Finish the Job!

Wednesday, December 15, will be the deadline for the close of the Medford Community and War Chest campaign and, within the next five days, over \$5,000 must be raised to put the drive "over the top." Increased effort and added public generosity will be necessary during these few remaining days.

CHARITY begins at home but should not stop there, according to an old proverb. It does not stop there because the United War Fund and Medford Community Chest are now combined. But giving to this fund is NOT charity. Instead, it is the wartime job of every citizen. Our dollars contributed to this Chest fund will perform many jobs. They will maintain the morale of our own men, wherever they may fight. They will be used to help our allies—and to keep them in the fight. They will help the needy and sustain the fighting spirit of our own home front.

To fail in meeting this wartime responsibility is unthinkable. To fall short of our \$43,000 goal will mean curtailment of the urgently needed service of the Salvation Army, the Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Girls' Community club, Jackson County Public Health association and the Jackson County Recreation Committee. It will mean the shirking of our obligation to the U.S.O., United Seamen's Service, War Prisoners Aid and 14 other agencies extending urgently needed relief to our gallant allies.

PERHAPS this fact has not been thoroughly understood. This is 23 separate drives all rolled into one. Obviously, the contribution formerly given to the local Community Chest is not enough. It should be at least two and one-half times greater—and you won't be asked to give again in other drives during the ensuing year with one exception—the Red Cross. That campaign has been apart from Chest drives in past years and will continue on the same basis.

ALREADY 3200 firms and individuals have donated. This satisfactory number indicates that the size of contributions has not been enough to meet the bed-rock, carefully budgeted needs of all 23 organizations in this COMBINED Community and War Chest campaign. There is but one answer—Those who have overlooked their personal obligation to their community, their nation and their allies must give now—and generously. Those who have already given must, if at all possible, increase the size of their contribution.

MEMBERS of the 96th Infantry Division have assumed their share in a most liberal manner. This community is sincerely grateful. To other service men in this area, particularly those who live in Medford and enjoy the benefits of the six local Chest agencies, we offer a friendly reminder that their support is urgently needed.

SO, add up the gifts you would give to each of the six home Chest agencies and the seventeen war agencies. Then send a check covering the total now—today—to the Medford Community Chest and War Fund, care of either Medford bank, the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce or Copco. Let's wind up the job NOW!—H.G.

behind him — are laying the ground for it.

DON'T ask me to offer any reasonable accounting as to why this is so. Attacks on Byrd merely will furnish more water on his political wheel in the south. The southerners have no intention of surrendering, and will block all action of the Gulf feyites.

The charge that they are in an "unholy alliance" with Republican Joe Pew is only remote political banter. The basis of the Guffey charge is that the former Delaware Senator Townsend, as chairman of the republican senatorial campaign committee worked against the soldier bill.

Townsend is more DuPont than Pew and neither Rene Du Pont nor Pierre has co-operated closely with Pew. There is no evidence that they are in a working league on any subject and probably may be against each other on presidential candidates.

But to fight the democratic civil war all over again once or twice each year in the senate, without results, has enabled the northern democrats in the past to make special personal appeals to the voters of the liberal groups in their own communities (C. I. O. likes it). This strategem, however, seems to have outworn its effectiveness.

The same old farce, therefore, likely is to be played through again without change in the plot or ending, but with Mr. Guffey in a leading role that no one else seems to want.

WITH all the thousands of words of explanation offered for the casualties of the marines, suffered at Tarawa, it seems inconceivable that the whole story yet has been told. When nearly 4000 men go down

(1026 killed) in an action like that, involving less than a division, say perhaps 12,000 men, it is impossible to stifle popular inquisitiveness for further details.

All the official explanations have been published — namely that a wind shift piled landing barges offshore and forced men to swim under heavy Jap fire, and that resistance ashore was strong from cleverly placed Japanese positions. Yet some question must remain as to how the officers allowed the troops to get into such predicaments.

Did the Japs have prior knowledge? Did we know the strength of the Jap position as we should?

These and other questions probably will not be erased until final official reports are released from the war censorship ban.

HOSPITAL COUNCIL GIVEN REPORTS ON ACCOMPLISHMENT

Past accomplishments were reviewed and plans made for future projects at the bi-monthly meeting of the Red Cross Siskiyou Camp and Hospital Council held yesterday noon at Ehrhart's cafe in Medford and attended by 25 council members from Southern Oregon and northern California. Frank Van Dyke, Ashland, chairman, presided.

Reports were made by Gordon Green, chairman of the day room and sun room committee of the council; Mrs. Fred Rankin, executive secretary of the Jackson County chapter on Junior Red Cross activities; Leland A. Mentzer, vocational instructor at the senior high school here; Miss Josephine Ryan, assistant field director at the Camp White hospital; Frank Gray, Red Cross field director; Harry Ellis, assistant field director, Camp Tule

Lake; Mrs. L. G. Gentner, district president of Oregon Federated Garden clubs and by the chairman, Mr. Van Dyke.

Tule Camp Need Told
Reporting on the need for day room furnishings at Camp Tule Lake, Mr. Ellis stated that the situation was "desperate." He stated that the men at the camp had been on an alert basis since Nov. 4, that no leaves were granted and consequently the need for recreation facilities at the camp itself, recently enlarged, was critical. The council voted to take immediate steps to secure both furnishings and recreation material if possible and an effort will be made to have some of the furniture made in Grants Pass and Klamath Falls schools, as is done here.

Mr. Gray spoke concerning the isolated Coast Guard stations on the Oregon coast and stated these were in need of desks, chairs, or lumber to make them, washing machines, flat irons and fishing equipment. He added that these coast guardsmen are on a 24-hour on-and-off schedule which gives them much leisure time. Some athletic equipment has been provided.

Another report was to the effect that Siskiyou county residents had donated \$950 to the

Camp White sun room fund.

Students Help
Mr. Mentzer stated that high school students in vocational classes had finished 100 puzzles for distribution to hospitals and that 16 chairs for day rooms were now being made. Mrs. Gentner listed shrubs needed for landscaping the acres of grounds surrounding the Camp White Station Hospital and for replacements for other camp planting and described the program planned by the 14 federated clubs of southern Oregon for providing greenery arrangements for the hospital.

The council extended a vote of thanks to Charles Newland, treasurer, and Mrs. F. G. Hughes, secretary, for their council activities the past several months.
