JAKUCKI BLANKS DETROIT, BROWNS IN 2-GAME LEAD

Mackmen and Yankees Divide; Cubs and Dodgers Win Close Ones.

New York, June 17—(U.P.)—Sigmund Jakucki, hefty blond right-hander for the St. Louis Browns, whose only previous baseball experience was in the army and with semi-pro teams in Hawaii, won his fourth and best game of the season today, shutting out the Tigers 5 to 0 at Detroit.

Jakucki, discharged from the army after seven years service which included duty on the Yangtze river in China, has lost only one game thus far.

His chief offensive support came from Mark Christman, who hit a three-run homer in the sixth inning to give him sufficient margin.

The victory increased the Browns' lead in the American league race to two full games. The New York Yankees split a double-header with the Philadelphia Athletics, winning the opener 2 to 1 on a five-hit pitching job by Allyn Donald, who went the route for the first time since May 14. A four-run rally in the seventh, highlighted by triples off the bats of Jo Jo White and Hayes gave the A's the second game 5 to 3.

In the National league the Boston Braves and the New York Giants shared a double bill. Al Javery pitched a four-hitter to take the opener, 5-1, the Giant's only run coming when Manager Mel Ott hit his eighteenth homer of the year. The blow equalled Ott's total home run production of last year. The second game went to the Giants by the narrow margin of a single run, 6-5.

The Brooklyn Dodgers came all the way from behind in the last inning at Philadelphia to score four runs and edge the Phillies, 4-3. Whit Wyatt was credited with his first win of the year.

The Chicago Cubs nosed out the Cincinnati Reds 2-1 with Claude Passeau spacing nine hits for the victory.

WOMEN'S WESTERN OPENS TOMORROW

Chicago, June 17—(U.P.)—The Women's Western Golf association tonight announced a field of 100 women golfers who will tee off Monday for qualifying rounds on the fifteenth annual open championship.

Foremost among the entrants were Lt. Patty Berg, Minneapolis, of the Marine corps women's reserves, and Dorothy Kirby, Atlanta. Miss Berg, defending titlist, defeated Miss Kirby on the 36th hole of the final round in last year's tournament.

Competition will continue through Saturday, June 24, when the survivors play the 18-hole championship round.

NELSON LEADS IN RED CROSS OPEN

New Rochelle, N. Y., June 17 (U.P.)—Big Byron Nelson of Toledo, the man who pours it on when the chips are down, did it again today on the semi-final round of the Red Cross open at Wykagyl Country club when he fired a six-under-par 68 for a blistering 54-hole total of 204.

That put Nelson five big strokes ahead of his closest competitor, Sgt. Vic Ghezzi of Atlantic City, N. J., with only 18 holes to go over this hilly course tomorrow in the \$10,000 scramble.

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CRATERS TO MEET C. POINT TODAY IN SECOND GAME

First doubleheader of the season will be staged at the fairgrounds park this afternoon, with the Western Personnel Reassignment Center Yanks meeting the Station Hospital in the first battle and the Medford Craters facing Central Point in the nightcap. The opening tussle will begin at 1 o'clock sharp.

TRY TO REMATCH PARKS AND PETE

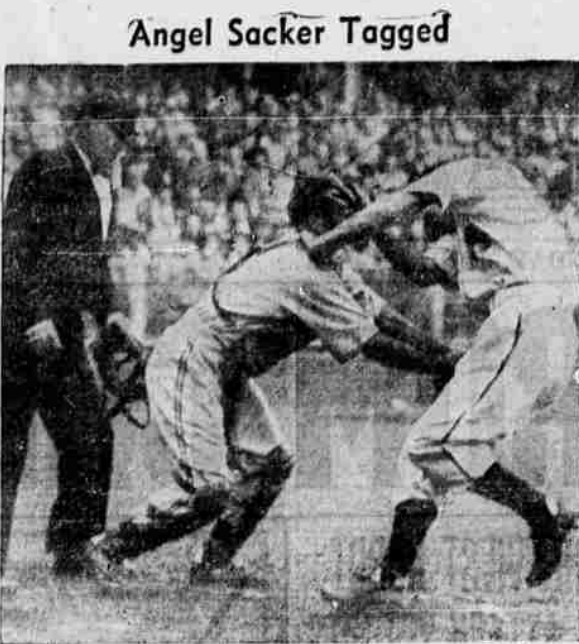

MISS MAY BUNDY COPS HER FIRST NET TITLE TOGA

Detroit, June 17—(U.P.)—Dorothy May Bundy, chunky and hard-hitting Santa Monica star, won her first national singles crown today when she defeated Mary Arnold, Los Angeles, 7-5, 6-4, in a hard-fought final of the national clay courts tennis tournament.

Miss Bundy, daughter of Tom and May Sutton Bundy, themselves tennis champions many years ago, possessed too many shots and too much drive for her attractive opponent and came through with decisive points at critical moments.

