GIANTS WIN AND
YANKEES LOSE TO
REVERSE PATTERN

Ottmen Leave on Road Trip
With Fine Record; Yanks
Return in Sixth Place.

New York, June 16.—(U.P.)—The New York Yankees returned home today and the New York Giants left, but aside from the fact that both teams walked through Penn station carrying luggage, there were no similarities.

It has been a long time since the National League rosters of the world's largest city would boast to their brethren American League fans about anything, but today was the day. The Giants, a last place club a season ago, departed for Boston with a highly successful home stand in the record books. In the 19 games played at the polo grounds the Giants won 12 and moved from sixth place in National League standings to third with a home stand average of .632.

On the other hand, the Yankees, a first place club last season, left home in their accustomed spot, at the top of the league, and proceeded to lost 15 of their 21 contests for an average of .286 and a drop to sixth place.

Both teams followed suit yesterday, the Giants winning and the Yankees losing. The Giant victory was particularly sweet because it was a 9-2 shellacking of their hated rivals, the Brooklyn Dodgers. Manager Mel Ott eluded his 17th homer of the season.

Southpaw Wins
The Washington Senators were responsible for the Yanks losing their eighth game in their last

nine starts. Mickey Haefner, a left handed knuckleballer, held the champions to seven hits and recorded a 3-2 triumph.

Elsewhere in the American League, the Boston Red Sox stretched their winning streak to nine games by beating the Philadelphia Athletics, 5-1.

In the only other game scheduled the Cleveland Indians edged the Detroit Tigers 3-2 in 13 innings.

In the National League the Pittsburgh Pirates hiked their second place lead with a 1-0 edge over the Cincinnati Reds.

In the only other senior circuit contest scheduled the Philadelphia Phillies eked out a 5-4 win over the Boston Braves.

BEAVERS OUSTED
FROM LOOP LEAD

The San Francisco Seals today regained sole possession of first place in the Pacific Coast league when Pitcher Bill Werle hurled the club to a 6-1 victory, its third in a row, over the fifth place San Diego Padres.

The Portland Beavers, one step below the Seals, took a 17-2 shellacking from the Oakland A's. Dolph Camilli and Les Scarcella lost their third straight game. The fourth place Hollywood Stars clubbed out a 9-1 triumph over the cellar Sacramento Solons for a 2-1 series lead, while the Los Angeles Angels hammered their third win from the Seattle Rainiers by a score of 9 to 2.

Les Scarcella clipped the Beavers for three runs, including a double and a home run while Camilli finished the slaughter by coming up with two home runs. Five Portland pitchers yielded 22 base hits to the Oaks.

ACHIU TROUNCES
WAGNER IN WILD
WRESTLING BRAWL

The next time "Gorgeous George" Wagner wrestles Walter "Sneeze" Achiu, he'll probably be more careful how he treats the squat, methodical Chinese master of jiu-jitsu.

In last night's main event, with the largest crowd of the year on hand, Wagner thought he was getting along in fine style. He had taken one fall from Achiu with a body slam and press, after 24 minutes of hammer and tongs mat work, and appeared on the way to battering the Chinaman into submission for another tumble, which would have ended the fight.

Achiu could stand just so much of the Wagner brand of dirt, however, and suddenly he exploded. He hammered Wagner around the ring with right hands to the head and kicked him out through the ropes.

He followed "Gorgeous George" to the plank and continued to pound the daylight out of him while the crowd went wild. Nobody could see clearly, but it is believed that Achiu operated on the Wagner head with some sort of a jiu-jitsu hold, for Wagner was all through for the evening when Achiu finally returned to the ring.

Referee Earl Yoakley counted Wagner out, giving Achiu the fall. And, when the bell rang for the third tumble "Gorgeous George" was still unable to climb back in the ring. Thus, the match went to Achiu, two falls to one.

The Pete Belcastro-Herb Parks middle event "stole the show." It was the wildest brawl yet seen in the local arena, with Parks taking the first fall in the second round with three terrific sonenbergs and a press after Belcastro had attacked him before the bell rang.

In the third round Belcastro evened the match with a series of punches to the head and body, followed by a press. The blood flowed freely from Pete's nose as the two simply stood and slugged it out for the duration of the match.

Harold (Buck) Davidson grabbed the lone fall in his match with Silent Ratan. He took it in the second round with a body press, after belting the dead mute to the canvas with knees and fists.

