

NEW RED CROSS SEWING UNITS IN JACKSON COUNTY

Two new Red Cross sewing units have been formed in the last two weeks in Jackson county, making 14 units working on kit bags for soldiers going overseas and hospital garments for convalescent and wounded men.

June 16, women in the Lake Creek district met at the village hall at the request of Mrs. J. R. Tyrrell, a member of the Red Cross board. Mrs. Belle Schenck, chairman of production, and Mrs. Fred Rankin, executive secretary, talked to the group about the need for further production and a unit was formed to meet once a month and to sew in between times at their own homes.

Mrs. Mable Beatty was appointed in charge of materials and Mrs. Tyrrell in charge of records for the unit and plans were made for opening a Red Cross headquarters for the district. About 15 women attended the original meeting.

June 30 the Home Economics unit of the Applegate Grange met at the home of Mrs. Abercrombie to consider sewing for Red Cross. Mrs. Schenck demonstrated cutting and planning materials, and Mrs. Rankin spoke of general Red Cross needs.

The group voted to form the Applegate Red Cross sewing unit to meet once a month. The chairman is Mrs. Herbert Elmore and the secretary, Mrs. Clarence Elmore. The cutting committee will be Mrs. Lester Hill and Glenn Best. Mrs. Helen Davis of the Jackson County Red Cross board made arrangements for the meeting, interested the women and arranged for the speakers.

The production department, with headquarters in the county courthouse, shipped five cartons containing 240 filled kit bags to an embarkation point in California last week.

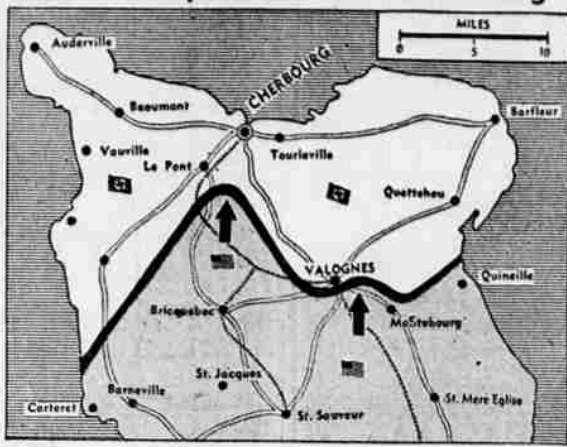
