EVERYBODY LIKES FRESH BERRY JAM

Save Sugar and Berries with This Easy Recipe

6 Cups Ground Berries (Any Variety)
8 1/2 Cups Sugar
1 Package M.C.P. Pectin

Wash, stem and grind 3 quarts fully ripe berries, or crush completely on a layer at a time so that each berry is reduced to pulp. Measure exactly 6 level cups crushed berries. (Add water to fill out last cup, if necessary), into a large kettle. Add M.C.P. Pectin, stir well and bring to a boil, stirring constantly. NOW, add the sugar (which has been previously measured), mix well and bring to a full rolling boil. BOIL EXACTLY 4 MINUTES. Remove from fire, let boil subside. Pour into sterilized jars, allowing 1/2-inch space for sealing with fresh paraffin. (NOTE: For Strawberry Jam, add 1/4 cup lemon juice to each 6 cups crushed berries.)

RACING PIGEONS UNSUNG HEROES ALLIED ARMIES

Feathered Warriors Deliver Important Messages, Give Data On Submarines.

Moline, Ill. — (U.P.) — Homing pigeons, the unsung heroes, are playing a prominent part with their message-carrying in the war.

Leslie C. Swanson of Moline, Ill., author of two books and a number of magazine articles on the subject of homing or racing pigeons, has compiled a list of accomplishments of the Allies' feathered warriors which include such things as bringing help to fliers downed at sea or in isolated sectors, flying information from occupied Europe to England and serving as a communication link with advance forces. Pigeons are also used by dirigibles and planes to provide data on the location of submarines when radio messages

would have served to warn the prey.

2-Way Flying
War developments are likewise affecting the pigeons, vast changes having been introduced in the methods of handling them. Such innovations as two-way flying and night-flying birds are a product of World War II. Whereas birds in World War I could fly only one way—from the point of liberation to their home loft—pigeons now carry messages back and forth from two points, a hitherto unheard of operation. How it is done is a carefully guarded military secret.

Despite recent exaggerated claims that pigeons are flying 300 miles an hour, Mr. Swanson reports that the speed of the average bird is 42.5 miles an hour, more or less, depending upon wind and weather conditions. It is a tail wind a Detroit pigeon recently set a record of 80 miles an hour.

Thousands Donated
Much credit for the success of the U. S. army's pigeon service is due to the civilian service, who donated thousands of birds to the government and contributed a great number of men from their ranks to handle them. Although the government offered to purchase the birds when the pigeon service was organized, the civilians in most cases showed their patriotism by

donating some of their best birds.

Mr. Swanson emphasizes that the pigeons are correctly called homing or racing pigeons and not "carrier" pigeons, a common error of the public and many magazine and newspaper writers in discussing this type of pigeon. According to Mr. Swanson the "carrier" pigeon is an entirely different type of bird and does not carry anything, being a bird used largely for exhibition and fancy purposes. The misnomer of "carrier" was probably attached to the homing pigeon because it "carries" messages.
