14 ALLIED TRANSPORTS SUNK, IS GERMAN CLAIM

London, June 15—(U.P.)—The German high command said today that the battle in Normandy is approaching its climax and claimed that Nazi bombers sunk or damaged 14 Allied transports totaling 101,000 tons along with two destroyers last night.

"The battle in Normandy is increasing in violence from day to day," the Berlin communique said. "The enemy who in the first few days of the invasion had aimed at getting a foothold on the coast now is trying to widen his bridgehead to all sides."

UNEMPLOYMENT SHOWS SIGNS OF INCREASING

Washington, June 15—(U.P.)—Unemployment is still at a low ebb but is beginning to show signs of rising as war production cutbacks begin, Federal Security Commissioner Paul V. McNutt reported today.

He said that the number of persons receiving unemployment insurance—a rough and ready guide to unemployment trends—increased eight per cent in March over February.

U-BOAT POPS UP, SHELLS TRAWLER OFF NEW ENGLAND

Boston, June 15—(U.P.)—The first appearance of a German submarine off the north Atlantic fishing banks in two years was disclosed officially today with the arrival in port of a fishing trawler crippled by gunfire. There were no casualties.

During a press interview held with the 27-man crew, the first naval district said it was the first time in two years a German submarine had been sighted off the northeastern fishing banks.

The line-trawler Lark was subjected to seven salvos from a deck cannon and then raked with machinegun fire. Capt. James L. Abbott, 35, Dorchester, Mass., said. The submarine raised from the sea while his ship was being moved from one fishing ground to another. There was a full moon.

Capt. Abbott was in the pilot house and saw it on the starboard quarter.

"I summoned all the men who were sleeping and they came tumbling up on deck," he said. The crew except for Capt. Abbott and the cook abandoned the trawler at once. The submarine then sprayed her with machine gun bullets and moved swiftly away.

"A short time later the submarine again swung into view

and started to shell my ship," Abbott said. "It was only about 100 feet away at the time."

The shelling continued for about 15 minutes.

Las Vegas, Nev., June 15—(U.P.)—A blackmarket gasoline ring which allegedly operated in southern Nevada and southern California was smashed with the arrest here of a man and his wife, Las Vegas police said today.

WOMEN SNIPERS TO BE INTERNED

London, June 15—(U.P.)—The status of a group of civilian women caught sniping at allied soldiers in France was settled today by a government order directing that they be interned as enemy aliens.

A home office spokesman said enemy women captured in uniform would be treated as prisoners of war, but others taken by the allied troops would be interned.

The first woman captive, Myra, a 29-year-old Pole accused of sniping, probably will be sent to the Isle of Man where many other enemy aliens are being held, the spokesman said.
