AMERICAN TEAMS ALL RAINED OUT; BUNCHED IN RACE

Cardinals Maul 15-Year-Old Cincy Hurler; Pirates Victors.

New York, June 10.—(U.P.)—American league teams, all apparently trying to live on the same percentage point, provided a mathematical housing problem today, with the front-running St. Louis Browns a bare four and a half games ahead of the last place Philadelphia Athletics.

With all games in the league rained out, the accountants called for a quick audit of the standings, which revealed the following:

1. That the leading Browns with their .551 percentage achieved in winning 27 games and losing 22 would be no better than fourth in the current National league standings.

2. The Athletics, in eighth with a .455 mark established on 20 victories and 24 losses, would be no worse than sixth if suddenly transplanted into the senior circuit.

3. Only 96 points separate the top and bottom clubs whereas, in the National an even 300 points are between the first place St. Louis Cardinals and last place Chicago Cubs, who have a 12½-game spread.

Even more remarkable is the fact that at no time since the season began nearly two months ago have the top and bottom teams been separated by more than seven and a half games.

The St. Louis Cards mauling the Cincinnati Reds 18 to 0 for the most one-sided shutout in the National league since 1906 when the Cubs beat the Giants 19 to 0. Backing Morton Cooper's five-hit pitching with a 21-hit attack, the Cards equalled a major league record by stranding 18 men on base.

The game marked the first appearance of 15-year-old Joe Nuxhall, youngest player ever to go into a major league lineup. His appearance was inauspicious, however, with the entire Cardinal lineup facing him in two-thirds of an inning, during which he walked five men and allowed two hits.

It was Cooper's fifth victory and his third in a row. In the only other major league game, Pittsburgh strengthened its hold on second place by beating the visiting Cubs 9 to 4 with a 16-hit attack. Frank Zak led the batting with four hits. Elwin (Preacher) Roe, who pitched the last three innings, was credited with the victory.

ILLINOIS TRACK SQUAD CAPTURES COLLEGIATE TOGA

Milwaukee, Wis., June 10.—(U.P.)—The heralded rivalry race between the nation's outstanding sprinters, Claud "Buddy" Young of Illinois and Ed Conwell of New York university, failed to materialize tonight when Conwell was disqualified for two false starts, and Young went on to pace Illinois to its third national collegiate track championship in 23 years.

Illinois piled 79 points to capture the twenty-third running of the historic track and field carnival, taking over the crown that Southern California held for nine straight years only to forego its defense of the title this year because of travel restrictions.

The Illinois triumph returned the NCAA crown to the midwest for the first time since Indiana won in 1932.

The much-publicized attempt of the stubby Mr. Young, negro freshman sensation, to become the first man to win four NCAA events since Jesse Owens did it in 1936 failed in two respects: (1) Young was defeated in the broad jump by Ralph Tyler of Ohio State, who leaped 23 feet 4½ inches, and (2) Young scratched in the low hurdles when it was obvious that Illinois would win anyway.

Nevertheless the Mr. Five by Five from Chicago piled up 28 of Illinois' 79 points taking first in the 100-yard and 220-yard dash and second in the broad jump, based on the NCAA scoring of 10 points for first place and eight for second. In addition, he led Conwell to the tape by 10 yards in the 220 dash.

Runner-up to Illinois was Notre Dame, with a 19-man squad that spread its overall strength to 43 points, Michigan, largely upon the work of its famous Hume twins, finished third with 40 points.

SACS DOWN SEALS, STARS BEATEN IN OVERTIME TILTS

San Francisco, June 10.—(U.P.)—The Sacramento Solons, cellar champions of the Pacific Coast league to date, turned on the heat against San Francisco in a 14-inning battle today to take a 3-2 decision and make up for last night's loss in a 12-inning contest.

Pitcher Tom Seats of the Seals and Sacramento's Gene Babbitt turned in 11-hit mound jobs but Bill Ramsey, who broke a batting slump, hit three for seven to drive in all the Solon runs for the win.

SHOWDOWN COMES THIS WEEK OVER COLLEGE SPORTS

Faculty and Coaches Due to Clash Over Policy At Hood River Meet.

