The announcement was made at a meeting of the state board of the D. A. R. held Thursday in Portland.

The Oregon flag was purchased last winter through the efforts of the two organizations. Presentation on behalf of the Oregon groups was by Mrs. R. M. Evans, former Medford resident now making her home in Philadelphia and a member of Crater Lake chapter. Mrs. Evans is public relations director for the Philadelphia Red Cross chapter.

According to Mrs. Lowry, Oregon was one of four states which did not have flags hanging in Independence Hall.
