

EXPERT INFANTRY MAY RECEIVE \$5 ADDITIONAL PAY

Washington, June 8—(U.P.)—American infantrymen, whose weary feet are setting the pace of invasion, appeared assured today of merit pay adjustments to raise their income above the level for troops in less hazardous branches of the army.

At the request of Secretary of War Henry L. Stimson, Chairman Andrew J. May, D., Ky., of the House military affairs committee introduced legislation to award \$5 a month in extra pay to holders of the "expert infantryman" badge and \$10 a month more to recipients of the "combat infantryman" awards.

May's office said hearings on the bill would be started "as soon as possible."

Stimson urged the pay raises in a three-page letter in which he said that infantry troops suffer by far the highest casualties of all branches of the service and are generally the poorest paid.

AUTO STAMPS ON SALE JUNE 30TH

Federal motor vehicle tax stamps for the year beginning July 1, 1944, and ending June 30, 1945, will go on sale at the Medford postoffice June 10, it was announced today by Postmaster Frank DeSouza. Federal law requires all motor vehicles operating on highways to display the stamps.

Cost of the stamp is \$5 for the year. DeSouza stated, however, that persons obtaining cars after July 31 and wishing to equip them with stamps can purchase a stamp good for the remainder of the fiscal year at a reduced price from the internal revenue collector, Portland, Ore. No monthly issue stamps will be on sale at the local postoffice, he said.

Cost of the stamp purchased after July 31 is reduced each month, making the prices: August, \$4.59; September, \$4.17; October, \$3.75; November, \$3.34; December, \$2.92; January, \$2.50; February, \$2.09; March, \$1.67; April, \$1.25; May, \$.84, and June, \$.42.

Mother Receives Information On Dietrich's Death

Further information was given today concerning Second Lt. Ben Dietrich, 26, pilot of an army bomber, who was killed in the crash of his plane in Italy May 20, according to a telegram received by his mother, Mrs. Peter Dietrich of 939 N. Central avenue. Dietrich had been in Italy since early in December, and had received the Air Medal and completed 39 missions.

Survivors in addition to his mother are two sisters, Mrs. Frank Weizel of Ridgefield, Wash., and Miss Viola Dietrich of Los Angeles, and two brothers in the service, Cpl. Robert Dietrich with the air corps at Columbus, Ohio, and Cpl. Merle Dietrich, stationed with a medical unit at Camp Butler, N. C. The pilot's father passed away here last Dec. 29.

Lt. Dietrich was born in Plentywood, Mont., and came to Medford with his parents in 1920. He is a graduate of Medford high school.

On receiving notice of her son's death, Mrs. Dietrich went to stay with friends in Trail until another son, Cpl. Robert Dietrich, was able to get here from Ohio. He arrived in Medford Tuesday night. The other boy, Cpl. Merle Dietrich at Camp Butler, will not be able to come home.
