SYMPATHY AND HEALTH

Some readers, who probably do not read the printed instructions to correspondents, seem to think that they are entitled to an answer, whether they comply with the instructions or not.

"I asked you if you knew anything about the Pancreas, and all I received in reply was this printed form where by you try to sidestep the question. Do you know any treatment for the Pancreas? If you don't, why can't you come out and say so honestly?"

So reacts one correspondent. The printed form I sent the correspondent explains that it is not practicable to give advice without having examined the patient... and that I must confine myself to my proper province, which is health and hygiene, not disease diagnosis or treatment. If this correspondent is entitled to a personal explanation why I can't give the information, advice or opinion he seeks, then many other correspondents who ask for diagnosis, treatment or opinion about their individual cases should have a personal letter from me—and when you have written that many personal letters in a day you are in no condition to give earnest or sympathetic attention to the queries or requests of many other correspondents who comply with instructions and abide by the rules.

Believe it or not, for all my hard-boiled antics and my sarcastic cracks, there's still more Irish in me than a doctor should have—and I mean sympathy.

In a little magazine called "Courage" published for the Fraternity of the Wooden Leg, a member of the fraternity who is wearing two artificial legs offers some excellent practical suggestions for the benefit of others similarly handicapped. He expresses the feeling of a great

many persons who have suffered serious loss, in peace or in war, thus:

"Varied reactions follow the amputation of a limb, contributed to by well meaning families and friends. The greatest courtesy to be offered a handicapped individual is, just as he is natural with them as possible, the patient realizes more than the sympathizer, and definitely, sympathy is the last thing in the world a handicapped person should be offered. To familiarize these well meaning families and friends is the object of my writing."

Greet the boy who returns from the war maimed or disfigured with a welcome home and put your heart in it, but not one word about the wound or the loss he has suffered, unless he himself insists on talking about it. Better, as soon as you have told him how glad you are to see him, begin at once to tell him what goes, bring him up to date on the news about old friends, etc. The sympathy that does the most good is not verbal.

The Dope Habit

Red Nose Club
I am the red-nosed freckled type—when I'm exposed to sun, unless I wear a heavy covering of zinc oxide on my nose, it gets very red and stays red for weeks.

Answer—Wearing a protective covering of zinc oxide and calamine powder (calamine is a pink or flesh-color impure zinc carbonate) while exposed to the sun is the best way to prevent such reddening of the nose. For red nose not due to sunburn use the "white lotion" suggested in "Trum" column in pamphlet on "Acne"—mailed on request if you provide stamped envelope bearing your address. Do not send a clipping.

Army Ordnance In Tribute To Work Of Civilian Vets

Kansas City, Mo. (U.P.)—The remarkable armament production records of Army ordnance today are due in a large measure to experience gained in five previous major wars and to an unbroken tradition of 132 years, handed down from father to son, that stretches back to the War of 1812, Army ordnance officials here explain.

The living repositories of this experience and the most devoted guardians of this tradition are the veteran civilian employees of the ordnance department.

Army ordnance officials have announced that five employees have been on the job in ordnance arsenals and armories for periods ranging from 50 to 54 years each.

James H. Gill began his long service at Frankfort Arsenal, Philadelphia, on March 5, 1891; Herman E. Alex and Joseph Lahey signed at the Rock Island Arsenal in 1892; and Theodore F. Fletcher and John P. Neil joined the staff of the Springfield, Mass., Army in 1895.

The Gill family is an institution at the Frankfort Arsenal,
