

OREGON GRANGE TO OPEN MONDAY AT GRANTS PASS

Grants Pass, June 9—Next week Oregon State Grange holds its 71st annual session in Grants Pass.

Plans are complete for housing and entertainment of the large number of outside delegates and visitors expected.

The first meeting of the session will be held at 10 a. m. Monday, at the high school auditorium. It will be opened in the Sixth degree but will pass immediately after opening to the Fourth degree and thereafter all of the business meetings will be held in the Fourth degree. This point is important, because it means all Grangers can attend these sessions, even though they are members of subordinate Granges only. The address of welcome will be given by Mayor Joe Wharton at about 10:30.

The 8 p. m. lecturer's program, also held in the high school auditorium, will be open to the public and will be featured by an address by Professor Ray G. Johnson, head of the Animal Husbandry department of Oregon State college. Professor Johnson has only recently returned from a nine months stay in China, and his address will cover his work there, under the topic "China's Agriculture in Wartime."

Tuesday at 2:30 p. m. Governor Earl Snell will address the session. This program will also be open to the public.

Wednesday at 2:45 p. m., Dr. Paul J. Raver, administrator of Bonneville Power administration will speak, giving an address of interest to the public, who are again invited to attend.

Memberships in Oregon Granges has increased in numbers in recent years, with the present number, 22,726 members, the highest it has ever been.

PEARS HARD HIT BY SAGTO GALE

Sacramento, June 9—(U.P.)—Farmers of the Sacramento valley today estimated their grain and fruit losses at more than \$1,500,000 following the heaviest June windstorm recorded by weather bureaus in the last 66 years.

In Sacramento county, Agricultural Commissioner A. E. Morrison said at least 100,000 boxes of pears would be lost, and early varieties of plums and apricots were hit hard. He placed the damage to plums at 25 to 30 per cent of the crop.

Yolo county was one of the chief sufferers from the storm, damage to grain and fruit being estimated at \$1,000,000 by Dr. George Hecke, prominent orchardist and former state director of agriculture.

Roosevelt Expects De Gaulle In July

Washington, June 9—(U.P.)—President Roosevelt today disclosed that he is expecting a visit from Gen. Charles De Gaulle some time before mid-July.

De Gaulle, head of the French National Committee of Liberation, is in London now for conferences with Prime Minister Winston Churchill. He has sent word to Mr. Roosevelt, the president told his news conference today, asking if Mr. Roosevelt would receive him if he visited Washington.

General Craig Reaches Goal Of 600,000 Army Officers

Washington—(U.P.)—The immense task of finding half-a-million officers to lead the greatest army in the nation's history has been virtually concluded under the supervision of a former chief of staff—Gen. Malin Craig.

The fact that Craig is the least known of the five four-star generals now on active duty is due primarily to his position as head of the ultra-secretive War department personnel board. He was made a full general automatically in 1935 when he was appointed chief of staff, and retained his rank upon his recall to active duty in September, 1941. Only other Army officers in active service now wearing four stars of a full general are George C. Marshall, Douglas MacArthur, Dwight D. Eisenhower, and Henry H. Arnold.

Craig's board supervises all commissions granted to soldiers from civilian life and all officers' promotions. During his tenure the roll of officers has expanded from about 100,000 to 600,000 for the Army's peak strength of 7,700,000 men.

Activities and names of members of the board are kept secret, in order to eliminate all political influence in awarding commissions or promotions.

Plump, Beautiful Joan Blondell In Suit For Divorce

Hollywood, June 9—(U.P.)—Plump and beautiful Joan Blondell today filed suit for divorce against Actor Dick Powell, charging the reluctant crooner with extreme cruelty.

Miss Blondell, late "naked genius" of the New York play by that name, had announced six months ago that she and the Arkansas film actor had decided to part, but reconciliation appeared in the offing many times later.

Her role in the naked genius, part genius and part naked, was strongly objected to by Powell, and it was shortly after it closed that she announced their separation. They were married Sept. 19, 1936.

CUTS LOAN TIME

Frankfort, Ind.—(U.P.)—Arthur Mosson of near Frankfort, became the first Hoosier—by a margin of 36 years—to repay the government loan which enabled him to become a farm owner. Mosson, the recipient of a \$10,000 federal loan, paid the debt 36 years ahead of the schedule worked out by the federal agency, in accordance with the production expected from his 2120-acre farm.
