WELCH LASHES AT
PREVAILING 3-1
ODDS ON HUSKIES

Trojan Coach in Perfect
Spot, Claims Washington
Boss—Both Bemoan Rain

Pasadena, Cal., Dec. 30.—(U.P.)—Ralph (Pest) Welch, coach of the University of Washington Huskies, today blasted at the prevailing 3-1 odds favoring his Rose Bowl team over University of Southern California in their New Year's day game.

"That Jeff Cravath of the Trojans has himself in the perfect spot and me in a terrible fix. As the situation stands now, if the Trojans lose by a close score it'll be a moral victory.

"If they beat us, Cravath will be a hero and a miracle man," Welch protested.

The husky Welch, himself a former all-American football player, drove his team through a steaming workout yesterday on the soggy Brookside park turf and spent most of the session pounding on the juggernaut end run plays which the Huskies use so effectively.

Those wing smashes are perhaps the biggest fear in Cravath's worried life. At the start of the season when he had all-American Ralph Heywood and rugged Joe MacPhail at the end spots he wouldn't have feared a parade of steamrollers.

Green Ends
But the two stellar ends were lost to the marines, leaving their positions to the less experienced Gordon Gray and Jim Callanan.

Welch, the amateur sleight of hand artist who carries his magic to the football field, without a doubt is clamping his running attack around husky Sam Robinson who has left the local experts gasping at watching him in practice sessions.

Robinson and the rest of his teammates are in perfect shape and have been galloping through spirited workouts and crying for more work.

In Los Angeles, Cravath drilled his charges on smoother ball-handling from his "T" formation and announced he would stick to his original lineup. In between plays he moaned loudly about the wet weather and indicated his tricky attack would suffer seriously on a slow field.

In that respect Welch matched him in the groaning department. This was somewhat of a surprise inasmuch as it had been figured the Huskies are familiar with wet weather and stick mostly to a ground attack anyway.

The Huskies were to try out their cleats again on the Rose Bowl grass in a late workout today.

Claim Poison-Pen Letters
Caused Fight Cancellation

New York, Dec. 30.—(U.P.)—Poisoned-pen letters from envious light managers to the navy department caused the last-minute cancellation of last night's middleweight bout between Coast Guardsman George Kochan and Jake Lamotta, according to Tex Sullivan, Kochan's pilot.

The scheduled 10-round scrap was called off at 8:30 p. m., but thousands of fans—unaware of the cancellation—went to Madison Square Garden, only to find the punch emporium closed.

Promoter Mike Jacobs announced "no fight" after receiving a telegram from the chief of naval personnel at Washington. It read: "Regret participation of George Kochan, machinist's mate second class, U. S. N., in a boxing match at Madison Square Garden can not be authorized."

Kochan, who has had 35 professional fights during his two years in the coast guard, was ordered by the navy on Tuesday to withdraw from the match, according to Sullivan, and was transferred from a fireboat in the New York area to a downtown barracks on the Hudson river. Sullivan, confident that the difficulty could be "straightened out," hurried to Washington, but accomplished nothing there. He informed Jacobs of the situation Tuesday night. All day yesterday, Jacobs tried "straightening out" maneuvers, but likewise failed.

It seems that the navy department remembered its ruling of June 18, 1942, which prohibits navy teams or athletes from competing in commercially sponsored games or matches. This ruling has been enforced against Champions Gus Lesnevich, Tony Zale and Fred Cochrane, but not against lesser-name fighters.

"And it wouldn't have been enforced against Kochan," declared Sullivan, "if certain envious boxing managers of the navy hadn't written nasty letters to the navy department—letters complaining about his being allowed to fight at the Garden. Funny they never wrote in until he got his first chance at a Garden main event. I tried to get their names from the navy department, but was informed that those letters are in a confidential file."

2 HUSKY LINEMEN
ILL WITH COLDS

Pasadena, Cal., Dec. 30.—(U.P.)—Two heavyweights from the Washington line, Don Deeks, 255-pound tackle and Gordon Berlin, 205-pound center, were incapacitated with colds today by Coach Ralph Welch said he expected them to be ready for the Rose Bowl game with southern California here Saturday.

Welch put the squad through a secret drill yesterday and said that the team would be in bad shape if any key players were injured because of a lack of reserve strength.

On their Los Angeles campus, the southern California squad finished its heavy drilling with a vigorous dummy scrimmage.

GIL DODDS NAMED
WINNER SULLIVAN
MEMORIAL TROPHY

American Mile King Gets
Award For Willingness to
Compete Against Hagg.

New York, Dec. 30.—(U.P.)—Gilbert H. Dodds, the Boston theological student who is America's indoor mile king, was named today to receive the James E. Sullivan memorial trophy awarded annually to the nation's outstanding amateur athlete.

