SILENCE BATS OF
BIG LEAGUE FOES

Walters, Newsom And Hollingsworth Turn In Brilliant Jobs On Rubber.

New York, June 21.—(U.P.)—The pre-season dopesters who predicted this would be a year of triumph for the carpet slipper and rocking chair crew—the ancient among big league pitchers—laughed up their athletic sleeves today, for it appeared that, for once, they had hit the nail on the head.

The veterans made the batters look silly yesterday as the three shutouts which were recorded were all posted by men with more than 20 years of professional baseball experience—Bucky Walters, Cincinnati, 21; Bobo Newsom, Philadelphia Athletics, 22; and Al Hollingsworth, St. Louis Browns, 22.

Walters, always a reliable moundsman, topped the major league hurling corps today with 11 victories against three losses and gained his latest triumph against the Pittsburgh Pirates last night with a two-hit, 3-0 triumph.

Elsewhere in the National league the leading St. Louis Cardinals defeated the Chicago Cubs for the ninth consecutive time this season as rookie Al Jurisich served up five-hit ball to record the 2-1 triumph.

"Bums" Victors.—The Brooklyn Dodgers, behind the fine pitching of Les Webber, overcame a four-run deficit in the first inning to defeat the New York Giants, 7-6.

Philadelphia at Boston in the National league was rained out. The Philadelphia Athletics swept a doubleheader from the Boston Red Sox, 5-4 in an 11-inning opener and 2-0 behind Bobo Newsom's two-hitter in the finale.

The St. Louis Browns and the Chicago White Sox split, the Sox taking the opener, 4-3 in 10 innings. The Browns nipped starter Orval Grove for a run in the first inning and went on to a 5-0 decision.

The Cleveland Indians, despite a 3-1 triumph over the Detroit Tigers, fell into the cellar behind the double winning Athletics.

Hank Borowy, the Yanks ace hurler, tossed four-hit ball against the Washington Senators to give the world champions a much-needed 3-1 victory.

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Comely Dot Germain
Provides Threat In
Women's Golf Meet

Chicago, June 21.—(U.P.)—One of the hottest competitors in the current women's golfing swing appeared as odds-on favorite today to plug through the women's western open tournament to at least the semi-final round.

She is comely Dorothy Germain, personality-plus Drexel Hills, Pa., star, who looks as good in front of a camera as she does behind a 20-foot putt.

Miss Germain, daughter of a glue works executive, apparently has inherited a degree of "stick"; her die-hard golf game carried her to the championship in the Red Cross women's tournament at New Rochelle, N. Y., last week and brought her in with a 79 for runner-up spot in the women's western medal round Monday.

Yesterday, in her first match-play, she piled up the biggest margin of the day to defeat Mrs. Thomas Nolan of New Castle, Pa., 9 and 7. Last year Miss Germain won the women's western amateur and was a semi-finalist in the open.

Partly by the luck of the draw—but mostly by ability—Miss Germain ranked as a red-hot bet to advance to Thursday's quarter-finals and to the semi-finals Friday. She stands out as the top-notch linkswoman in the lower brackets, with most of the other threats, such as Babe Didrikzen Zaharias, Lily Patty Berg and Dorothy Kirby bunched in the upper division.

Dewey and Roosevelt, Morse
And Smith Are Far Ahead
In Respective Brackets

Salem, Ore., June 21.—(U.P.)—Final, complete and official votes for the May 19 primary election were reported today by the secretary of state's office, following the canvass of votes by the governor, state treasurer and the secretary of state.

Gov. Thomas Dewey of New York and President Roosevelt were the biggest vote getters in the presidential voting, with Dewey getting 50,001 Republican votes and Roosevelt getting 39,833 Democratic votes.

Few Demo Writings
Scattered writings other than for Dewey on the Republican ballot included: Stessen, 6,081; Bricker, 3,018; Willkie 3,333. Democratic writings were few, 1,057 scattered.

For the Democratic vice presidential nomination, Henry Wallace got 10,441 votes, Alben Barkley 318 and Sam Rayburn 37, with 461 votes scattered.

Republican vice presidential writings included Warren 12,548; Stassen 2,155; Dewey 929; Bricker 1,184; Willkie 483; and 867 scattered.

Wayne L. Morse, candidate for the Republican nomination for the long term in the U. S. senate, gained the largest number of votes cast in a senatorial contest, getting 70,716 to Rufus Holman's 60,436, and Earl E. Fisher's 12,241.

Smith Far Ahead
Edgar W. Smith received 49,972 votes in the Democratic nomination race for the same post to Walter W. Whitbeck's 29,852.

Willis Mahoney, unopposed Democratic nominee for senate, short term, received 72,067 votes. Guy Cordon, winner of the Republican nomination, received 68,666 votes, compared with 63,944 for Charles Sprague, 6,106 for Henry Black and 5,065 for John McBride.

Results of the race for the national committee members' posts: Ralph Cake (R) 87,992; Charles L. Paine (R) 43,047; Howard Latourette (D) 29,619; Lew Wallace (D) 34,575; Clarence F. Hyde (D) 26,839.

Mrs. George Gerbig, running unopposed for the post of Republican national committee-woman, received 103,988 votes.

Nancy Honeyman Robinson gained 47,035 votes in the race for Democratic national committee-woman, while Emily F. Edson received 37,559.

In the races for representatives in congress, the canvass showed the following results:

1st district: (Republican) James W. Mott, 23,231; Dan Harmon 14,526; (Democratic) O. Henry Olsen, 15,874.

2nd district: (Republican) Lowell Stockman 17,025; (Democratic) C. J. Shorb 8,976.

3rd district: (Republican) Homer D. Angell, 47,267; (Democratic) Lester Sheely, 22,726; Nicholas L. Granoff 14,875.

4th district: (Republican) Harris Ellsworth, 22,904; (Democratic) Floyd C. Dover, 10,371.

For state treasurer: Leslie M. Scott (R) 118,948 (largest number of votes cast for any person on the entire ballot; William T.

Lambert, (D) 71,248.
For attorney general: Leroy L. Lomax (R) 43,089; George Neuner, (R) 81,372; Bruce Spaulding (D) 71,365.

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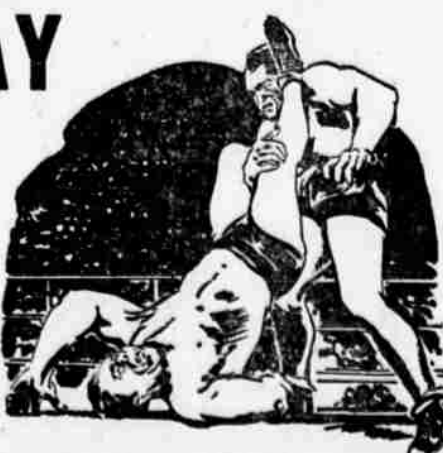
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
