178,677 LOSSES SINCE WAR START

Washington, June 23.—(U.P.)
U. S. army casualties in all
theaters since Pearl Harbor, in-
cluding D-day losses in France,
totalled 178,677 through June 6,
Secretary of War Henry L.
Stimson disclosed today.

The total was the latest an-
nounced by the war department
covering all theaters of opera-
tion, but included only part of
the 15,883 American casualties
suffered on the Cherbourg penin-
sula up to midnight of June 16,
and not all the 64,922 losses in
Italy from the time of the initial
landings through June 15.

The navy revealed, mean-
while, that it has suffered 46,703
casualties, making a grand total
of 225,382.

The June 6 army total was
7,318 above the figure through
May 31. Stimson said it included
31,289 killed, 71,432 wounded,
39,976 missing, and 35,890
prisoners of war.
