Hooks and eyes and zippers also are expected to make a return engagement.

Clothing and shoes will continue to fall short of civilian demand, but this will be due more to the manpower problem than to a prohibitive absence of supplies.

New radios will still be off the market and a resumption of production for mechanical refrigerators cannot be anticipated in the absence of the fractional-horse-power motor.

War Production Chairman Donald M. Nelson has promised that production of civilian goods will be permitted on an increasing scale—as fast as military requirements will permit the release of plants and materials.

But the civilian is reminded that production of civilian goods during wartime can never be anywhere near normal and that authorized resumption of production or stepped-up manufacture is mainly for the purpose of cushioning the expected deterioration.

Sharp increases in repair parts for essential machines will help to make life more comfortable for civilians who have been watching some of their treasured possessions wear out for two years.

Rationing: Considerable simplification of the entire rationing program will get underway with the inauguration of ration tokens in February. All food ration coupons will be assigned a flat 10-point value, with the plastic tokens being given as change for any purchase amounting to less than 10 points. Tokens will be good at any time.

With the exception of possibly a few processed food items which may be given zero point values as supplies increase, the ration charts probably will not be altered drastically. Fluctuat

Young Walker, who has been in the navy since February 2 of 1942, has seen action off the coast of North Africa, in the Aleutian Islands and in the Solomon Islands. He leaves Dec. 16 to report back to his ship.

GERMANS DRIVE AGAINST JUGOS

London, Dec. 8.—(U.P.)—The Germans have launched a large scale offensive against the Yugoslav liberation army of Marshal Josip Brozovich, bulwarking it with fresh reinforcements moved in from Greece, Albania, and Austria, a Yugoslav communique said today.

Jugoslav sources indicated that the Nazi command was throwing in all available strength to crush the partisans before the explosive Balkan situation erupts in another quarter.

The communique of the people's army of liberation said fighting was especially heavy in Bosnia and was concentrated in the Sarajevo sector and westward to the Adriatic.

POLICE NAB PAIR HOLDUP SUSPECTS; NO MONEY TAKEN

Albany, Ore., Dec. 8.—(U.P.)—City and county police nabbed two suspects today a short time after two pistol-packing amateurs took "no" for an answer in unsuccessful attempts to hold up two doctors here.

Henry W. Soso, 26, was picked up on the steps of the postoffice on a description provided by one of the would-be victims. Dr. G. L. Jordan, osteopath. That arrest was within an hour and a half of the second robbery and was made by City Policeman C. R. Chandler, who received the radio call while he was fueling his car at the rear of the city hall, half a block from the postoffice.

Second Arrest F. T. Friend, 26, was arrested a short time later when Jordan saw the man on the street while the osteopath was driving home to lunch. He encountered Deputy Sheriff Clay Kirk, who made the arrest.

The two men said they were from Walla Walla, Wash., but draft registration cards list them as from St. Helens, Ore.

The pair first threatened R. H. A. Leininger, dentist alone in his office, but left when he told them he had no money.

Going a few blocks down the street they entered Jordan's office. When Jordan entered the reception room, one of the robbers waved a pistol under Jordan's nose, then returned the gun to his pocket.

TRUCK EXPLOSION WRECKS BAKERY

Los Angeles, Dec. 8.—(U.P.)—Damage of \$100,000 was estimated today in a butane truck explosion and fire which last night demolished a bakery plant, hurled one man 40 feet across a street, and rocked the neighborhood for several blocks around.

Officials said the blast occurred when Lloyd Press, 35, Silverado, was discharging a tank of butane gas into underground tanks of the bakery.

Press was thrown across the street by the explosion and suffered third degree burns.

The bakery was closed down for the night and no one was believed in the building.

SABOTAGE RIFE IN OCCUPIED EUROPE

London, Dec. 8.—(U.P.)—A government spokesman said today that a well-organized sabotage campaign in occupied Europe had wrecked 196 railroad locomotives in the first seven months of this year.

Speaking for the ministry of economic warfare, he said a definite "freedom front" blow at German transportation had

been successfully carried out despite "ferocious reprisals." Germany has been forced to send at least 100 new locomotives into Yugoslavia where saboteurs destroyed 196 locomotives in the first seven months of this year, 138 in 1942, and 110 in 1941, according to definite information received from Balkan sources, the spokesman said.

MEDFORD SOLDIER TOPS WITH RIFLE

Pvt. Martin B. Webb, Jr., of Medford has the highest individual score during a recent five-day course in the M1 rifle at Camp Roberts, Calif., according to a report carried in the camp newspaper. The training was the first army range test for several companies of men at the camp. Pvt. Webb's score was 192 out of a possible 210.

Three other Medford men were in companies taking the test. Pvt. Roger Westerfield tallied a score of 185; Pvt. Harmon Peters and Pvt. Charles Vayne 180 each.
