MOROCCO BORDER CLOSING GRATES ON AXIS NERVES

Allied Headquarters, Algiers, June 10—(U.P.)—The border between French and Spanish Morocco was ordered closed at midnight tonight to all except American, British, Soviet and French diplomats in a swift surprise move far-reaching in its implications. (Informed circles in London declared the action was a "masterful stroke in the war of nerves" in view of Axis jitters over the possibility of further Allied landings on the continent in the Mediterranean area.)

The closing off of the flow of correspondence in coded messages and stopped "until further notice" the transmission of letters in sealed pouches between diplomatic and consular representatives of neutral countries.

WEATHER BETTER, INVASION COAST

London, June 10—(U.P.)—Weather conditions over the channel coast and the invasion beachheads were improving tonight after a day of alternate cloudy and clear weather. The sky was slightly overcast at dusk, but the clouds were high. The barometer was rising and a light northeasterly wind, increasing slightly at nightfall, was coming offshore, leaving the sea calm on the British side and a trifle more disturbed on the French side.
