HOG PRODUCTION TO DIP IN SPRING BUT NOT ENOUGH

Washington, Dec. 23—(U.P.)—The Agricultural Department reported today that hog production after reaching an all-time peak this year will decline by approximately 16 per cent next spring, four per cent less than the reduction requested by the War Food Administration. The tendency to reduce hog numbers began last fall when farmers increased pig numbers by only 12 per cent over the fall of 1942, after having reported last June that they planned a 25 per cent increase in the fall. Farmers last fall saved 47,831,000 pigs, 10 per cent more than in 1942, the previous record, and 73 per cent more than the 1932-41 average.

The Agricultural department said reports from farmers showed that the number of hogs six months or more old on December 1 was greatly in excess of the number on that date in any previous year.

If farmers follow indicated spring intentions they will raise approximately 5,000,000 fewer hogs next spring than they did last.
