MAJOR LEAGUES IDLE ON D-DAY RESUME TODAY

New York, June 7—(U.P.)—Major league baseball prepared to resume action today following the cancellation of both scheduled games yesterday in observance of D-day.

Both games were slated for the National league and under the lights. Previously the major leagues had announced that all games scheduled on invasion day would be played with mass prayers to be said at the parks by fans and players alike.

Presidents Branch Rickey of the Brooklyn Dodgers, scheduled to play the Philadelphia Phillies, and Bill Benswanger of the Pittsburgh Pirates, scheduled against the Cincinnati Reds, expressed a desire to keep their parks darkened last night.

The American league schedule for today called for two games, Detroit at Chicago and New York at Boston. In the National league, Boston plays at New York, Philadelphia at Brooklyn and Cincinnati at Pittsburgh.

Grants Pass, June 7—Millard (Mel) Johnson, who coached Springfield high school to district titles in basketball and track this past year, has accepted a position as director of athletics and coach at Grants Pass high school, Frank W. Thomas, high school principal, announced today.

Johnson was graduated from the University of Oregon in 1936. He taught five years in Newport high school before going to Springfield two years ago. His 1943 football team at Springfield high undefeated, Thomas said, and his basketball team for this past season went to the state tournament. The Springfield high track team won the district championship.

The new coach, with Mrs. Johnson and their three children, will arrive here about August 1. He is attending coaching school in Utah this summer, under Clark D. Shaugnessy, exponent of the famous "T" formation.

Woman Radio Director Sees Man's World Place Secure

Hollywood—(U.P.)—As the first woman director of a radio broadcast, Helen Mack, petite actress of the stage and screen, has her own philosophy about women and the professional world.

Miss Mack thinks that war or no war, women will never replace men. "Either at work or at home," she said, looking more like a starchy-eyed ingenue than an efficient executive.

Behind the glass of a radio control room, Miss Mack has a role that corresponds with that of a motion picture director. She is vivacious and intense, and when she points her pencil, the cast speaks, the orchestra plays, and the sound-effects man comes in on time.

"I feel sort of presumptuous telling everyone what to do," she said. "It's frightening—like being Shickelgruber himself for a half hour."

But Helen Mack doesn't look frightened. She is definite in every direction she gives. She knows why she is giving directions.

With four productions of "A Date with Judy" behind her, there is no doubt in anyone's mind that she is doing a good job. Technicians and cast alike respect her word because her professional background, which years of experience as a stage and screen actress, and her intelligent approach warrant authority.

"The attitude of the cast has been wonderful," she said. "They have accepted me as they would a man and it has given me confidence."

The dark-haired, dimpled executive wears authority well. A frank and realistic person, she respects the opinions of the actors and musicians in the show, and readily admits a lack of knowledge of sound.

"However," she added in her quick impetuous way, "when I am directing, I must do it all myself or no one will know whether I can or not."

Miss Mack has a noteworthy film career. Born in Rock Island, Ill., and schooled in the streets in New York, she went on the stage at the age of seven. A Fox agent saw her in a rehearsal of "Cloudy with Showers" when she was 17, gave her a screen test, and brought her to Hollywood.

"I was at Fox for a year and I was frightened," she said. "I played the part of a sweet ingenue, and I'm not the type."

In "Sweepings" she was a shop girl with character and she made a name for herself that has been prominent on Hollywood bills ever since. Her latest picture, "And Now Tomorrow," is soon to be released.

Miss Mack actually prefers to work with men. She believes the professional world should belong to them because they fit in it by temperament better than women do. Men are intellectually frank and more impersonal than women, she said.

"My hardest job is to keep the woman in me under control," she added. "When anyone disagrees with me, my instinctive reaction is that it's personal. I feel hurt and want to fight back. Instead, I try to fight for self-control and take it 'like a man'."

Married to Tom McAvity, director of the Joan Davis show, she also likes her new job because it helps her to understand his problems.