Portland, Ore., June 10.—(U.P.)—The once-powerful Pacific Coast Intercollegiate conference—hamstrung for the duration by cancellation of most sports—will have a showdown on future policy next week when the faculty representatives, graduate managers and remaining coaches go into spring session at Hood River, Ore.

A realistic battle is brewing, however, between the graduate managers—long irked at playing second fiddle—and the faculty representatives. The latter have traditionally held the upper hand while the boys who make the schedules and count the box office receipts feel they should have more say-so on policy.

Aside from such an internal explosion, the remainder of the three-day session isn't apt to loosen the shingles of the Columbia Gorge hotel, resort spot chosen for the gathering. Some of the coaches are gone for the duration, only Washington has a football team in the northern division, the armed services keep making inroads among the male students, and high paying defense jobs lure the lads who otherwise might be earning a letterman's sweater.

Tentative possibilities are drafting of a skeleton football schedule, with athletic heads of army camps anxious to hook competition, resuming basketball series in each division, playing of baseball, and perhaps rescheduling of division track meets.

Most directors feel college athletics are due for a boom, after the war so post-war problems may get an airing, particularly eligibility of men who have competed on armed services teams or in military college programs.

Schools to be represented are the University of Washington, Washington State college, University of Oregon, Oregon State college, University of California, University of Southern California, Stanford university, University of California at Los Angeles, University of Idaho and University of Montana. The meeting opens Monday morning and should close Wednesday.

ANN CURTIS SETS NEW SWIM MARKS

Oakland, Cal., June 10.—(U.P.)—Ann Curtis, 18-year-old San Francisco swimmer, broke three American women's records tonight in a special 500-yard race at the Pacific association swimming meet.

Paced by two teammates and clocked at four intervals, the tall and blonde Miss Curtis turned in new records for the 400 meters, 440 yards and 500 yards.

In the 400 meters she clipped more than 16 seconds off her own former mark of 5:29.5 with a 5:13.2 performance. Miss Curtis was timed in 4:15.6 for the 440, another 16 seconds under the old mark of 5:21.7, and finished with the same margin for the 500 yards in 5:58.6, compared with the former standard of 6:15.1.

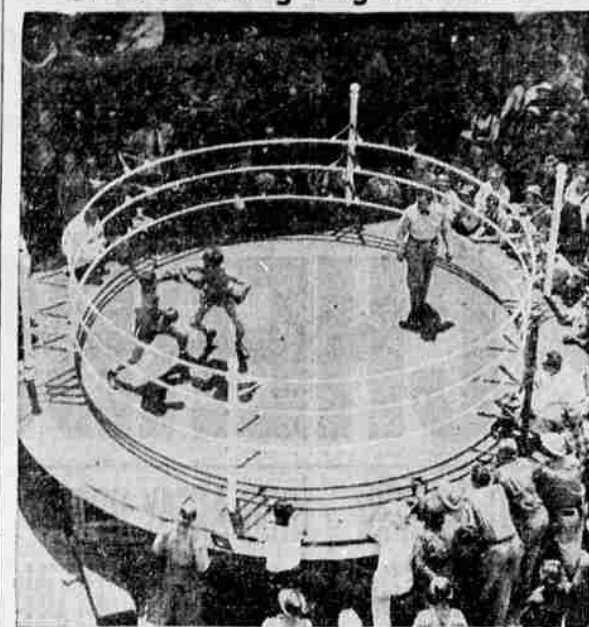
Brough, Osborne To Vie For Net Title

ATHLETIC STARS OF LAND TO VIE IN ANNUAL MEET

New York, June 10.—(U.P.)—A sterling field of track and field stars, including 12 defending champions and teams and individuals from 33 different states was assured tonight for the 56th annual American track and field meet here next Saturday and Sunday, June 17 and 18.

Officials of the sponsoring Amateur Athletic Union said the advance list of stars was remarkable in view of wartime manpower conditions which make it impossible for numerous other competitors to defend their laurels.

More than 85 per cent of the big entry list will be provided by the various branches of the armed forces, including men on furlough and teams from navy and marine V-12 and V-5 colleges.

Probably the standout individual entrant is California's Cornelius Warmerdam, only man in athletic history to pole vault beyond 15 feet. Warmerdam, competing under the colors of tiny Monmouth, Ill., college, has vaulted 15 feet or higher in 42 official meets.

