

GRANGE CONDUCTS MEMORIAL RITES AT STATE MEET

Large Class Initiated in Sixth Degree; Resolution Condemns Power Lobby.

Grants Pass, June 16—Memorial services open to the public and conducted by the state chaplain were held at the high school auditorium Thursday afternoon, followed by exemplification of the juvenile degree.

One of the largest classes in recent years was initiated into the Sixth degree, the state convention degree, at impressive ceremonies last night.

Today will see the closing activities of the five day convention with the installation of officers highlighting the day's program.

A fight for control of natural resources is being waged between public and private enterprise, Dr. Paul J. Raver, Bonneville administrator, declared in an open meeting at the State Grange session here Thursday afternoon.

"Our objective is not to destroy free private enterprise but to provide a great public tool for new opportunities for free enterprise in every field," he stated.

The Grange in a resolution Wednesday night condemned and protested "the obstructive activities of the private power company lobby" and urged members of Congress fighting bills to stand fast in their determination to continue the established policy of the government with respect to transmission of power.

A copy of the resolution was wired to Senator Guy Cordon and to Representative John E. Rankin, Mississippi, who has placed a leading role in the fight for public power development in the Northwest.

The Grange also expressed its opposition to a proposal embodied in the flood control bill which would give to the War department control over irrigation and power development in dams constructed by the department in the Central Valley project of California.

The Grange favored the establishment of county child guidance clinics to be financed in the manner of the Smith-Hughes educational units as a means of combating juvenile delinquency.

Control or eradication of the plant, furze or gorse, from the coastal areas was asked.

The session requested the State Game commission to take immediate action to relieve serious range conditions resulting from large increases of antelope herds in the northern part of Lake county.

The Grange recommended return to government by law in a resolution passed at its session late Wednesday. "It is becoming more apparent each day that the present administration is conducting government by directives and orders," the resolution stated.

The convention asked its legislative committee to draft legislation for the next legislative session to decrease the number of Chinese pheasants in Malheur county.

Result of the run-off elections were George Murphy, assistant steward; Hazel Lewis, Ceres; Lucy Woodward, lady assistant steward.

C. H. Brooks, Josephine county Pomona master, was elected president of the state Pomona Masters association Thursday night to succeed Erle Parker, Malheur.

Shirley Buck, Clackamas Pomona was named vice-president; W. O. Patterson, Douglas, secretary.

Brooks has been Pomona master here for the past three years.

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FATHER BLACK TO LEAVE HERE FOR PORTLAND PARISH

21-Year Medford Service to End July 15 — Father Henry Orth Is Successor.

The Rev. Father Francis W. Black, pastor of the Sacred Heart Catholic church here for the past 21 years, has been appointed pastor of the Church of the Immaculate Heart in Portland and will report there on the third Sunday in July.

Father Black will be succeeded by Father Henry Orth, present pastor of the Catholic church in St. Paul, Ore. The appointments were made by Edward D. Howard of Portland, archbishop for western Oregon.

Another appointment of interest to members of the Sacred Heart parish here is that of Father Augustine A. Meyer to become pastor of St. Anne's Catholic church in Grants Pass.

Father Meyer, who has been pastor of the Catholic church in Newberg for the past two years, served for five years here as assistant pastor under Father Black. He left Medford in June of 1942 for the Newberg pastorate.

To Old Parish

The transfer of Father Black will send him back to the parish where he served two years as assistant pastor following his ordination. The parish is one of the oldest and largest in Portland, with almost 600 families. The church is located at North Williams avenue and Stanton street.

Taking a keen interest in civic affairs and programs for the betterment of the community, Father Black made many friends both in and out of the Catholic congregation during his long service here. They will rejoice at his receiving the fine appointment to Church of the Immaculate Heart though the community is losing one of its outstanding members.

Father Black, who originally came here for his health, which improved so much he was able to accept the local pastorate, said he had enjoyed his service in Medford a great deal and that it would not be easy to leave his congregation and many Protestant friends.

New York, June 16—(UP)—Stocks advanced to new highs since October 26, 1939, today on the heaviest volume in more than a year and the valuation of all listed shares was lifted by \$500,000,000.

Highest grade leadership featured the advance, United States Steel, top ranking industrial, made a new high on a gain of more than a point. New highs were made by such leaders as Chrysler, General Electric, Westinghouse Electric, Du Pont, American Tobacco B, Standard Oil (N. J.), Goodrich, Goodyear, Firestone, U. S. Rubber and Montgomery Ward.

Early in the session, the list was running at a 3,000,000-share rate as the outside public rushed to get into the market.

30 KILLED IN HAWAII BLASTS

Pearl Harbor, June 16—(UP)—The death toll from two ammunition explosions in Pearl Harbor within the last month was set today at 30 killed, with 107 men missing, and 380 injured.

The first blast occurred May 21 and spread fire through landing craft moored in the anchorage area where many army, navy, and coast guard personnel and civilians either were at work or stationed.

The second was on June 11 when ammunition being unloaded on Oahu exploded from an undetermined cause.

An earlier report of the May 21 explosion said only that several landing craft were destroyed. The preliminary report made yesterday to Admiral Chester Nimitz by Rear Admiral J. F. Shaford, head of the inquiry board, disclosed that 27 service men were killed, 100 others were missing and 380, including 19 civilians, were injured.

Names of casualties were not revealed pending notification of next of kin.

Cpl. E. M. Madden Helps in Repair Damaged Planes

An VIII Air Force Service Command Station, England—The swift, efficient repair of Allied warplanes that return from missions over Nazi-occupied Europe with flak damage is accomplished by field mobile repair units—ground crew specialists like Corporal E. M. Madden, 22, of Medford.

These field repair crews work on battle-scarred aircraft at the scene of the forced landing, employing mobile equipment in the task. "We get them back in the air as soon as possible," declared Corporal Madden when interviewed recently, "and they are in tip-top combat condition too!"

The son of Mr. and Mrs. E. S. Madden, Route No. 4, box No. 338, Medford, Corporal Madden joined the armed forces on June 20, 1942, at Medford, and received basic training at Sheppard Field, Texas. He later attended the Boeing Aircraft Mechanics School, Seattle, Washington, and left for overseas duty in August, 1943.

Prior to his enlistment, Corporal Madden was employed as a clerk for the Army Transport Service.