GHEZZI CARDS 67
TO TAKE LEAD IN
RED CROSS MEET

New Rochelle, N. Y., June 16.—(U.P.)—Sgt. Vic Ghezzi, one of the fairway front runners before he teed off in a grimmer game, held a two stroke lead over the field as it went off on the second round of the New York Red Cross \$10,000 open golf tournament at Wykagyl country club today.

Ghezzi, former Deal, N. J., pro now stationed at Atlantic City, took his first look at the hilly Wykagyl layout yesterday as the tourney opened, and it was a good inspection. Without a practice round he went out in par 37 and then, hitting powerful wood shots, blistered home over the back nine with five birdies and four pars for a 30 and an 18-hole 67.

That allowed the lumbering soldier to take a two-stroke lead over Big Byron Nelson of Toledo, O., one of the top-heavy favorites to cop the 72 hole medal play tourney, who had, until Vic canned his last putt, led with a 38-33—69, three under par.

In third place with 70's came two darkhorse entrants, Frank Strazza of Greenwich, Conn., and Ziggy Mellon of Bronxville, N. Y. Another stroke away was a six man delegation headed by Lantern-jawed Jug McSpaden of Philadelphia, leading money winner of the winter circuit. Included in this group were Gene Sarazen, the Darien, Conn., country squire; Bill Kaiser of Louisville, Ky.; Bud Lewis, Philadelphia; Mike Turnesa of White Plains, N. Y., and Andy Lapola of Wayne, N. J.

Shooting even par 72, and still within striking distance, were Jimmy Johnson, Detroit; Tony Penna, Dayton, O.; Morris Gravatt, Williamsport, Pa.; Sal D. Buono, Larchmont; Al Collins, Scarborough, N. Y., and Jerry Desio, White Plains, N. Y.

HANK ARMSTRONG
BELTS OUT DAVIS
IN SECOND ROUND

'Bummy' Down Four Times
Before Ref Stops Fight—
Crowd Cheers Lustily.

New York, June 16.—(U.P.)—Ancient Henry Armstrong 1st-ed. out perhaps the most amazing come-back victory in the history of Madison Square Garden last night when his surprisingly explosive punches dynamited Young Al "Bummy" Davis to the canvas four times enroute to a technical knockout victory in the second round.

Armstrong used this quick knockout as a boomerang against Davis, the Brooklyn kyo artist who had belted out Lightweight Champion Bob Montgomery in 63 seconds.

The crowd of 16,084 who paid a gate of \$58,822 cheered deliriously when 31-year-old Armstrong began smashing his 24-year-old opponent into helplessness. And they shook the rafters when Referee Frankie Fullam stopped the bout at 59 seconds of the second round.

There was no need for a count over blood-smeared Bummy, as he lay face down on the canvas.

Goes Through Ropes
Davis made the mistake of letting Armstrong get in close in the first round and kept smashing his head from side to side. After about two minutes of the first session, Armstrong landed a smashing right hook that knocked Bummy through the ropes.

Davis returned to the ring at the count of eight, and quickly was smashed to the canvas with a left hook.

With an arm entwined about the ropes, Davis half rose and then fell back to one knee, but regained his feet at the count of nine. Armstrong was after him. But the bell sounded, ending the round.

In the second session, Armstrong rushed out of his corner and began battering Davis about the ring. He floored him for a count of nine in Davis' own corner, and when Bummy rose, Armstrong motioned for the referee to stop it. Referee Fullam motioned Armstrong on. A steaming right hook caught

Davis on the chin and knocked him far back on his heels, from where he pitched forward on his face.

Both fighters weighed 141½ pounds. This victory, the 22nd knockout on Armstrong's comeback, won for Henry a garden fight in August, probably against Tippy Larkin, New Jersey welterweight.

SOLONS WIN NEW
SUITS WITH HIT

Hollywood, June 16.—(U.P.)—The Sacramento Solons today were being measured for new uniforms as a result of a long double by Infielder Jack Suyar in last night's Hollywood-Sacramento PCL game.

Big Bill Freelove, professional football magnate, promised the first player to hit a ball against Big Bill's sign in left-center field at Gilmore Park a \$25 war bond.

But yesterday, Big Bill went one better. He promised that the first Solon who could hit the sign board would win a whole set of new uniforms for the cellar-dwelling Seals.

And last night, Big Bill kept his promise and presented Manager Earl Sheeley a check for the outfits.