The 27-year-old Miss Bundy, who had previously advanced no farther than the semi-final round of the national grass court tournament, and who had been beaten many times in final matches of smaller tournaments, refused to be beaten today by the steady, accurate play of her opponent.

Using her overhead game to good advantage, she repeatedly smashed for placement points, and it was on a shot of this kind that she took the title, after Miss Arnold had several times fought back from match points.

The champion's hard drives kept Miss Arnold on the move throughout the match and set up easy points on cross-court placement.

Although Miss Arnold hung tenaciously to her smaller opponent's heels, she held the lead only once in the match—at 3-2 in the first set.

ALLIES READY TO MOVE FOOD INTO BALKAN STATES

Greece, Yugoslavia, Albania To Get Supplies When Countries Invaded.

Cairo—(U.P.)—The defeat of famine and disease, enemies as formidable as the Germans, is being planned now for the relief of the Balkans when "Zero Hour" strikes and the allies invade.

On the heels of the attacking forces will land men and supplies to feed the starving people of Greece, Yugoslavia, and Albania. The men and materials assigned to this task are already based somewhere in the desert of the Middle East—British officers and men of the allied military liaison (Balkans). Numbered in hundreds, these men are now finishing their training which was based on a flow of reports that reached them from various unobtainable sources on the situation in the Balkans.

The AML was set up in February, 1943, by Gen. Sir Henry Maitland Wilson acting on orders received from London. The aim was to create an organization that would be able to assist the Balkan countries to recover from chaos that may come after the Germans withdraw from the occupied area.

Priority to Greece

First priority in his plans was assigned to devising a scheme for the relief of Greece, hardest hit, hence hardest to relieve. AML now needs only the word that the supreme commander in the Mediterranean has launched his attack and it will be ready to go into action with him. Yugoslavian and Albanian plans are also well advanced toward completion.

AML planners have purposely made their scheme very flexible. It can be put into effect immediately, or at some distant date. It can be applied partially or completely, depending upon the nature of the invasion. No one knows the target date for the Balkan invasion and no one knows in what state of disintegration Balkan affairs will be when the day for AML to move in occurs. Will civil war be raging or will the people be grouped around a single leader?

Here are unknowns that make flexibility essential in the organization:

1. The target date for the Balkan invasion is not known.
2. The political setup in the Balkans is hazy.
3. Lack of knowledge as to what, if any, local organizations will be entrenched strong enough to lend a hand in relief work.
4. In trying to relieve inland areas of the Balkans, will AML troops have to cope with enemy guerrilla forces fighting a delaying battle?
5. Will the Germans carry out a "scorched earth" policy in the area?
6. Will purely military requirements of an operational nature hamper AML?

Shuns Politics
Whatever their politics, AML officers know that the amount of aid they will be able to give is extremely limited, held to the barest minimum necessary to avert famine and disease.

AML as an organization is strictly military—no political considerations are tolerated in meeting their problems. In fact officers joining the unit are carefully investigated to insure complete freedom from "political inclinations" detrimental to the aim of the mission. Officers who have good background knowledge of the Balkans are

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often turned down as applicants because of some connection with Balkan families who are connected with some political party. The knowledge of these men is not lost, however, as they are often called upon to advise on technical points while administrative policy is left to other disinterested officers.

While the Balkans are almost entirely a "British sphere of influence," there is some American participation in AML, especially in the supplies section. UNRRA has also lent its support to the British military organization, and its several hundred workers will be cooperating fully with AML to relieve the stricken populations.

ROSE CITY GRID FRANCHISE SOLD HENRY SANDBERG

Portland, Ore., June 17—(U.P.)—Henry J. Sandberg has purchased the Portland franchise in the American Professional Football league.

He and Bobby Rowe, former owner and operator of the Portland Pacific Coast Hockey League club who will be business manager and vice president, will leave Tuesday for a meeting of the eight team representatives at Los Angeles where final plans for the organization will be perfected.

Sandberg said he had no idea who would coach the team but there is a possibility that Glenn (Pop) Warner might coach the Portland team.

Present plans provide for most of the home games for the Seattle and Portland clubs in September and October before they go on the road. Other clubs in the league are San Francisco, Oakland, San Diego, Los Angeles, Hollywood and San Diego.

Contacts have also been made with the commissioner of National Professional Football league and some agreement may be made with the eastern circuit.

HIRE INTERPRETER

Williamsport, Pa.—(U.P.)—With nearly a dozen Spanish-speaking teammates. Manager Ray Kolp of the Williamsport Grays found himself faced with a real problem—that of either learning the language or seeking an interpreter. Honorably discharged from the Marine Corps because of a physical disability, he sought a Navy commission. Meanwhile, the Army drafted him. While stationed at Fort Bragg, N. C., his commission came through and he was released for duty as a communications officer with the Fleet Air Force.

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
