OSTERMEUILLER IS WINNER AS BUGS SPLIT WITH CARDS

Recently Sold Hurler Flings 3-Hitter Win—A's Beat Yanks Twice.

New York, June 19.—(U.P.)—If Leo Durocher manager of the Brooklyn Dodgers, is championing at the bit today, he has several reasons, the biggest of which could be Southpaw Fred Ostermeuiller.

Ostermeuiller was waived out of the National league on May 30 in the deal which brought Goody Rosen to the Dodgers from Syracuse for Fred and Pitcher Bill Lohman. Both men refused to report to the International league club and were in turn sold, Ostermeuiller to the Pittsburgh Pirates for a reputed \$20,000, after they had waived on him at the \$7500 waiver price. Lohman went to Cincinnati.

Since reporting to Pittsburgh Ostermeuiller has pitched some ball games that the Dodgers could have used in a big way.

Yesterday Ostermeuiller gained a split for the Bucs with the league-leading St. Louis Cardinals, holding them to three hits in the second game to gain a 3-1 victory after Mort Cooper had pitched six-hit ball to win the opener, 12-2.

The New York Giants drew within a game of the second-place Pirates by winning two from the Boston Braves. Two for-run innings, the first and last, gave the Giants a 9-2 decision in the opener for Frank Seward and Cliff Melton won the nightcap, 7-1.

Philadelphia and Brooklyn split, the Dodgers giving Ed Head his third straight victory in the first, 7-3. The Phillies came back to take the finale, 6-2.

Cubs Win Harry Gumbert, sold Friday by the Cardinals to the Cincinnati Reds, demonstrated his worth to his new owners by pitching five-hit ball as the Reds defeated the Chicago Cubs, 5-2, in the first game of a twin bill. The second game ended in a 6-6 tie.

In the American league the Chicago White Sox moved from fifth to third place with a double victory over the Cleveland Indians.

The New York Yankees dropped into sixth place when they took a double trimming from the last-place Philadelphia Athletics, 4-0 and 8-6.

Detroit swept a twin bill from the league-leading St. Louis Browns, 7-3 in the first and 7-5 in the nightcap.

Washington deprived Boston of a chance to assume the league leadership by winning the second of two games, 1-0, after bowing to the Sox, 9-6, in the opener.

SEGURA VICTOR IN TENNIS TOURNAY

Detroit, June 19.—(U.P.)—Francisco (Pancho) Segura of Ecuador today held his first national clay court tennis championship.

The swarthy Segura, who uses both hands in his drives, won the singles title yesterday when he defeated hard-driving Bill Talbert of Indianapolis in four hard-fought sets, 6-3, 2-6, 7-5 and 6-3.

Segura won the title held by Lt. Seynoud Greenberg of Chicago, who was unable to defend because of his duties with the army air forces.

Segura started fast and took a 5-1 lead in the opening set as Talbert had trouble with overdrives on baseline shots and netted several chances.

Segura and Talbert teamed to win the doubles title, defeating the Detroit team of Hobart Wroblek and Hubert Manire, 6-3, 8-1, 5-7, 6-0.

The women's doubles crown went to Pauline Betz of Los Angeles and Doris Hart of Miami, who defeated Mary Arnold of Los Angeles and Catherine Wolf of Elkhart, Ind., 8-6, 6-3.

NO-HIT, NO-RUN CONTEST PITCHED

Charley Johnson of the Camp White Station hospital pitched an eight-inning no-hit, no-run game at the fairgrounds park Sunday afternoon as his team defeated the Western Personnel Reassignment Center club, 2 to 0 in the first tilt of a round-robin playoff series for the first-half championship of the Medford-Camp White circuit.

The Solons took a doubleheader yesterday from the Hollywood Stars, tied for third with Portland, 7-5 and 5-2, to edge out a series victory of four games to three. The Oaks in a 3-1, 5-2 triumph, swept all six games from the Portland Beavers.

