BEAVERS DIVIDE  
WITH ANGELS TO  
CAPTURE SERIES

Portland Wins First, 2-1 But  
Loses Nightcap, 3-2; Play  
Oaks This Week.

The league leading Portland Beavers split a double-header with the Los Angeles Angels Monday night, winning the opener 2-1, then dropping the nightcap, 3-2, in the only games in the circuit.

The Angel pitchers made it tough going for the Beavers. Tepler yielding only four hits in the opener. Comellas allowed five hits as the Angels won the second game. Portland took four contests of the seven game series.

The Beavers play host to the Oakland A's this week in the northwest, and are expecting trouble from Dolph Camilli's unpredictable ballplayers, now in seventh place. Last week the Oaks came from behind to tie their series from the second place Seattle Rainiers, 4-3, after splitting a double-header Sunday with a 4-2 defeat in the opener and winning the nightcap, 2-1.

The third-place San Francisco Seals, only a half-game ahead of Hollywood and San Diego, dropped their series with the Solons, cellar champions from Sacramento, losing five and winning two. The Solons ran away with the Sunday double feature, winning 9-4 and 11-1.

San Francisco will entertain San Diego this week in a tussle which continues to draw attention to the tightly-grouped league leaders.

San Diego won its series with Hollywood, 5 to 2, splitting the twin bill with the Padres taking the opener 7-1 and dropping the second game, 7-4.

Sacramento goes to Hollywood this week and Los Angeles moves on to Seattle from Portland in its drive to get back to the lead position.

The Angels, who played Portland in both events of Sunday's double-header, 3-1 and 9-1.

Local baseball powers convened last night in the chamber of commerce offices to map future strategy and schedule the Medford-Camp White league play-offs.

Camp White Athletic and Recreation Officer Lt. Charles E. White announced to the meeting that a third team, the P-W Guard company, had been forced to withdraw, which left the league with three teams, all tied for first place. These, the officer stated, are the Station Hospital, WPRC and the Craters.

A single round-robin loop was set for the play-offs, which brings the rival WPRC "Yanks" and Station Hospital together for the first game Sunday, June 18.

Playing the nightcap of the first double header of this year at the Medford park are the Central Point and Crater nines, following the WPRC-Station Hospital clash.

Billy Hulen Says:

Tornado To Use  
'T' Formation;  
Coach Convinced

Ten days ago Al Simpson, head coach-elect of Medford high school, was undecided as to the offensive system the Black Tornado gridiron machine would employ next autumn.

He leaned strongly toward the "Y," which he installed with much success at Ashland last season, but because of certain weaknesses in that method of attack, notably at the flanks, his mind was not made up. He wanted a system with more flexibility and versatility.

That system he found last week at Utah State college at Logan, where he attended the football coaching school conducted by Clark Shaughnessy, head mentor at the University of Pittsburgh and the nation's number one disciple of the "T" formation.

Medford, next season, will pour the "T" at its eight (maybe nine) football foes.

"We will definitely use the 'T,'" the new coach said. "I had always liked it and wanted to use it, but until having it thoroughly explained and analyzed by Shaughnessy I was afraid to take a chance because of my lack of knowledge concerning the blocking assignments and intricacies of the backfield maneuvers."

"After hearing Shaughnessy lecture and diagram plays for 16 hours, however, I am convinced I learned enough to give it to the boys and make it work."

Simpson is rightfully very enthusiastic over the "T" for Shaughnessy is a masterful lecturer who makes every point crystal clear. Even this writer, who attended the classes, believes he now knows a tiny bit about the system. And, Shaughnessy is so sold on the thing it is a religion with him. His intense feeling couldn't help but sway all who attended his clinic.

Simpson plans to not entirely scrap the "Y," which can generate a tremendous amount of straight-ahead power. He will use it on occasions. But, it can be assured, the Tornado will be at least 99 and ninety-nine one-

Seattle, June 13—(U.P.)—Clarence "Pants" Rowland, president of the Pacific Coast Baseball league, today fined Manager Owen of the Portland Beavers and Catcher Eddie Fernandez of the Los Angeles Angels \$50 each for their actions at Portland last Friday night.

LITWHILER DENIES  
SEEKING COMMISSH

St. Louis, June 13—(U.P.)—Outfielder Danny Litwhiler of the St. Louis Cardinals said today he could not understand how reports that he was seeking a navy commission got around, particularly in view of a recent 2-A classification given him by his draft board at Philadelphia.

Litwhiler was accepted by the navy last April but was reclassified as an essential industry employee by the board which said he was engaged in work "contributing to the public welfare, health and interest."

Probably the most athletically-famous person at the school was "Cat" Thompson, all-time all-American basketball player who performed for the Montana State Bobcats in the late 1920's. TENTATIVE DATES  
SET FOR HUNTING  
SEASONS IN STATE

Attorney Kenneth G. Denman returned to Medford Sunday from Portland where he attended the meeting of the state game commission at which tentative dates were set for the 1944 hunting seasons. The dates are subject to revision at a meeting June 24.

Denman, who was appointed a member of the commission on a pro-tem basis by Governor Earl Snell, to serve until the return of Kenneth Martin of Grants Pass, now in the navy, said the following tentative dates were set:

Pheasant season—Oct. 14 to Nov. 12, both dates inclusive, in Jackson, Josephine and Douglas counties among others, with the bag limit set at four birds in any one day and not more than eight in any seven days, one hen allowed in the total bag.

Quail—Same open season as pheasants, with not more than 10 birds in possession at any one time.

Denman said the commission decided to stop the killing of doe deer in Klamath and Lake counties for one year after hearing many complaints that mule deer herds are threatened with extinction. Last year, he said, hunters reported bagging 3889 does.

The buck deer season will be from Oct. 1 to Oct. 31, both dates inclusive.
