GLIDER STOWAWAY JOINS IN INVASION FOR THREE DAYS

Pittsburgh Private Hides In Machine Destined For Trip To Cherbourg Sector

Airborne Troop Carrier Base, England, June 16—(U.P.)—Pvt. Charles E. Schmeltz, 20, of Pittsburgh, Pa., who hid in the tail of a glider and became the first invasion stowaway, has returned to England after three days of hard fighting on the Cherbourg peninsula alongside crack American airborne troops.

Interviewed in a guardhouse, where he is awaiting probable court-martial for being AWOL from his own outfit, Schmeltz, who does not look more than 17, and is of slight build, admitted he stowed away because he wanted to get into the fight.

"I figured there were a lot of guys over there who had more to lose than I had," he said.

Hid In Tail

Schmeltz boarded the glider in the night and hid in the tail. He carried a machine gun, a helmet, two bars of chocolate, and a trench shovel. He remained in the tail until next morning when, after 20 minutes, he rapped on the door and the airborne troops let him out.

"They made me feel right at home," Schmeltz said. "They gave me K-rations. The second lieutenant in charge gave me pills and they made me feel better."

"I knew when we were over France because I could feel the flak and machine-gun fire shake the glider. We landed about a hundred yards from the enemy lines, and it was a good thing I got out of that tail because it tore off when we came down."

Schmeltz and the airborne unit advanced four miles. Officers told them they were on top of the line.

Sleep In Trench

"They said we had to begin digging," Schmeltz said. "I have been learning a lot about the infantry from those guys who were veterans from Sicily and Italy. We slept that night in trenches, coughing and sneezing, and listening to the gunfire ahead. It was then that I longed for a bunk like the one I had left behind."

"The next morning we needed food and 300 yards in front of our line lay a parapack dropped for volunteers so I figured I didn't have much to lose, so with two other fellows went out and got the food."

The next day the unit moved up and Schmeltz heard the heavy battle but did not see it.

FRENCH VILLAGE IS GHOST TOWN AFTER BARRAGE

British Patrol Enters Tilly-Sur-Seulles to Find All Shattered by Huge Guns.

With the British in Normandy, June 16—(U.P.)—British armored patrols entered Tilly-Sur-Seulles today and found it a ghost town, shattered and smoking under the bright blue sky of the first fine day since the invasion.

Tilly had been smashed by a mighty "Monty barrage" of hundreds of big guns, stacked hub to hub in a great square of tanks—a new offensive formation adopted in this roaring, surging battle for vital ground around the German defense hub of Caen.

The barrages are named for Gen. Sir Montgomery.

One reason the Army has to be in better physical condition than in previous wars is that today 25 miles, instead of 13, is considered a day's hike with pack.

CHERBOURG BLOWN UP IS NORWEGIAN REPORT

London, June 16—(U.P.)—Radio France at Algiers quoted the Norwegian news agency today that the Germans had blown up port installations at Cherbourg.

At the British port he helped unload casualties from the ship and then made his way back to his own camp where he promptly was escorted to the guard house.

Schmeltz previously tried to enlist in the navy and coast guards but was rejected.

"I wanted to go to war ever since the Spanish war. Well, I went," he said.

Only Rubble Left

Allied aviation started the destruction of Tilly. Then Montgomery moved up the tanks, which formed big hollow square to enclose and protect the artillery. When the big guns were through, no German defense of Tilly was possible. It was nothing but a heap of smouldering rubble in which no German—or tarry-

ing Frenchman—could have survived.

Today the tanks confirmed that the Germans had fled.