Galloping Gil, the national AAU 1,500-meter champion, was chosen as "the man who has done the most during 1943 to advance the cause of sportsmanship." He received 860 votes in a nationwide poll to lead seven other candidates for the honor.

The other candidates and their votes were: Bill Smith, Hawaiian swimming star, 469; Joseph Platak, Chicago handball champion, 425; William Hulise New York A. C. miler, 383; Ann Curtis, San Francisco swimmer, 283; Bill Watson, Detroit track star, 174; Mary Winslow, Nashville, Tenn., basketball player, 116; and Ken Sailors, University of Wyoming basketball player, 106 votes.

10th Track Man
The chunky, bespectacled Dodds was the 10th track man to win the award in its 14-year history. Twice it has been awarded to golfers, once to an oarsman and the other time to a tennis player.

Chief reason for his selection was the thundering theologian's willingness to compete against Gunder Hagg when the flying Swede came to America last summer. Dodds pressed him in every race in a cross-country tour that netted \$135,000 for the Army Air Forces Aid society. He never defeated the smorgasbord special, but he provided most of the competition and once ran a 4:06.1 mile, the fastest of his career and the second speediest ever turned in by an American.

One of the most coveted awards in amateur athletics, the Sullivan trophy previously has been won by Bobby Jones, golf, 1930; Barney Berlinger, track, 1931; Jim Bausch, track, 1932; Glenn Cunningham, track, 1933; Bill Bonthron, track, 1934; Law son Little, golf, 1935; Glenn Morris, track, 1936; Don Budge, tennis, 1937; Don Lash, track, 1938; Joe Burk, rowing, 1939; Greg Rice, track, 1940; Leslie MacMittell, track, 1941; and Cornelius Warmerdam, track, 1942.

TRACK FOR LIFE

Baltimore, Mr., Dec. 30.—(U.P.)—Jockey Matthew Quinn was ruled off the turf for life by the Maryland Racing commission today for allegedly attempting to bribe another jockey to "pull a horse" at the Marlboro meeting Nov. 27.

The 22-year-old Quinn, a native of Plankinton, Ida., was accused of offering Apprentice Jockey Joseph Pannell a \$150 bribe to pull White Sea. Pannell rode the horse to victory and later was killed in a three-horse spill at Charlestown, W. Va.

POINTS JUGGLED
ON MANY FOODS
EFFECTIVE JAN. 2

Snap Beans, Most Frozen
Vegetables Made Point
Free, Peas, Tomatoes Cut

Washington, Dec. 30.—(U.P.)—The Office of Price administration today made canned snap beans and most frozen vegetables—except frozen corn, peas and lima beans—point free for January. It sharply reduced point values of canned peas and tomatoes.

Jams, preserves and non-citrus marmalades, however, were raised from six to eight points a pound. Frozen fruits—with the exception of blueberries and huckleberries—and frozen fruit juices were made point free.

Effective Sunday
The new point values become effective Sunday.

Explaining the vegetable reductions, rationing officials said: "Supplies of canned green, or wax, beans are at a fairly high level and the production outlook indicates supplies will continue to be satisfactory. Reduction in the point value of canned peas and tomatoes is possible since consumer demand has declined more than 10 percent in the past two months. Stocks of both of these commodities compare favorably with those of last year."

The new zero value for canned green beans compares with a five-point value for a No. 2 can in December.

Canned peas were reduced from 18 to 15 points for the popular No. 2 can with other sizes reduced proportionately. The No. 2½ can of tomatoes which has had a ration value of 21 points was reduced to 15 points.

These three items make up about 25 percent of all rationed processed foods.

Storage Glutted
Cuts in frozen vegetables reflect not only adequate supplies at present but also the necessity of clearing cold storage space so that the heavy slaughter of meat can be absorbed, it was explained.

Frozen vegetables which will have a zero point value had values in December ranging from 12 points a pound for spinach down to two points a pound for beets and carrots. Frozen corn, peas and lima beans retain their December values.

In ordering increases for jams, preserves and marmalades, officials explained that sales have been exceeding available supplies under the point values given two months ago when the sweet spreads were put under rationing.

At the same time, the OPA ordered that all fruit spreads ordered at 3½ ounces, except citrus marmalades and those packed for Christmas packages be returned to rationing next Sunday, Jan. 9, all sizes of spreads will be placed under rationing again.

Loosen Control On
Civilian Flights

Washington, Dec. 30.—(U.P.)—The Civil Aeronautics Administration today announced that civilian fliers no longer will be required to get clearance for flights outside of vital defense areas.

Recording by airport authorities of takeoffs and landings will be considered sufficient protection, Administrator Charles I. Stanton explained, since all aircraft owners and pilots have now been investigated for loyalty by the CAA.

There are a few areas where hay and roughage are insufficient, but they are limited and not terribly dangerous. And that brings us to grains. The trouble over grains has been one of price, transportation and marketing.