Other defending champions are Cliff Bourland, Finnish 400 meter expert from Washington, D. C.; Bill Hulse of the New York Athletic club, in the 800 meters; Arky Erwin of Louisiana State in the 400 meter hurdles; Pete Watkins of Fort Sam Houston, Texas, high jump; Earl Audet of California, shot put; Henry Dreyer of New York university, hammer throw; Lt. Hugh Cannon of New York, discus; Frank Berst of the New York A. C., 56-pound weight throw; Capt. Martin Biles, javelin; James Wilson of New York, 3000 meter walk, and Lt. Joe McCluskey, former Fordham star, in the 3000 meter steeple chase.

LT. BERG FAVORED RED CROSS OPEN

New York, June 10.—(U.P.)—Led by Lt. Patty Berg of the marines, America's top woman golfer, a field of 42 will tee off Monday in a 54-hole medal play event that opens the week-long New York Red Cross open golf tournament at New Rochelle's Wykagyl Country club.

The women will play 36 holes Monday and wind up with 18 holes on Tuesday. The men take over then, with an 18-hole amateur-pro best ball tournament Wednesday followed by the 72-hole open with all the national stars June 15-18.

San Mateo, Cal., June 10.—(U.P.)—The featured Hayward Morrison handicap for \$5,000 at one mile and one-sixteenth was won by Mrs. Mabel Cooper's Jade Boy today, a half length ahead of Valdina Andire and Gold Call, third.

With Jockey Ralph Neves aboard, Jade Boy trailed the field as Okana took the lead at the start. Jade Boy ran last to the stretch and then passed every horse in the field to win in the slow time of 1:45.

TRIPLE TIE RACE, SECOND RECORDED RUN AT AQUEDUCT

New York, June 10.—(U.P.)—The second triple dead heat in American racing history happened at Aqueduct today, when Wait a Bit, Bossuet and Brownie knifed their way from behind in the 46th running of the \$10,000 added Carter handicap to reach the wire simultaneously.

The only other time that three horses reached the finish line together was on Oct. 8, 1942, when Cut Loose, Sabra and Queen Echo finished in a three-way dead heat at Detroit's fair grounds.

All three winners were far back most of the way, negotiating the seven furlongs in 1:23 2/5 and placing a length and a half in front of Bill Sickle.

Rain held the crowd down to 25,386 fans who wagered \$2,503,204 on the eight-race card.

A crowd of 19,746 turned out at Suffolk Downs to see C. E. Ruff's Mintlock lead most of the way to head Defense by a nose in a photo finish in the seventh running of the \$5000 added Plymouth Rock handicap.

ECUDOREAN STAR GETS TENNIS BYE

Detroit, June 10.—(U.P.)—Francisco (Pancho) Segura, of Ecuador, third ranking tennis player in the nation and seeded No. 1 in the National Clay Courts championships opening Monday at the Detroit Tennis club, drew a bye in the first round as news was received today that Lieut. Seymour Greenberg, Chicago, 1943 champion, will not defend his crown.

The colorful Ecuadorian who uses both hands to drive a terrifically hard forehand will be playing here for the first time. In 41 recognized matches last year, he won 38 and lost three—including one—to Greenberg in the Southampton Round Robin tournament last August.

BYRD MAINTAINS LEAD AT DETROIT; CRAIG WOOD NEXT

Philadelphia, June 10.—(U.P.)—Sammy Byrd, of Detroit, found a rain-drenched Torredale-Frankford country club no handicap today, maintaining a blistering par-shattering pace to continue his lead through the third round of the \$17,500 Inquirer war bond invitation tournament.

The former major league baseball star toured the course in 34 and returned in 35 to register a two-under-par 69. The performance marked Byrd's third consecutive par-busting feat and gave him an over-all 202 to pace a field of the country's best golfers. Byrd enters the final round of play tomorrow with a seven-stroke margin over his nearest competitor.

Trailing the Plum Hollow club professional was Craig Wood, Mamaroneck, N. Y., duration U. S. open champion. Wood retained his runner-up spot by posting a 73 for a three-day total of 209, but lost ground over the three-stroke margin which separated him from Byrd yesterday.

Byron Nelson, Toledo, Ohio, tournament co-favorite, and Sgt. E. J. Harrison, U. S. Army, Little Rock, Ark., were deadlocked for third place with cards of 210.
