California Medics Quickly Quelled In AMA Revolt

Chicago, June 14.—(U.P.)—A revolt by the California delegation against leadership of the American Medical association was overwhelmingly quelled today at the 94th meeting of the association. The California delegation of eight offered a resolution in executive session of the house of delegates which asked that Dr. Morris Fishbein be dismissed as editor of the American Medical Association Journal and that Dr. Olin West be retired as secretary and general manager of the association.

The vote was 144 against the resolution and nine for it. Earlier Dr. Walter Kempner, professor of medicine at Duke university, explained to delegates how a diet of fruit juices, rice, fruit and sugar has proved beneficial in the treatment of kidney disease and high blood pressure.
