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NOT A CLASS B NEUROTIC

Still harping on the case of the unhappy young woman who said she started doctoring a year ago, and first she "was told" (she did not say a physician told her) it was her teeth and so she had them all pulled. She did not improve, and so "they" told her it was her thyroid. Then she had a complete physical examination—evidently no one thought that was necessary or worth the price before the unhappy young woman's teeth were sacrificed. Criminal malpractice, I call it, if she sought the advice of a qualified or genuine physician in the first place, and the physician told her (she was 27 years of age) to have all her teeth extracted. In my opinion the dentist or near-dentist or dental quack who pulled all of the unhappy young woman's teeth merely on the order of the quack doctor should be prosecuted as accessory to the crime, unless there was reasonable evidence to show that ALL of the teeth were damaged by decay so extremely that not one of them could be filled or otherwise treated and preserved.

The young woman, as mentioned in preceding discussions of her case, apparently did not feel much confidence in the information elicited by the belated physical examination. I don't blame her, if the examination was made by the same incompetent "doctor" who told her or permitted her to have all of her teeth extracted. She made the pilgrimage to the best advertised "clinic."

When the toothless young woman had been run through the hopper and reports from all the hands along the assembly line were handed to the head man, he dismissed her with the assurance that there was "nothing organically wrong," just "nervous exhaustion," and the advice to go home and "fight it herself."

The young woman's husband, a member of the state police, wants her to go on a vacation with him, but she hesitates because she thinks people stare at her, and she just can't wear her false teeth...

Even if her nutrition was fairly good before she started doctoring, by now it is probably seriously deficient. No one can health or vite unless he or she has teeth, natural or artificial, which are functionally adequate for proper chewing of food.

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Methodical Huns Easily Trapped On Anzio Beach

Washington, June 8—(U.P.)—By carefully observing enemy habits, an American infantry company annihilated a German company on the Anzio beach-head without itself suffering a single casualty. Col. Ray Ross, Fargo, N. D., reported today.

His report, released by the war department, said the Americans noted how the Germans occupied front-line foxholes at night and withdrew to a village to rest during the daytime, leaving only a few sentinels behind.

"At dusk one day, just before the Germans came back, our men moved in stealthily and overpowered the sentinels," Ross reported. "Then they crouched down in the Germans' foxholes and waited. When the enemy turned up our doughboys killed or captured every one, without losing a single American."

ONLY AMERICAN WOMAN MODERN, ENGLISH CLAIM

Mrs. Cazalet Keir Of Parliament Urges More Equality For British Women.

By Dudley Ann Harmon, United Press Correspondent. London—(U.P.)—America is the sole country in the world to produce a modern woman, according to Mrs. Cazalet Keir, only member of Parliament to have brought the British coalition government down to defeat during the war.

Mrs. Keir, whose motion to give women teachers the same pay as men recently defeated the government's education bill by one vote and caused Prime Minister Winston Churchill to demand a vote of confidence, says that this country has much to learn from the American woman.

"She has mastered the problem of sex and jobs. She has managed to establish a friendly, companionable relationship in her business dealings with men," Mrs. Keir told the United Press. "I envy you the camaraderie which exists between members of both sexes. Here, despite the heroic work women have done in the war, men still take us hard. It will be some years yet before they co-operate in business with women as American men do, although they are beginning to get used to the idea."

For Equal Pay
Undaunted by the sensational result of her motion on women teachers, Mrs. Keir is continuing her struggle to have the government introduce a bill providing equal pay for members of her sex which it employs. She is impressed by the fact that in America women in the civil service and armed forces are paid the same as men.

"Here, women teachers, women civil servants, and women in local government positions get less than men. They do exactly the same work. Many have dependents. Many more will have dependents as the result of the war."

She feels that the British should settle this problem while the war is still on so that by its end the House may be free to deal with the biggest problem of all—the peace.

Should Help Draw Peace
"Women should be represented at every level of the peace conference," she said. "History shows they can do no worse jobs than men."

The problem of equal pay for women promises to be one of the largest problems which post-war Britain must face. The Trades Union Congress, which negotiates for women in industry, has announced that most British women still get less money than men for the same job.

"But this tendency was decreasing before the war and after the war women should obtain even more concessions," a trades union official told the United Press.

Washington, June 8—(U.P.)—Germany today was deprived of her last major source of wolfram—source of steel-hardening tungsten—by Portugal's decision to stop all exports to Germany and to shut down her wolfram mines immediately.

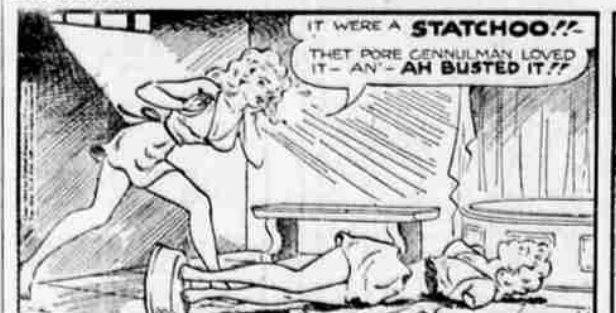

The Petroleum Administration for War reports that war demands have reduced the yield of automobile gasoline per barrel of crude oil 36 per cent since Pearl Harbor.

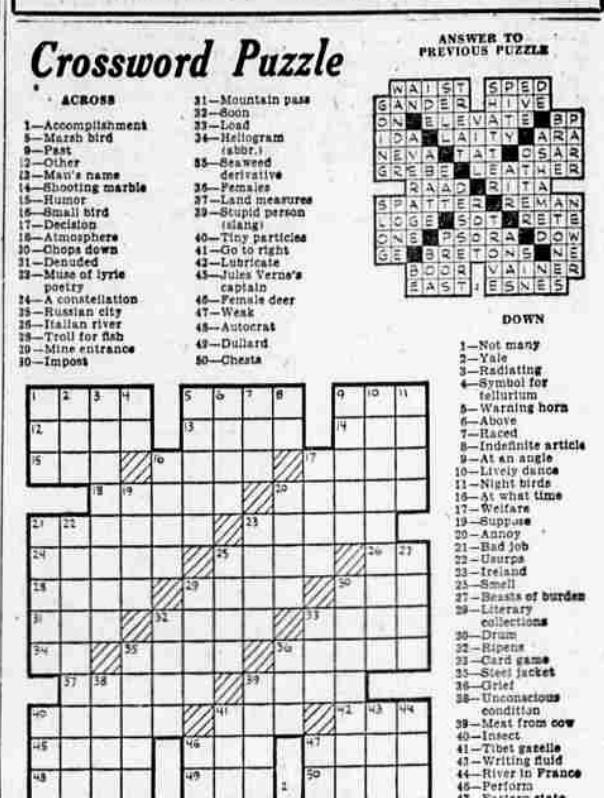
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Crossword Puzzle
