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ONE FLUID OUNCE MILD TINCTURE OF IODINE

Automobile tourists, persons going on vacation or camping trips, travelers, and owners of cars should be equipped with a simple, compact emergency outfit for the practical first aid treatment of minor injuries and ailments.

The U.S. and British Pharmacopoeias both provide mild iodine to meet the insistent demand of the public for an efficient wound disinfectant for domestic use. This is called Mild Tincture of Iodine in the United States, Weak Solution of Iodine in Great Britain. Mild Tincture of Iodine contains about 2 per cent of iodine.

Readers frequently ask how much alcohol Mild Tincture of Iodine should contain. No matter, but the Pharmacopoeia states that it contains from 44 to 48 per cent by volume.

The "poison" label or skull and crossbones on the label of every vial of Mild Tincture of Iodine is certainly not intended to prevent poisoning. Who ever heard of any one being poisoned by tincture of iodine? The label is there, probably, to keep the sale of Mild Tincture of Iodine in the hands of the druggist and to prevent your corner grocery or country store from supplying it. Druggists sell indiscriminately more dangerous drugs than iodine.

Mild Tincture of Iodine should be included in every First Aid Kit and every Household Medicine Cupboard, and it should be immediately applied to every trifling scratch, puncture, cut or abrasion as a first aid disinfectant. It bites momentarily, but there is nothing else available that is as efficient for the purpose, in my opinion.

Questions & Answers
Bed-Wetting Habit
Son, 14, still wets the bed unless we wake him two or three times each night.
Answer—Send stamped envelope bearing your address, for pamphlet "The Bed-Wetting Habit." Many youngsters get over bed-wetting when they are sixteen or eighteen. It is a common trouble in youths entering the service. Persistent daytime wetting is merely a habit, due largely to your faulty training. Not the youngster's fault. Still, the wettest factor in correcting the habit is the youngster's own earnest intention to correct it. Once should be enough to wake the youngster in the night. If you have to wake your son two or three times, perhaps there is some condition which requires medical treatment. In any case of bed-wetting examination of the urine and careful examination of the youngster by the physician is always essential.

Eye Examination
Which is the better way to have the eyes examined, with drops or without drops? Have had so much trouble with my eyes lately. (R. E.)
Answer—If you are not past middle age better have drops. Last time I had my vision measured it was without drops. But the other day the doctor examining my eyes used drops. Accurate measurement of vision of young persons is obtained only when accommodation or unconscious strain is put at rest by drops. This is my opinion. It is the way I want my own eyes tested.

How Do You Do It?
Until this morn'g I expect to spend half my time in Miami, half in Chicago. In Miami I don't have any fever, but in Chicago my catarrh is always much better.

HANNEGAN SURE F.D.R. WILL RUN

Portland, Ore., June 6.—(U.P.)—Robert E. Hannegan, chairman of the Democratic National committee, predicted a democratic victory in the coming national elections, and said today he was "confident" Roosevelt again would be a candidate—but that, to be sure, newsmen would have to ask the President.

Hannegan observed that, according to newspapers, Mr. Roosevelt had 900 votes sewed up and waiting for him when the convention meets in Chicago July 19. He added his prophecy that Mr. Roosevelt would be elected for a fourth term "by an overwhelming majority." He made no prophecies concerning the vice-presidency.

Addressing 300 democrats, Hannegan said here Sunday that victory would come to the party only if it banished a false sense of security and substituted a policy of hard work, unity and devotion to party principles.

He stressed the extra importance of women in the coming vote.

GERMAN RETREAT TO PO VALLEY IS EXPERTS' GUESS

London, June 6.—(U.P.)—Military observers believed today that the German "withdrawal to the northwest of Rome," as announced by Adolf Hitler, was likely to develop into a retreat all the way to the Po valley, 250 miles northward.

Marshal Albert Kesselring was believed to have lost enough men, or to be on the verge of losing them, to make his defense of Italy a matter of rear guard actions from whatever lines he can hold temporarily.

Bravado Belied
All signs stemming from the allied march on Rome belied the bravado in the communique from Hitler's headquarters acknowledging the loss of the city, which said:

"The struggle in Italy will continue with unshakable will and with the aim to break at the end the enemy assault and force the victory, together with Germany's allies."

Bewildered Nazi propagandists were greatly confused over the situation in and around Rome. At the eleventh hour they offered to make Rome an open or undefended city, in the face of their repeated assurances in recent months that it already was. Then today the German high command said:

"Despite an offer not to in-

volve the city in hostilities, in order to maintain its cultural values, United States armored formations thrust into the inner part of the city at noon yesterday to take possession of Tiber bridges.

"Bitter street fighting ensued, which still is continuing in the evening (yesterday). On account of this attitude on the part of the enemy it is unavoidable that Rome should become a battlefield, despite the clearly announced German intentions."

Norman Thomas Is Fifth Time Choice
Reading, Pa., June 6.—(U.P.)—Norman Thomas, writer and lecturer, was listed as a presidential candidate of the socialist party for the fifth consecutive time today following his nomination at a closing session of the organization's 24th national convention. Darlington Hoopes, Reading attorney and former member of the Pennsylvania legislature, was the choice for vice president.

Polish Premier Sees Roosevelt
Washington, June 6.—(U.P.)—Polish Prime Minister Stanislaw Mikolajczyk arrived Monday for a week-long series of conferences with President Roosevelt and others on the whole range of Polish questions, including the

troublesome Polish-Russian border issue.
Undersecretary of State Edward R. Stettinius, Jr., said that the United States has no new proposals to put before him.

Stettinius understood that the Soviet government, as well as Britain, had been advised in advance of the prime minister's trip here from the seat of his government-in-exile in London.