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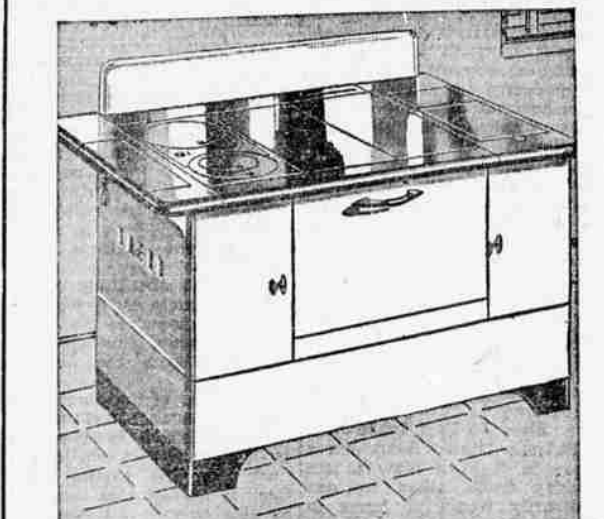
GENERAL PUNISHED

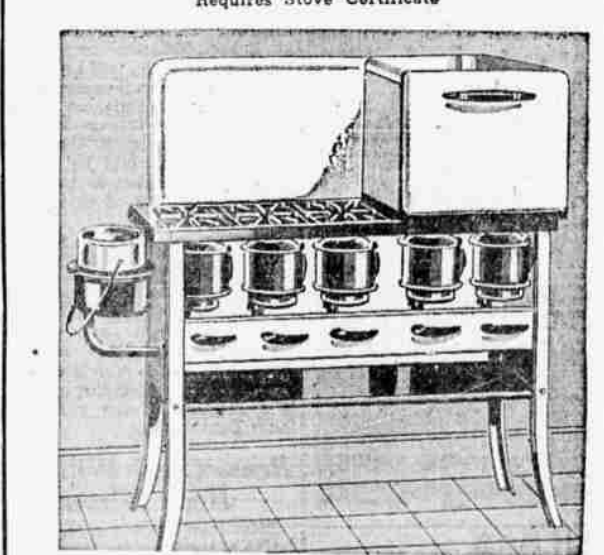
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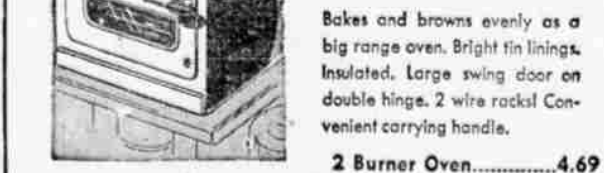

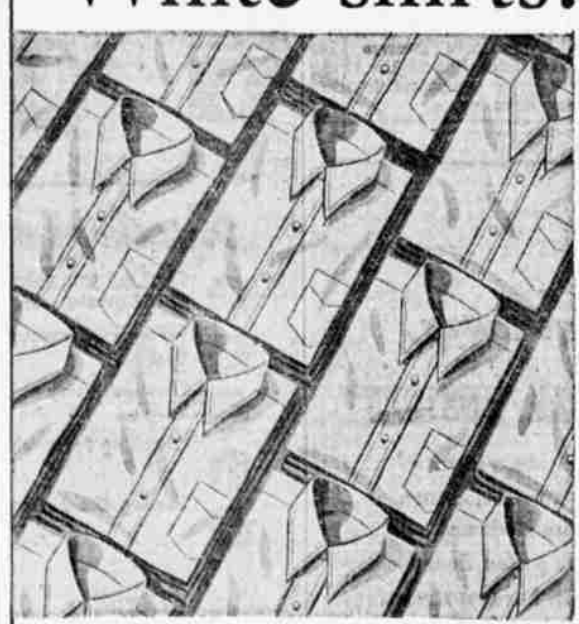
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
