Services get Bibles. The Gideons have distributed 7,000, 000 New Testaments to men and women in the armed forces since Pearl Harbor, it was disclosed at the annual meeting of the Christian Businessmen.

San Francisco, June 24—(U.P.) The War Shipping Administration reported today that the "much-dreaded and long-anticipated shipping tie-up," caused by a shortage of merchant seamen, has started in west coast ports and "is slowly paralyzing the movement of war cargoes overseas."

Andrew G. Wilson, the WSA recruitment official, said five vessels presently are tied up in San Francisco harbor.

"The tie-up has already spread to other Pacific coast ports," said Wilson, "with Los Angeles reporting serious ship delays and Portland and Seattle on the verge of tie-ups."

FOOD CANNING FOR SCHOOL LUNCHES GAINS IN COUNTY

Progress is being made in the food preservation program for school lunches in Jackson county, according to Mrs. Virginia Wait, who is assisting Miss Marian Farrell, home demonstration agent, in the war emergency program of food production and preservation.

Mrs. Wait will meet with groups from Shady Cove, Bellview and Phoenix next week to help with plans for food preservation for the school lunch.

Organization meetings and demonstrations of the latest methods of canning have been conducted and definite plans have been made to preserve fruits and vegetables for winter use in school lunches.

To date the following groups have met: Griffin Creek, Howard, Lone Pine, Trail, Oak Grove, Applegate, Pinehurst, Butte Falls, Jacksonville and Wagner Creek.

It is hoped that surplus from commercial and victory gardens may be secured by some groups for this purpose.

Drying may also be undertaken and many groups have a cold storage locker and plan to freeze berries, some vegetables and meats.

Future assistance will be extended through the office of the home demonstration agent.

JACKSON COUNTY PUBLIC WELFARE LISTED FOR MAY

Routine reports were presented at the June meeting of the Jackson County Public Welfare commission held Thursday at the commission's office in the Liberty building with Alfred S. V. Carpenter, chairman, presiding.

May general assistance reports show 158 persons received \$5,437.38 during the month, as compared to \$4,646.23 for 133 persons the previous year. This was somewhat higher than April of this year, when 150 persons received \$5,651.72 in general assistance.

Twenty-two children were maintained in foster homes at a cost of \$485.84 and old age assistance cases, numbering 810, received \$24,404. For May of 1943, 771 cases received \$19,918 while in April of 1944, 805 old age cases received \$23,801.

Aid to dependent children reports show 147 children, in 59 families, received \$3,987, as compared to 153 children and \$3,416 in May of 1943. April reports showed 148 children receiving \$3,964. Assistance to the blind cases number 11 and received \$461, this report being the same as for April of this year. Blind assistance for May of 1943 numbered 14.

MARY E. ELLISON PASSES, AGED 91

Mary E. Ellison, 91, passed away June 22 at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Bessie Medley, 1524 Spokane avenue, Portland. Mrs. Ellison was born at Decorah, Iowa, January 4, 1853, and was united in marriage to Thomas Ellison at Minneapolis, Kas., October 11, 1874. His death occurred in 1927.

Mrs. Ellison came to this vicinity from Bourbon, Mo., with her husband and children fifty years ago and lived in and around Medford until about three years ago, when she moved to Portland with her daughter, where she has since resided.

An active member of the Relief Corp here, Mrs. Ellison was loved by all in the order and

was known as "Mother Ellison" to many. In early girlhood she united with the Christian church and for many years was a regular attendant and worker.

Mrs. Ellison was always ready to lend a helping hand in time of sickness or distress and leaves a large circle of friends and acquaintances to mourn her passing.
