JIM TOBIN HURLS
FIVE FRAMES OF
NO-HIT BASEBALLFeat To Go Unrecorded Be-
cause of Rule — Whit
Wyatt Wins for Brooklyn.

New York, June 23.—(U.P.)—Jim Tobin, the Boston Braves' nothing ball and no-hit artist, today had pitched his second no-hit game of the season but no preparations were being made to enter the feat in the record books.

Darkness deprived Tobin of a chance to take his place alongside Johnny Vander Meer as the only other pitcher in modern baseball history to hurl two no-hit games in one season. Only a very few have pitched two in their careers.

Following yesterday's first game in which Ron Northey clouted a 15th inning home run to give the Philadelphia Phillies a 1-0 triumph over the Braves, Tobin took the mound and pitched five hitless innings before the game was called. According to baseball's rules, if the home team is ahead, four and a half innings constitute a game in the event the umpire deem it necessary to call the contest. Thus, Tobin did hurl a no-hit game, but the record books enter only those who pitched nine or more innings. The Braves, with homers by Tommy Holmes and Butch Nieman, won the nightcap 5-0.

Whit Wyatt, who doesn't believe the season starts until mid-summer, held his own opening day at Ebbets field and pitched the Brooklyn Dodgers to an easy 10-3 victory over the New York Giants.

Reds Lose Pair

The Pittsburgh Pirates unleashed a 26-hit attack that brought them from behind to victory in both ends of a double-header with the Cincinnati Reds and strengthened their hold on second place. Rip Sewell spotted the Reds three runs in the first inning of the opener and then checked them for the rest of the day to win 9-4. Five runs in the sixth inning of the nightcap overcame a 4-1 deficit and allowed the Bucs to go on to a 7-4 decision.

St. Louis at Chicago in the National league was rained out. The tight American league race got tighter as the leading St. Louis Browns took a 10-3 shellacking from the Chicago White Sox.

The second place Boston Red Sox split with the Philadelphia Athletics, Boston taking the first game, 5-4 in 12 innings when Mike Ryba doubled and came home on Pete Fox's single to win his own game. In the afterpiece Bob Estalella's hit in the ninth inning scored the marginally tally for the A's 3-2 edge.

The Washington Senators bowled to the New York Yankees, Bill Zuber holding the Nats to four scattered hits for a 4-0 Yankee victory.

The Detroit Tigers edged the Cleveland Indians, 4-3.

FAMOUS SCOUT DIES

New York, June 23.—(U.P.)—Baseball lost a colorful figure today in the death of Larry Sutton, for a quarter of a century a scout for the Brooklyn Dodgers. Sutton, who would have been 86 years old on July 1, died last night at his home almost in the shadow of Ebbets Field, Brooklyn.

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ACHIU WALLOPS
BELCASTRO WITH

Wagner was still in the ring screaming at the customers when Achiu appeared for the main event. Wagner immediately collared him and demanded a rematch, all the time making it known that he doubted Achiu's intestinal fortitude.

Finally, he grabbed the microphone again and declared he would put up \$300 in war bonds if Achiu would do the same, with the winner of the rematch to take the pot. Achiu, while not actually accepting the challenge acted like he would be more than glad to accommodate the gl-orous boy. This return go is a possibility for next week.

Jack Lipscomb employed his self-strangle hold to take the line fall in his opening-event match with Billy McEun. The fall occurred in the third and final round. Between the second and third heats Lipscomb became embroiled in a slugging match with Referee Earl Yoakley and they had quite a party until McEun shoved Yoakley aside and took over the scrap.

SILKS OF HOWARD
SEEN ON UPSWING

San Diego, June 23.—(U.P.)—When Apprentice Hubert Stanley Jones broke the world's record for winning mounts in a single day of racing recently by guiding eight horses to the wire first at the Agua Caliente track, south of the border in Old Mexico, the feat may have been a symbol of the return to turf eminence of the red and white silks of C. S. (Seabiscuit) Howard, Jones' contract employer.

Turf history records nothing to parallel Jones' feat, the closest approach to it being the seven winners ridden by Jockey J. Sylvester at Ravenna Park, Ohio, Oct. 18, 1930. Apprentice Willie Turnbull duplicated the trick 12 years later at Rockingham Park, N. H., July 31, 1942.

Walters Best Bet To Pitch
For Nats In All-Star GameBy Jack Cuddy

New York, June 23.—(U.P.)—The almost certain and in all probability unanimous selection of William "Bucky" Walters for this year's all-star game gives what we think is a definite advantage to the National league.

Walters, ace right-hander of the Cincinnati Reds, is unquestionably the best night pitcher in baseball and if he is Manager Billy Southworth's choice to start for the senior circuit, and his record indicates that he will be, the American league batsmen will do well to eat a lot of carrots between now and July 11—the date of the game. Carrots are supposed to perk up your blinkers in the dark.

Over the past two years, Walters has been practically unbeatable under the arcs. He puts a hop on the ball which seems to escape vision in the night games and batters find his delivery exceptionally tough to master.

Walters got off to a bad start last year and after recovering from an ankle injury which he suffered in spring training, the night games were in progress and he started to shine. The majority of the 15 games he won last year were after-dark victories.

This year, he has been effective in both night and day games, but unbeatable at night. His record shows 11 victories against only three defeats and included in the wins were four shutouts. His last time out he whitewashed the Pittsburgh Pirates, under the lights at Crosley field, with two scratch hits.

At his current pace Walters will break his previous high for a season which he established in 1939 with 27 victories.

Bucky is a managers' pitcher. His fielding is nearly flawless and in addition he is a splendid hitter, frequently winning his own ball games with base blows. He seldom needs relief and in the 13 games he has started this season Cincinnati Manager Bill McKechnie has had to send in help only on one occasion.

IKE WILLIAMS IS 3-1
TO DEFEAT CLEO SHANS

New York, June 23.—(U.P.)—Mike Williams, young lightweight from Trenton, N. J., whom many boxing experts have picked to lift the N. B. A. crown from the head of Juan Zurita of Mexico, was established as a 3-1 favorite to defeat Cleo Shans in their 10-round bout tonight at Madison Square Garden.

The Trenton negro, who has lost only one fight since turning professional, in some 40 odd contests, and that to former Lightweight Champion Bob Montgomery in a 12-rounder at Philadelphia early this year, has compiled an impressive list of triumphs.

Mrs. Gus Newbury, surgical dressing chairman, thought up the little slogan because if 100 women would make but 25 dressings each day that the local workroom is open, and 100 would report in the outlying districts, the county quota would be easily met.

Mrs. Newbury points out that the workers average 25 dressings an hour, which means that if 100 women reported, each would only have to work an hour. The county quota averages about 75,000 dressings a month.
