

AMERICANS OPEN OFFENSE TO ROUT JAPS OFF MOUNT

Airfield Captured; Objective
Is Huge Blockhouse Atop
Volcano.

An Advanced Command Post on Saipan, June 23—(U.P.)—American infantry and marine troops, supported by fighter planes from captured Aslito—now Conroy—airfield, today opened a pincers drive against steep Mount Tapotchau which dominates the entire island of Saipan.

Veteran soldiers and marines doggedly crawled up the mountain slopes, pushing forward a few feet at a time, as they forced the enemy out of concealed barages by hiding in the many ridges, ledges, and valleys in this rugged terrain.

No troop movements or gun fire have been reported in the Japanese capital city of the Japanese Marianas, for the past 48 hours. When Mount Tapotchau falls the doom of Japan will be assured, probably within 48 hours.

One of the chief objectives in the Mount Tapotchau drive is a huge block house hidden in a deep gulch near the mountain summit. This block house is believed to be Japanese military headquarters for the island. It is well protected by pillboxes and natural ridge rock defenses.

Japanese casualties have not been determined but on the basis of my conversations with officers I believe at least 3,000 enemy soldiers have been killed within the southern one-third of Saipan which the Americans now hold except for small picket resistance.

In areas where heavy fighting has occurred few bodies have been found but in places of light action army officers have discovered between 400 and 500 bodies, indicating that Japanese dead have been removed to the rear.

The marines found two Japanese trucks loaded with freshly killed Nipponese soldiers. Army authorities said the Japanese bury some of their dead in sealed caves and throw others into the sea.

AMERICAN HEAVY BOMBERS POUND RAIL, ROBOT AREA

Allied Supreme Headquarters, London, June 24—(U.P.)—Four flights of American heavy bombers blasted France, Germany and the Balkans today, maintaining constant aerial assault on European rail targets, airfields and the Calais rocket coast and the Cherbourg peninsula in France.

Three heavy bombers task forces sallied from Britain. The first pounded the airfields and rail bridges; the second struck in northwest Germany and the third hit nine robot bomb installations near Calais and switching stations near Boulogne.

The assault on the robot bomb ramps, the tenth by the heavy weights of the 8th Air Force this week, followed an earlier raid by Havocs and Thunderbolt dive bombers. The Thunderbolts, providing top cover for the bombers, followed the Havocs' bombs down in heavy dives unloosening loads of heavy demolition bombs.

A third assault on the flying bomb installations was made by a daylight flight of British Lancasters and Halifaxes escorted by fighters.

The day's bomber operations opened with an attack on Cherbourg's crumbling defenses by Marauders, which roared out at daylight to pitch 250 tons of bombs on four groups of heavy German guns delaying the final lunge of ground troops into the prize port.

NEW STATUS FOR POULTRY SOUGHT

Salem, Ore., June 24—(U.P.)—The Oregon state department of agriculture today sent requests to national committee chairmen of both major parties that agricutlure be accorded equal status with other parts of the national economy.

The department also requested that the poultry industry be accorded an equal and independent status with other branches of agriculture.

The requests, in the form of resolutions, pointed out that farm industries are the nation's largest producers of basic raw materials and therefore are of major importance, and that the economic condition of the nation was closely related to that of agriculture.

PORTLAND YARDS NEED 16,000 MEN

Portland, Ore., June 24—(U.P.)—Statements approved by Rear Adm. H. L. Vickery, v. chairman of the maritime commission, and L. C. Stoll, state manpower director, said today that 16,000 more workers, which include 4,500 replacements, were needed immediately in the Portland area to complete U. S. maritime contracts. The workers will be recruited from out-of-state.
