

MARKADE DOORS OPEN PART TIME STARTING JULY 1

Beginning July 1 the Mark Kade, recreation center for servicemen at St. Mark's Episcopal church on North Oakdale avenue, will be operated on a part-time basis by the church, it was announced today by the Rev. George R. Turney, rector. The change in operation was decided upon at a meeting of St. Mark's vestry, held Sunday.

For the past year the Mark Kade has been operated with funds derived partly from federal sources through the Jackson County Recreation committee and partly with funds from the national Episcopal church. According to the Rev. Turney, the decision to take over operation of the center was brought about by the reduced need for recreation facilities for servicemen.

Mrs. Ruth Boyd, who replaced Mrs. Harry Hinman as director a short time ago, will continue as director of the center, it was stated. The Markade board will not disband but will be inactive for the time being, it was said.

Mrs. Boyd stated that after July 1 it is planned to open the Markade Wednesdays from 5 until 11 p. m., Thursdays from 5 to 10:30 p. m., Saturdays from 1 to 11:30 p. m. and Sundays from 12 noon until 10:30 p. m. Wednesdays and Saturdays will be dance nights, with general "open house" activities planned for Thursdays and Sundays. However, the change in dance nights will become effective next week, she stated.

Chinese Finds Eucalyptus Oil Good In Mosquito Work

Kunming—(UP)—A new method of malarial control through more effective destruction of mosquitoes in their breeding areas has been discovered by Dr. Liu Chung-lo, professor at the Tsing Hua university, which was moved here from occupied Peiping.

Dr. Liu said he has found eucalyptus oil far more effective than either kerosene or crude oil, which usually are employed, but which no longer are obtainable in war-torn China.

The Chinese scientist, a graduate of Cornell university, where he received his doctorate degree in entomology in 1936, said eucalyptus either kills mosquito larvae outright or prevents their development into the pupa stage.

Dr. Liu explained that while eucalyptus oil is highly volatile and remains on the water's surface for only about 10 minutes, its high toxic properties kill mosquito larvae within a matter of seconds.

The lack of kerosene in Yunnan province started Dr. Liu ex-

perimenting with other oils and led to his discovery that eucalyptus oil is far more effective per gallon than any of the mineral oils.

Dr. Liu is an example of Chinese scientists who, despite war, inflation and China's muddled political waters are carrying on their important work.

Working in a laboratory which was bombed out in pre-WG days and has now been rebuilt with a straw roof and mud floor, Dr. Liu, his fellow professors and their students struggle with improvised equipment and limited funds to develop substitutes for vital materials no longer available.

In creating his distillation process for obtaining oil from eucalyptus leaves Dr. Liu chose the most primitive of equipment in order to develop a process which could be simulated in rural areas.

Since the leaves of any one of Yunnan's 12 varieties of eucalyptus trees produce only two per cent of oil by weight, Dr. Liu is importing superior seeds from Australia for planting in China.

BUDGET APPROVED BY CITY COUNCIL WITHOUT DISSENT

An ordinance was passed at last night's meeting of the city council adopting the 1944-45 budget as nobody appeared at the public hearing, held in conjunction with the council meeting, to offer objections.

An ordinance was adopted reclassifying lots 9, 10 and 11 of block 2, Palm's second addition from residential zone class 2 to light industrial zone class 5. The change was recommended by the city planning commission.

Another ordinance passed provided for the sale of the west 140 feet of the south half of lot 9, block 1, Riverside subdivision to Frank M. and Evelyn Dupray for \$450.

Fire Chief Roy Elliott was authorized to attend the state fire school in Portland June 25 to 27, inclusive.

An ordinance was adopted abolishing the city health department as of June 30, 1944, in view of the fact the county is maintaining a board of health which causes a duplication of effort and expense on the part of the city health department.

The ordinance, terminating the city health department unnecessary, provides that the county board of health shall be the ex-officio city health department. Dr. L. D. Inskeep has been the city health officer.

The next regular meeting will be held Wednesday night, July 5, instead of the night of July 4. Vice-Mayor Larry Schade presided in the absence of Mayor C. A. Meeker. Councilman Childers was absent.

SUPREME COURT STAYS EXECUTION OF LAYTON

Salem, Ore., June 21—(UP)—

The state supreme court today had stayed the execution of Richard Harry Layton, Monmouth, under sentence of death for the murder of Ruth Hildebrand, 17, Dallas, last June, pending application for a review of the case in the U. S. supreme court.

Layton was scheduled to die in the lethal gas chamber at the penitentiary here July 7.

DRUNK CLIMBS BRIDGE

Before going into the regular army, Fichtner was employed as a projectionist at the Rialto theater here. He is a graduate of Medford senior high school.

Sgt. Fichtner's brother, Clyde, is stationed at Treasure Island with the navy and his younger brother, Earl, employed at the Swan Island shipyards in Portland, was recently inducted into the navy and is awaiting call.

PEACE TALK REVIVED BY POPE'S MEETING

Vatican City, June 21—(UP)—

Pope Pius XII conferred today with President Roosevelt's personal emissary, Myron C. Taylor, reviving speculation over a new European peace move centering about the Holy sea.

The pontiff granted a private audience to Taylor and his aide, Harold Tittman, after which the Americans were scheduled to meet with Luigi Cardinal Maglione, papal secretary of state.
