

COUNTY BOURBONS MEET THURSDAY TO HEAR WALLACE

Elected members of the Jackson County Democratic Central committee will meet Thursday at 8 p. m., at Hotel Medford to elect officers for the coming two years, and to hear Lew Wallace, newly elected Democratic national committeeman for Oregon, deliver the main address.

V. D. Miller of Ashland, chairman of the county central committee, has extended an invitation to all Democrats of the valley to attend the organization meeting, whether precinct committee members or not. Miller urged the general attendance for the purpose of getting acquainted with Wallace, and for a better understanding of party organization on the part of the general voter.

Wallace will arrive in the valley sometime Thursday, and will discuss party matters with committee members during the day and evening.

A county chairman will be elected at the meeting, together with a state committeeman and state committeewoman, a congressional committeeman and congressional committeewoman, and a secretary and treasurer. The new chairman will select his own executive committee.

The Democrats will meet on the Mezzanine floor of the hotel.

Sunday's thunder and rain storm did no damage to the pear crop, but hurt cherries to a very mild extent, according to County Agent Robert G. Fowler. He doubted if the cherries were far enough advanced to be hurt severely. They are later in developing than last year. Mayor T. S. Wiley reported the cherry crop in the Ashland district was unhurt, for the same reasons. First reports indicated there have been some losses.

Orchardists and packers reported the pear crop unscathed.

Meat That Glows Puzzles Officials Of Texas Village

Mexia, Tex., June 20.—(U.P.)—Health officials sought an answer today to the puzzling question of what suddenly caused meat from five Mexia grocery stores to glow in the dark.

Dr. C. P. McKenzie, city health officer, said the phenomenon first was reported by an excited negro who dashed into the police station to report that when he opened his ice box, his meat was "all lit up."

A check revealed meat in five stores glowed and gave off a fluorescent light in the dark.

Aided by the state health department, several doctors and officers from a prisoner of war camp, McKenzie sought without a bit of success a reason for the strange light.

He said persons who cooked the glowing meat and ate it suffered no ill effects.

Home Love Brings Children's Death In Poison Fumes

Buffalo, N. Y., June 20.—(U.P.)—Love of the home from which they had been evicted several weeks ago brought death today to two Buffalo school children—brother and sister.

The bodies of Ruth Howard, 16, and her brother, Robert, 11, were found in the gas-filled house where they had lived with their widowed father, Edward, a railroad worker.

Neighbors said the children had been back to sleep on the bare floors of the vacant house several nights since the eviction. Last night, apparently, the children did the same thing, but ignored a sign, posted on the dwelling, which explained professional exterminators had filled the building with poison gas.

The children's bodies were found when the extermination worker returned late today.
