MOST GRADUATES HEAD EARLY FOR SERVICE OR WORK

An unusual number of Medford senior high school students will spend this summer working in industries vital to the war. Many have already secured jobs. Approximately five per cent of the boys have gone to Portland to work in the shipyards. The majority, however, will work in the orchards and other industries here.

The feminine students will keep busy until the fruit season begins by working in local stores, at home and otherwise helping to relieve the shortage and give many regular employees relief, so that they may have vacations. Of the graduating seniors, many of the boys either have entered or will soon enter some branch of the service. These boys go well prepared, having the backing of pre-induction courses given at Medford high last year.

Many of the girls are working this summer to help their parents finance their college education, while a few are preparing for induction in the Cadet nurses' program or other branches of the women's auxiliary services.

According to L. B. Mayfield, principal of Medford senior high school, this juvenile aid will relieve the tight labor shortage a great deal. Mr. Mayfield urges all students to secure jobs in some vital industry, and, thereby, lend their part to "winning the war."

ESTIMATE 6,000 AIRPORTS NEEDED TO SERVE FUTURE

Washington—U.S. Civil Aeronautics Administrator Charles I. Stanton, in an article in the May issue of "Domestic Commerce," urged comprehensive national and local planning for construction of the thousands of new airports needed to accommodate expected air travel after the war.

He estimated that about 6,000 airports—twice the present number—will be required to serve the airways of the immediate future and said these must be developed according to an overall plan if traffic tangles are to be avoided.

He said communities all over the country are drafting plans for super air terminals intended to make their particular locality the "aviation center of the nation."

Warning against the waste and confusion which might arise from such large-scale, haphazard development, he said the problem was not so much one of over-building as the danger of hasty construction "without adequate attention to overall planning."

He pointed out, for example, the traffic complications which might arise even in the case of a single community spotting half-a-dozen or more airfields, necessary in any large city providing facilities for private and commercial postwar traffic.

Airlines are already blueprinting vast peacetime expansion to bring air travel within the means of the average citizen. Fast, low-cost flights to all parts of the world are indicated for both passengers and cargo.

This expansion promises to be so rapid and so great that it is time businessmen began to do some "balance sheet thinking" about a well-integrated national system of airports, Stanton said.
