All Asked To Join In Prayer For Success Of Allied Arms

Washington, June 3 —(U.P.)—Following is President Roosevelt's prayer for success of our arms in their task—a prayer in which he asks all to join when he utters it by radio at 10 p. m., EWT, tonight:

My fellow Americans:

In this poignant hour, I ask you to join me in prayer: Almighty God: our sons, pride of our nation, this day have set upon a mighty endeavor, a struggle to preserve our republic, our religion, and our civilization, and to set free a suffering humanity. Lead them straight and true; give strength to their arms, stoutness to their hearts, steadfastness to their faith.

They will need Thy blessings. Their road will be long and hard. The enemy is strong. He may hurl back our forces. Success may not come with rushing speed, but we shall return again and again; and we know that by Thy grace, and by the righteousness of our cause, our sons will triumph.

They will be sore tried, by night and by day, without rest—till the victory is won. The darkness will be rent by noise and flame. Men's souls will be shaken with the violence of war.

These are men lately drawn from the ways of peace. They fight not for the lust of conquest. They fight to end conquest. They fight to liberate. They fight to let justice arise, and tolerance and good will among all Thy people. They yearn but for the end of battle, for their return to the haven of home.

Some will never return. Embrace these, Father, and receive them. Thy heroic servants, into Thy kingdom.

And for us at home—fathers, mothers, children, wives, sis-

ters, and brothers of brave men overseas—whose thoughts and prayers are ever with them—help us, almighty God, to rededicate ourselves in renewed faith in Thee in this hour of great sacrifice.

Many people have urged that I call the nation into a single day of special prayer. But because the road is long and the desire is great, I ask that our people devote themselves in continuance of prayer. As we rise each day is spent, let words of prayer be on our lips, invoking Thy help to our efforts.

Give us strength too—strength in our daily tasks, to redouble the contributions we make in the physical and material support of our armed forces.

And let our hearts be stout, to wait out the long travail, to bear sorrows that may come, to impart our courage unto our sons wheresoever they may be.

And, O Lord, give us faith. Give us faith in Thee; faith in our sons; faith in each other; faith in our united crusade. Let not the keenness of our spirit ever be dulled. Let not the impacts of temporary events, of temporal matters of but fleeting moment—let not these deter us in our unconquerable purpose.

With Thy blessing, we shall prevail over the unholiness of our enemy. Help us to conquer the apostles of greed and racial arrogancies. Lead us to the saving of our country, with our sister nations into a world unity that will spell a sure peace—a peace invulnerable to the schemings of unworthy men. And a peace that will let all men live in freedom, reaping the just rewards of their honest toil.

They will be done, almighty God.

450 CHILDREN IN VACATION SCHOOLS SPEAKERS ARRIVE FOR YMCA MEET

Approximately 450 boys and girls of Medford were present for the first session of the Daily Vacation Bible schools being conducted simultaneously by a number of the churches of Medford. More were expected this morning and it is likely that at least 600 will be enrolled in the various schools before the week is over, church spokesmen reported. Parents who desire to enroll their children in the schools are urged to do so this week if possible. Most schools will have sessions both this week and next.

Churches of the community that are having schools include the Church of God, Zion English Lutheran, First Methodist, First Baptist, First Christian, the Church of the Nazarene, Pilgrim Holiness church and St. Peter's Lutheran. Sessions are conducted in most schools from 9 to 12 each morning except Saturday and Sunday, and are for children four years of age or older.

"Missionary" Who Told Atrocities Admits Tales Tall

Anchorage, Alaska, June 3 —(U.P.)—Stephen O. Witman of Seattle, who had members of several large audiences here shuddering at his recitations of heinous Japanese atrocities perpetrated while he was a "prisoner" in the Philippines, has admitted his story was a fabrication, the army's Alaskan department announced today.

He had represented himself as "Reverend Witman," chairman of the Samaritan Army of America, a Baptist missionary, and a member of the marine corps. He said he was in Alaska on a missionary assignment. Army intelligence officers said he had admitted that he had never been in the Philippines.

Appearing as guest speaker at several large public gatherings, including a meeting of the Rotary club, Witman described tortures more fastidiously cruel than any included in the authenticated reports of bona fide former prisoners.

