Your Health and Its Care

MRS. WISEACRE IN QUEST OF A DOCTOR

I am arthritic and recently sent for your booklet "The Rheumatic Ills" writes Mrs. Wiseacre, devising her own title for my booklet, perhaps as a gentle rebuke to me for the title I gave it—"The Ills Called Rheumatism". It was interesting but... I tried to find a doctor who gives the vitamin D treatment you described. I made appointments with two doctors and found neither used the method...

One doctor wanted to remove my tonsils. The second said that was unnecessary and wanted to give me salicylates. They were both true to form in regard to the tonsils.

Can you tell me how to find a Dr. here in... who gives the vitamin D treatment? Also, do you believe the taking of such products as... vitamin and mineral foods or... products without a Dr.'s advice is safe? The... products are manufactured by chemists. I have talked with a nutritionist of the company, but she cannot tell me where I can read up on the quality or effectiveness of the products, except for her own literature. How should I go about getting information on such products? (Signed...)

In my personal reply I told the correspondent I feared she was taking a wrong course. I advised her to choose a doctor, describe her complaint to the doctor in her own words (say lameness, pain, stiffness in this joint or that region, not "arthritis" for instance) and leave it entirely to the doctor to make his own diagnosis and prescribe or apply the treatment the doctor deems advisable or "indicated". I advised her that it is much better to leave to the doctor the prescription of any vitamins or minerals if such supplements are "indicated".

This tendency of the Wiseacres to attempt to impress the practitioners in the home community or, worse, to intimidate them, is inimical to the welfare of the Wiseacres—and besides it is a gratuitous waste of the time of the doctor.

Take me, for example. Not that I know as much as a Wiseacre, being just a plodding country doctor who never made the front page except by sheer accident, but when I consult a doctor even if he prescribes a book of castor oil or a basal metabolism measurement or plate of mashed potatoes I do not despise all of them and know how I despise all of them—and take my medicine like a good little boy. If I didn't give the doctor that much confidence I'd be a ninnhammer to consult him in the first place.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS
Lugol's Solution
What is the difference between Lugol's solution and iodine. (J. B. G.)
Answer—Lugol's solution is virtually the same as Tincture of Iodine, except that the iodine and potassium iodide are dissolved in water in Lugol's solution, in alcohol in Tincture of Iodine.

Harelip
Is harelip hereditary? Fine young woman has Ben told that if she marries her children will have harelip. We'll be grateful for any light on the question. (Mrs. L. E. G.)
Answer—It is not hereditary. Harelip may occur in any family, as a congenital development defect, regardless of whether it has occurred before in the family.

Let me suggest that you add the desired amount of honey just before placing your hobo style coffee on the fire. Result, ammonia (food), doctor (drink), or just time coffee, whichever is the more appropriate expression. If you print this, I bet hundreds of readers will write their thanks. (C. E.)

JEOP SHOP OPENS AT JUNIOR HIGH MONDAY MORNING

Junior Red Cross Jeep Shop opens Monday at 9 a. m. in the Junior high school and will be open Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday mornings from 9 to noon until the middle of August.

Both boys and girls are welcome. Mrs. James Medley, captain of the Jeep Crews, will be in charge. Mrs. William Cooney, with Miss Vera Humphrey, chairman of Junior Red Cross, have been concerned with lumber, patterns and models for the past week as output of the shop will be mainly in wood work.

Chief project of the shop will be production of miniature game kits, nine games to fit into a box to be sent to prisoners of war camps to our own prisoners overseas.

Hospital bed tables, lap boards, recreation games for day rooms, are on the summer quota also. Since more of the armed forces than ever before are overseas, the juniors will make Christmas tree decorations and tray favors for both able-bodied men, for their Christmas mess halls, and for hospitals on both fronts.

Parents are urged to help the children to accomplish this by helping in the shop where many mothers are needed daily for supervision and in making it possible for the children to volunteer so many work hours a week in the Jeep Shops.

Each Jeep should bring his own pencil, a magazine, paints if possible, crayons, an empty clean can and a fruit jar to make ash trays and flower vases with, and Christmas cards, tinsel, colored paper, sand paper, rulers or large posters, paste or ribbons and string.

Miss Humphrey announces that the headquarters shop will be open daily from noon until five o'clock and all day Saturday. The Hobby Shop will open again July 1 on the east side.

GRANGE APPROVES CASCADE HIGHWAY ROAD FROM COAST

Grants Pass, June 17.—(U.P.)—Construction of a trans-Cascade highway and a road from the southern Oregon coast to the interior after the war was asked Thursday in a resolution by the Oregon State Grange.

The trans-Cascade highway would follow the Clackamas river and Oak Grove fork, cutting from Estacada to Madras. The road to the coast would connect Grants Pass and Medford with the Coast highway, the route following Rogue river most of the distance.

The Grange also went on record against food price subsidies. Closing its five-day session, the Grange elected C. H. Brooks, Josephine county Pomona, president of the Pomona Masters association. Shirley Buck, Clackamas, was elected vice-president, and W. O. Patterson, Douglas, secretary.

New chairman of the State Grange home economic committee is Mrs. Mildred Hinrichs, Hood River.

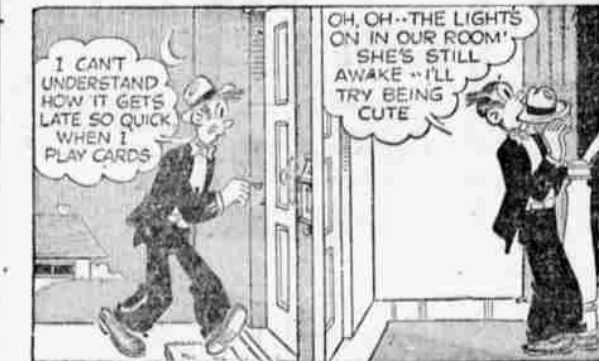