The Los Angeles Angels, tied for fifth with the Oaks, split a doubleheader with second place Seattle, dropping the opener 3-2 but taking the nightcap 1-0 to win the series 4-2. The Seals took six games to the San Diego Padres' one following a 2-1, 3-2 victory yesterday.

Games this week send Los Angeles to Portland and San Diego to Hollywood. Sacramento will play at San Francisco while Oakland moves from Portland to Seattle.

In yesterday's opener, the Solons pounded four Hollywood Star hurlers for 15 hits. They grabbed off two runs in the first on doubles by Bill Ramsey and Al McElreath and singles by Jake Suytar and Otto Meyers.

Guy Fletcher pitched the nightcap victory, yielding five hits against the six safeties that his teammates scored against Ron Smith and Charlie Root.

Dolph Camilli made two circuit clouts, one in the fifth and another in the ninth, which went out of the lot and which was his twelfth of the season, to win the Oakland club's first game. New Rochelle, N. Y., June 19 (U.P.)—The unerring iron shots which have made Byron Nelson one of golf's highest paid professionals paid off again today—\$2,666.66 worth.

For big Byron boosted his bankroll by that much as he won the Red Cross open at Wykagyl Country club yesterday and the shot that allowed him to pick up the marbles was the same that gave him the 1939 national open title.

Nelson, the transplanted Texan from Toledo, Ohio, would seem from his final round of 71 for a 76-hole total of 275 to have won with ease. For Sgt. Vic Ghezzi was four fat blows away when the field retreated to the clubhouse. But once again it was those long irons, firing with the precision of a machine gun, that gave Nelson the big blue chips.

Cuddy Blasts Golf Bigwigs For Treatment of Newsmen

New York, June 19.—(U.P.)—It has come to my attention that the wife of a well-known newspaper man was insulted yesterday during closing play of the \$10,000 Red Cross open golf tournament at the Wykagyl Country club in New Rochelle, N. Y.

The insult happened to be a snobbish woman—apparently a social climber—who questioned the right of the newspaper man's wife to mingle with the wives of club members on the grounds that the club frauds were "ladies."

I would not mention the incident but for the fact that it's "a crying shame" and an illustration of why tournament golf is not more popular than it is. I was not at the Wykagyl club; I was sweltering at the national track and field championships. But the incident at Wykagyl forces me to blow off. It seems high time that some newspaper man tells the nation what is wrong with golf—what always has been wrong with it. That can be packed into a nutshell—the snobbishness of members of clubs where big tournaments are played.

Down through the years I have covered various tournaments and it has been my experience that the swankier the club the more the newspaper people—to say nothing of the cash customers—got kicked around. The press room or press tent usually was placed in some spot where the reporters were less likely to have contact with the club members.

And when the male members of the club were given badges to officiate in handling the gallery, a reporter had to kowtow or genuflect to get close to a green where important play was occurring. And at the club house the newspaper men were treated with the thumbs-down cordiality that might be accorded a garbage man—not that I have anything against garbage men.

This lack of democracy among social climbers who invite important tournaments to their clubs long has been a thorn in the side of the Professional Golfers' association, which includes in its membership many of the greatest guys in sports. The golf pros appreciate the press and, above all, they appreciate the customers—the golf fans—who pay their way into tournaments. But they have been taken advantage of by the country-club snobs for years, as the officious badge-wearers and their eyebrow-lifting wives alienated public and press.

I suggest now to the P. G. A. that it inform the various country clubs, before closing contracts for tournaments, that the potential customers and the potential press representatives will be human beings—not dogs.

100 ENTERED IN WOMEN'S TOURNEY

Chicago, June 19.—(U.P.)—Marlene Lt. Patty Berg, the red-haired Minneapolis golfer whose game is up when the chips are down, opened defense of her title today in the 15th annual women's golf tournament at Park Ridge Country club.

A field of 100 women, including two former champions and challengers from 19 states, teed off for the qualifying rounds this morning to determine the 32 low scorers who will open match play Tuesday. Eighteen-hole elimination rounds will continue through Friday, with the 36-hole title match scheduled for Saturday.
