

GAS SUPPLY FOR FARM LABORERS WORKS OUT WELL

Mayfield's Report to Rationing Board Shows 12,732 Gallons Used in Harvest

Stating that the plan worked out by the local ration board last summer for supplying farm laborers with gasoline through the Jackson County Emergency Farm Labor committee had been "instrumental in getting the county food crops harvested without loss," Leonard B. Mayfield has rendered a report to the ration board on the gasoline used. Under the plan, worked out to relieve workers of the necessity of dealing directly with the board, supplies of emergency stamps were issued the farm labor committee and these were in turn issued to growers for their crew members.

Mr. Mayfield, in charge of the committee's office last summer, reported a total of 12,732 gallons of gasoline used by the various grower-distributors. The stamps were issued at the rate of one gallon for 15 miles of travel to and from orchards or other farm work, and were issued to the individual workers in four-gallon lots.

EUGENE MAY BE 'OUT OF BOUNDS' FOR ADAIR MEN

Military Authorities Say City Should Place Sex Delinquency Under Control.

Eugene, Dec. 29 — Military authorities from Camp Adair are threatening to classify Eugene "out of bounds" for soldiers from the neighboring army cantonment unless the city can place under control juvenile sex delinquency and provide adequate wholesome recreation for the visiting army men. Camp Adair medical officers have revealed that venereal infection originating in the Eugene area for the month of October was equal to that originating from both the Salem and Portland areas.

At the request of army officials Mayor Elisha Large has called a meeting of police, health and other city officials here this afternoon in an effort to find some solution to the problem. The army officers agreed that Eugene has little commercial prostitution, indicating the lax situation is attributed directly to teen-age girls of the city. One officer said that he would place the ages of the girls at between 16 and 25, with the majority falling in the 18-20 group. Army officials said that Eugene is popular with soldiers on leave, but they question the amount of wholesome recreational facilities offered the visiting soldiers.

Police Chief Carl Bergman, who said there was little known commercial prostitution in Eugene, said his department can do little to remedy the conditions without the co-operation of the parents of the teen-aged girls. He said the 10 p. m. curfew was enforced for all youngsters under 18. Lane County Judge Clinton Hurd also blamed parents for the condition and placed the offenders in the 12-13-year-old class. He also reminded there are always a certain number of soldiers who are not seeking wholesome recreation.

Officials were agreed that the problem is not associated with the University of Oregon campus and that the records of the ASTU men on the campus are far superior to the Camp Adair records.

TABLE ROCK CATTLE BASIS OF COMPLAINT

MEAT POINTS TO KEEP LOW VALUE

Washington, Dec. 28. — (U.P.) — Low December ration point values on meat will be retained through January, due to relatively large civilian supplies of meat, the Office of Price Administration announced today.

January point values on cheese and other brown-stamp foods will also be the same, the OPA said, with butter listed again at 18 points per pound.

The only changes on meat involve fresh hams, raised one point for January to eliminate the present differential in fresh and smoked hams, and sliced dried beef and beef tongue and sliced beef tongue will be reduced two points to six points per pound. Unsliced beef tongue will be at three points, down one. Point values for all other brown stamp foods remain the same.

ORTONA CAPTURED BY BRITISH AFTER BITTER STRUGGLE

Allied Headquarters, Algiers, Dec. 29. — (U.P.) — The British Eighth army has captured the bitterly contested Adriatic port of Ortona and the Apennine transport junction of Castel di Sangro, keystones of the German defense line, in violent fighting all across Italy, it was announced today.

Fighting flared up in all key sectors between the Tyrrhenian and the Adriatic seas. Eighth army blows at both ends of its front rolled up the German wing along the Adriatic and unhinged the Nazi positions in central Italy, while on the Fifth army front French Moroccan troops captured commanding heights and the British beat off sharp German attacks near the mouth of the Garigliano river.

Philadelphia, Dec. 29 — (U.P.) — Robert Kendall McConaughy, Dayton, Ohio, lawyer, was sworn in today as a member of the Securities and Exchange commission. McConaughy succeeded Edmund Burke, who resigned to return to private law practice.
