

YMCA NEED TOLD BY PROF. CLARK IN CHARTER MEET

Medford Ideal Spot For Establishment Of Branch Says University Instructor

Robert D. Clark of Eugene, assistant professor of speech and dramatics at University of Oregon, was the main speaker at the first annual meeting of the Medford Young Men's Christian Association held at the West Main USO last night, attended by half a hundred people.

Clark, a recognized authority on youth problems and long interested in YMCA work, declared the establishment of a branch of the organization would fill a need in the community by offering a diversity of activities for youth, and would their lives along character developing lines. He pointed out his own experiences said "it is the tendency of youth to follow ideals." He termed Medford ideal for the establishment of a YMCA and needed one.

George Upton of the USO spoke on "The YMCA at Work in Medford." He said this city was unique in the loyalty and interest of its volunteer workers as shown in USO work, and felt that the same zeal and public spiritedness could be shown for a YMCA.

Greetings Extended Greetings to the local association were extended by Everett Harding of the Hi-Y. He also felt a YMCA was a civic need, that would win the support of both the public and youth.

Other speakers were John C. Mann, who gave early recollections of the YMCA in St. Paul; Leonard P. Mayfield, principal of the Senior high school, and James Tucker, high school student and Hi-Y member.

The meeting was closed by remarks of the Rev. Harry Hansen. The Rev. Hansen said the cost of \$9800 per year was a small amount compared to the good that would accrue from the YMCA. He recommended the plan heartily and also recommended Mr. Upton as secretary of the organization.

The meeting was closed with a prayer by Rev. Hansen and group singing led by Miss Marian Burton of the high school faculty.

Messages regretting inability to attend were received from Eugene Barnett New York; Paul B. Wallace, president Salem YMCA; G. I. Griffiths, Northwest Area Council head, and others.

SOLDIER SUFFERS FATAL INJURIES ASLEEP IN ROAD

Pvt. Walter McDowell, 37, stationed at Camp White with the 1388 Engineer's unit, died yesterday afternoon at the Station hospital as the result of injuries suffered in an accident on the Dead Indian road Monday night. According to the report of Ashland city police, who investigated the accident, the front wheel of a truck, loaded with about 4000 feet of lumber and driven by W. E. Coulter of 204 W. Eight man street, Ashland, passed over McDowell as he lay on the road asleep. He suffered a broken leg and other injuries.

The injured man was brought to Ashland by a Medford motorist, whose car passed the truck a few seconds before the accident, and was then transferred to a Camp White ambulance and taken to the Station hospital. Mr. Coulter reported to the Ashland police that he did not observe the soldier in the road until too late to avoid running over him. According to the police, McDowell was thought to have been drinking.

Pvt. McDowell, assigned to a bivouac camp of his unit in the Dead Indian area, had been to Medford on pass over the weekend and was en route back to the work camp when he lay down on the road.

The body will be shipped to Boz, Alabama, where the soldier's wife, Mrs. Clara A. McDowell, resides.

JAPAN PROTESTS TULE SHOOTING

The Japanese government has filed a "strong protest" with the United States government over the recent incident at the Tule Lake, Cal., relocation center in which an army sentry fatally shot Shiochi James Okamoto, an interned, Katsuo Okazaki, acting spokesman of the Japanese board of information in Tokyo, said today.

The statement was broadcast by Tokyo radio and recorded by the United Press at San Francisco.

The Japanese government has learned that six Japanese internees have been killed in various U. S. internment camps. Okazaki added. On all such occasions, the Japanese government has protested, he said. (On May 26, a Moque county coroner's jury ruled that Okamoto, an American-born Japanese, was shot to death at the hands of a military sentry in line of duty. District Attorney Charles Lederer said testimony indicated the sentry shot Okamoto when he thought the Japanese was about to attack him jiu-jitsu style.)