ENOUGH MAGNESIUM
Stockton, Calif., June 3 —(U.P.)—The Defense Plant Corporation at Washington has ordered officials of the Permanent magnesium plant at Lathrop, Calif., one of the Henry J. Kaiser interests, to cease operations because the magnesium stockpile now is sufficient to meet allied needs, it was announced today.

NINETY DAYS FOR STONING CHURCH

The sheriff's office through an error reported Hitchcock's offense was committed at Butte Falls.

Hitchcock appeared in court with a badly bruised face, due to an encounter with a member of the city police force last week.

Fat Collections Slightly Higher Is County Report

Collections of waste fat in Jackson county rose during the month of May, with figures at the office of the Morton Milling company showing 9,470 pounds collected during the month. Josephine county, however, fell short and collected but 822 pounds during the month. During April Jackson county collections were 7,580 and Josephine county turned in 1,151 pounds, while in March Jackson county collections rose to 9,741 pounds and Josephine county to 1,029 pounds.

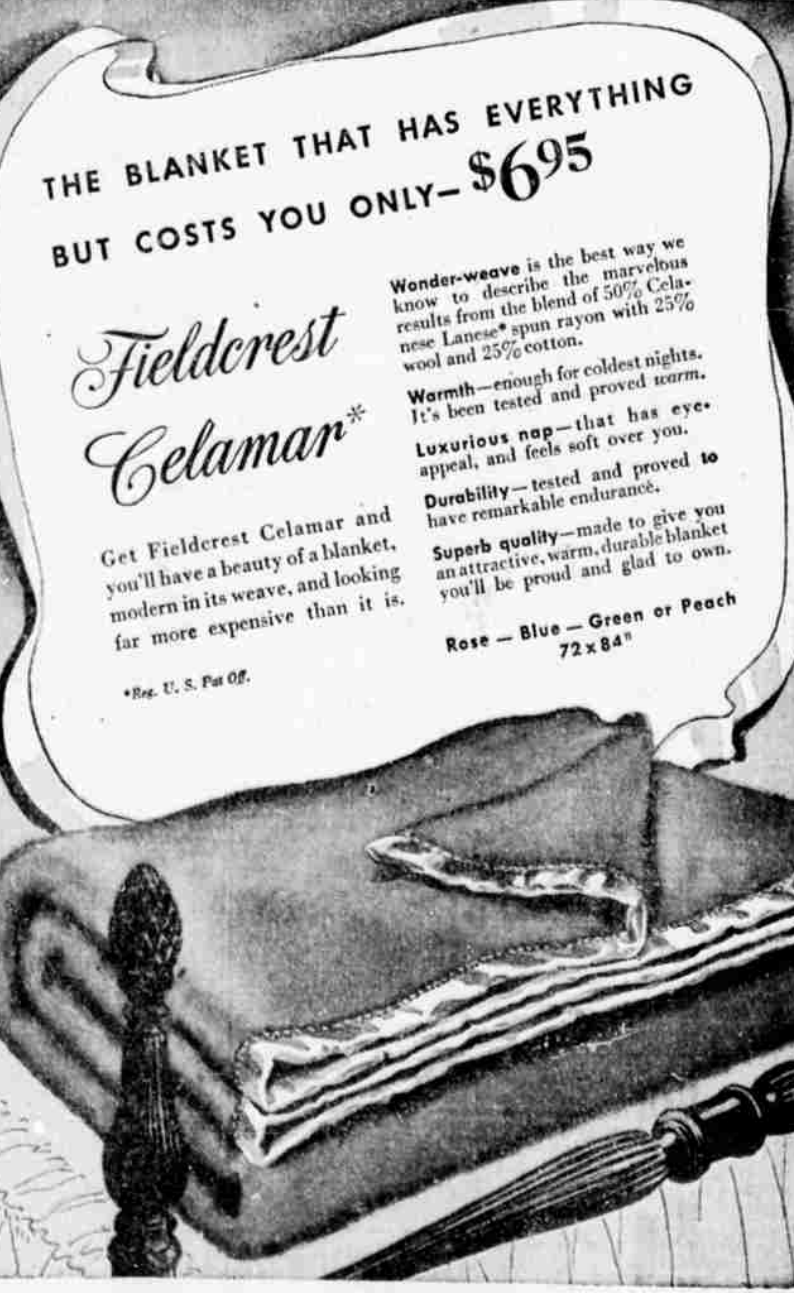
