Some Superphosphate Still Available

Nine cars of 20 percent superphosphate have been received and delivered to Jackson county farmers. Six more are on the road for January delivery. This phosphate is not all spoken for and any farmer signed up under the AAA program who has not placed an order should do so at once. This is probably the last lot of phosphate that will be received.

Milk Subsidy Payments Lack Applications.

Up to December 4, about one-half of the dairymen in Jackson county have received October milk subsidy payments. As payments for October deliveries of milk and butterfat were supposed to be stopped December 1, it would appear that Jackson county dairymen are not very keen about receiving this extra money or have neglected to file their claims.

November and December payments will be made in January, the two months will be combined.

As these payments amount to 5c per pound on butterfat delivered to processing plants and 45c per 100 pounds of whole milk delivered, it looks as though dairymen would do their utmost to collect these payments to offset the higher cost of feed and labor.

Pear Psylla Survey Shows None Here.

Results of the pear psylla survey made here this fall shows no psylla exist in the county. A similar survey in Hood River showed that county also to be free of the pest.

In conducting this survey a crew of men from the U.S.D.A. placed 2455 traps in 187 orchards scattered over the county. These traps were small yellow covered boards covered with a sticky material. All insects flying against these boards were stuck there. After about two weeks the boards were collected and examined for psylla. As no psylla were found in this rather

thorough survey, we can be reasonably sure it does not exist here.

FIFTH ARMY LISTS 12,518 CASUALTIES

Washington, Dec. 9—(UP)—Secretary of War Henry L. Stimson said today that American 5th army casualties in Italy not counting those suffered in the recent fighting "to gain the road to Rome," total 12,518 on the basis of the latest figures received here.

The total includes 1,929 killed, 7,209 wounded, and 3,780 missing. "Substantial casualties have

been suffered on both sides during the recent fighting to gain the road to Rome," Stimson added, "but complete estimates on these have not yet been received."

London, Dec. 9—(UP)—British Imperial army forces in Italy suffered 16,074 casualties from the start of the Italian invasion Sept. 3 to Nov. 23, a War Office announcement said today. The casualties included 3,212 killed, 8,709 wounded, and 3,153 missing.
