Wall Street

New York, Dec. 27—(UP)—Threat of a railroad strike on December 30 and a partial walkout of steel workers which brought steel operations down 18 per cent from the recent pace slowed operations on the stock market today. Prices were highly irregular. Railroad shares generally were lower, although volume was small. Losses ranged to more than a point in Norfolk and Western. Santa Fe was down nearly a point. Rail equipments moved narrowly.

Steel shares were narrowly irregular and quiet, despite a drop in operations to 81.3 per cent of capacity, against 83.0 last week and 99.3 per cent the week before.
