JEEPS DESTROYED IN FORT DOUGLAS FIRE

Salt Lake City, Dec. 29—(UP) Fire swept through two shops in the Salt Lake area early today and last night, destroying one building, seriously damaging another and causing several thousand dollars damage.

Fifteen to 20 jeeps, trucks and other vehicles and various pieces of shop equipment were burned in a blaze that destroyed a frame unit of the 9th service command ordnance shops at Fort Douglas.

Another fire roared through the Utah Welders Inc. shops early this morning, causing an estimated \$1,500 damage.
