KOOZER ELECTED CHAIRMAN COUNTY G.O.P. COMMITTEE

The largest delegation in many years, attending the organization meeting of the Jackson County Republican Central Committee in the Hotel Medford last night, elected Ralph Koozer of Ashland to serve as chairman for the ensuing year. Mrs. Bertha Coy Ross, Gold Hill, was named vice-chairman and Mrs. Rose Galey, Ashland, was elected secretary-treasurer.

Others elected were Guy Tex, Central Point, state committeeman; Mrs. Marie D'Albini, Medford, state committeewoman; Fred Holmes, Ashland, congressional committeeman; Mrs. Edna Overmyer, Medford, congressional committeewoman; and the following district committeemen: Herb Alford and Mrs. Jessie Stagg, Medford; James H. Grives, Prospect; R. E. Wilson, Jacksonville, and Ben Day, Sams Valley.

The organization went on record as approving a special session of the state legislature to revise the absentee ballot law in order to give military personnel the opportunity to vote, should the present law be found inadequate.

The delegation also pledged itself to work more diligently than ever before to elect men in sympathy with the republican concept of government as opposed to what it termed "the continuous regimentation and New Deal laws made by appointed heads of various bureaus whose rulings are not permitted to be reviewed by the courts."

Kenneth G. Denman, retiring chairman of the committee, was thanked for his six years of faithful and conscientious service.

Coast Guardsman Horseback Hero

San Francisco, June 23.—(U.P.)—Nolan Williams, a versatile coast guardsman, saved Mrs. Georgiana Churchill, 27, Sedalia, Mo., from drowning today by riding into the surf at San Francisco beach on a horse and lassoing her with a lariat as she bobbed in the breakers.

Mrs. Churchill said she came here from Sedalia a few weeks ago, and jumped into the ocean so she could "swim out to the islands" to join her husband, a merchant seaman.

JAPANESE DRIVE NEARS HENGYANG

Chungking, June 23.—(U.P.)—Two Japanese columns, driving south from captured Changsha in their campaign to seize the mid-section of the Canton-Hankow railroad, have advanced to within 35 miles north of Hengyang, vital communications center and airfield site, front dispatches reported today.

Enemy troops, who have advanced more than 150 miles since they opened their Hunan province offensive four weeks ago, were only a few miles from Hengshan, gateway to Hengyang, approximately 30 miles south.

Military observers here said the situation was alarmingly in favor of the Japanese in their attempt to gain a continuous overland transport line from Tokyo to Singapore.

Kiwanians Elect Michigan Ad Man Next President

Chicago, June 23.—(U.P.)—More than 350 delegates to Kiwanis International's 1944 convention today elected Ben Dean, Grand Rapids, Mich., advertising executive, president for the next year to succeed Donald B. Rice, Oakland, Cal.

J. Hudson Huffard, Bluefield, W. Va., and J. J. Smith, Regina, Saskatchewan, were elected vice-presidents from the United States and Canada, while Hamilton Holt, Macon, Ga., was named treasurer.

Trustees elected for two-year terms included: J. N. Emerson, Pullman, Wash., and Guy H. Vnde Bogart, Havre, Mont.

Trustees elected for one-year terms included George H. Lowe, Ogden, Utah.

Another Dancer Sues Canteen On Rough Treatment

Hollywood, June 23.—(U.P.)—The Hollywood canteen today was sued for \$17,100 by Jane McNabb, professional dancer, who said her left ankle and foot were broken last Dec. 13 while dancing at the canteen.

It was the second \$17,000 suit filed against the canteen in recent months. Radio Actress Florida Edwards having obtained a judgment of \$8,170 in her suit for injuries suffered last Halloween while jitterbugging unwillingly with a marine.

Miss McNabb stated that she and her serviceman partner were being pushed about the dance floor by guests at the canteen, and that her partner accidentally but violently kicked her, breaking her ankle and foot.

Wife Quits Rudy "For Last Time"

Hollywood, June 23.—(U.P.)—Actress Betty Jane Greer called her crooning band leader husband, Lt. Rudy Vallee, an "incurable bache-or" today, announced she had separated from him for the "last time" and said she would seek a divorce.

"This is it," Miss Greer said, revealing she had moved into an apartment with an actress friend.

"I intend to get a divorce from him on a ground of mental cruelty. That will be the only charge, for Rudy is an incurable bache-or whom I never should have married."

They were married Dec. 3, 1943.

Ickes Irked When Appropriation Cut

Washington, June 23.—(U.P.)—Secretary of Interior Harold I. Ickes bitterly commented today that the nation "may have to resort to coal card rationing" because of recent congressional reduction of appropriations for his department.

He said that the granting of only \$40,000 for the department's long distance telephone and telegraphic services in the fiscal year starting July 1 would "cripple" the entire coal program.

JEOP SHOP NEEDS BOYS TO OPERATE DRILLS ON WOOD

The Junior High "Jeop Shop" will open this evening in a special session for Junior High and Senior High boys only. Boys who have worked in the manual training shops and can use wood drills are especially asked to volunteer each Friday evening.

Mrs. James Medley, instructor states there are 50 Prisoner of War game kits, comprising 50 boxes, to be made, and 450 wooden games needing from 25 to 162 holes each to be drilled. These are ready for tonight's shop work. Thirty-five boys and girls a day this week have sandced these 450 games of wood to have them ready for the drilling which they are unable to do.

At the request of Junior High and Senior High girls the shop will be open each Wednesday afternoon, starting June 28, for the purpose of drawing and painting each separate game on the wooden blocks. This Wednesday session the shop will be open from 1:00 to 4:00 and girls are free to come and go, giving as much time as they can to this special project.

More volunteers are needed for the morning shop hours in which a great variety of craft is being taught.

Would Shoot Adolf Soon As Captured
London, June 23.—(U.P.)—Marcel De Baer, president of the Belgian military and maritime courts of appeal in Great Britain, advocated today that Adolf Hitler and his war leaders be shot when they are captured by allied military units.

"I believe that if punishment is going to be imposed on Hitler and his ministers, it should be imposed as soon as they are arrested," he said.