POLYGAMISTS TO FILE PLEA FOR NEW TRIAL

Salt Lake City, June 7—(UP)—Attorneys for nine members of the polygamy-preaching Fundamentalist cult, convicted of violating federal white slave or kidnapping laws, announced today they would file a motion for a new trial late this afternoon on the grounds they have uncovered new evidence.

Appearing before District Judge T. Blake Kennedy in federal court here, Defense Attorney Claude T. Barnes said he wanted to file the motion before sentences, due this morning, were passed because he wished Kennedy to retain jurisdiction. Kennedy allowed Barnes until 2 p. m. to prepare the motion.

REDS DISCOURAGE NAZI ASSAULTS

Moscow, June 7—(UP)—German attempts to break the Soviet lines north and northwest of Iasi, Romania, were tapering off today following the heavy loss of men and material in eight successive days of futile assault on the Russian positions.

A communique said the Germans lost a number of tanks and armored cars and suffered 300 killed as Red army troops turned back comparatively small tank and infantry forces in yesterday's attacks. In the first week of the unavailing drives against the Russian lines, the Germans lost 7300 dead, 333 tanks and 355 planes.

Judy Garland Sings Rose Sullen Mate

Hollywood, June 7—(UP)—Judy Garland, the one-time knock-kneed kid of amateur night, who became one of the screen's biggest singing stars, today divorced Sgt. Dave Rose on grounds of general cruelty.

Rose, she said, was sullen, objected to her friends and was inconsiderate. Now attached to the army air forces film unit here, Rose is one of the country's most popular composers and orchestra leaders. Currently popular are his "Holiday for Strings" and his arrangement of "Poinciana."

FUEL OIL USERS URGED TO FILL UP TANKS NOW

Washington, June 7—(UP)—The Office of Price Administration today urged fuel oil consumers to fill their home tanks as soon as possible to help relieve storage problems of the fuel oil industry.

OPA also said the manpower and equipment problems which fuel oil dealers face during the coming winter would be eased somewhat if they were able to spread their deliveries over a longer period.

AUGUST VOSIKA SHARES CITATION

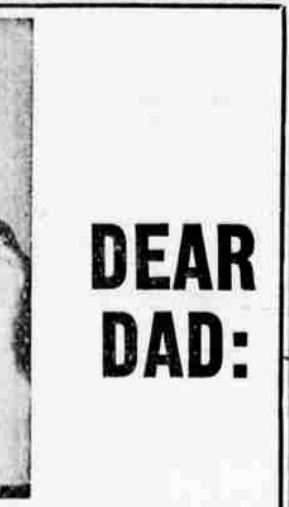

Vosika's group has flown missions over Libya, Tunisia, Sicily, Italy, France, Germany and the Balkans. One of the oldest bombardment outfits overseas, it helped rout Rommel in Africa and now operates from an advanced base in Italy. Vosika graduated from machinist school in Sioux Falls, S. Dakota, prior to his entry in the service in April, 1942, and has been serving overseas since February, 1943.

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YUGOSLAVS CAPTURE VILLAGES IN BOSNIA

London, June 7—(UP)—Yugoslav partisans, in new assaults and counter attacks, captured several towns in Bosnia and routed German columns in Herzegovina and Sandjak, a communique said today.

After successfully resisting enemy pressure in western Bosnia, partisans of the third corps occupied Grahovo after bitter fighting in which the Germans suffered heavy losses.

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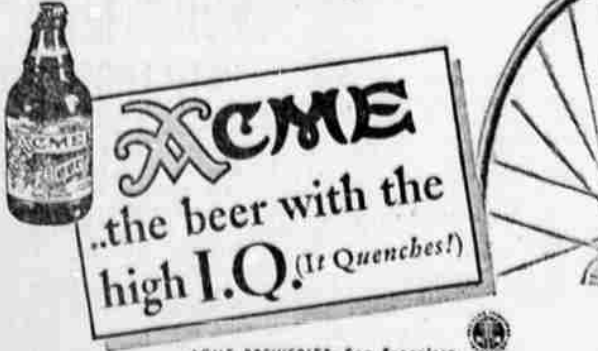
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
