COAST COLLEGES
NEAR FUSS OVER
ROSE BOWL CASH

Shall Schools Who Entered
No Grid Teams Share in
Profits?

San Francisco, Dec. 11.—(U.P.)—A behind-the-scenes battle over the forthcoming Rose Bowl profits looms here tomorrow when representatives of the 10 Pacific Coast Conference schools begin arriving for their annual winter meeting.

Although PCC rules officially prescribe the method of dividing the heavy cash from the annual Pasadena classic, this year finds the faculty men and graduate managers beset with the following problems:

1. The participants will be Southern California and Washington, two conference schools, a phenomenon brought about by telegraphic affirmation of the view that to bring out a team from another section of the country would be almost impossible.

2. Only four schools had teams on the field this fall—USC, Washington, California and UCLA. Should the six which gave up—Stanford, Oregon, Oregon State, Washington State, Montana and Idaho—receive their customary share of the receipts?

In the past, this share for each school has been about \$25,000, besides approximately \$100,000 collected by the eastern, southern or southwestern visitor, and the \$65,000 or so pocketed by the western representative. In addition, the Tournament of Roses committee retains around \$70,000, and this year, as last, a "substantial sum" will be turned over to a war charity.

Conference men always have been close-mouthed about what goes on in their business meetings, preferring to exude an outward attitude of good-fellowship and trust. But officials of the schools who carried on this season expressed dissatisfaction "off the record" with those who folded.

Discussions also will center around eligibility rules for next year and may go into the post-war problems of players who will return from the armed forces. It was not learned whether the PCC would follow the lead of the Southeastern Conference in petitioning the army to allow its trainees to play.

REQUEST HUNTERS

3 Other Lettermen Available
to Coach Grant—First
Loop Game on Jan. 7.

With only Dale Niedermeyer remaining of last year's regulars, plus three other lettermen, Medford high's basketball Tigers will start intensive daily drills Monday under the coaching of Les Grant, elevated Friday from his position as junior high mentor.

Gone from last season's starting five are Don Fawcett, Al Weil, Darrell Monteith and Herb Edwards. Around Niedermeyer, the lanky center, will be built a team that, on paper, looks inferior to Klamath Falls and Ashland and on a par with Grants Pass and Roseburg, the other Southern Oregon Conference members.

The squad, some 35 strong, has been working out the past 10 days under J. C. Tucker and Chuck Clay. In addition to the four returning monogram winners, a host of lads up from last year's junior high team and others from the sophomore quint of last season are making bids for varsity berths.

The Tigers' conference schedule opens January 7 and 8, with the Roseburg high Indians coming here for a two-game series. Each of the five conference teams will play the others four times, with Klamath Falls, last year's state champions, enjoying the pre-season favorites role. Ashland, with a veteran team, also looks strong.

Grant, who sent his charges through their paces for the first time yesterday afternoon, said he favored the fast break on offense and would probably teach a combination zone and man-for-man defense.

43 MAJOR LEAGUE
PLAYERS NOW IN
ARMED SERVICES

New York, Dec. 11.—(U.P.)—Forty-three major league players, including at least a dozen described as "irreplaceable" under present manpower stringencies, have gone into military service since the close of the baseball season and many more are slated to go soon, a poll of clubs indicated tonight.

Among top players in both leagues who have donned uniforms and who achieved the following 1943 records are:

Luke Appling, Chicago White Sox infielder and American league batting champion with an average of .328.

Dick Wakefield, Detroit outfielder, who led American league in hits with 200 and in doubles with 37. He also won wide acclaim as top rookie outfielder of the year.

Mickey Wittek, New York Giant infielder, who led the National league in singles with 173.

Hiram Bithorn, Chicago Cubs pitcher, who topped both circuits in shutouts with seven.

Harry Walker, St. Louis Cardinal outfielder who had the league's longest consecutive hitting streak, 29 games.

The St. Louis Cardinals, who already have lost five key men, are hardest hit and if Morton Cooper, the National league's leading pitcher, passes his induction physical exam Monday, their chances for repeating as pennant winners will be remote.
