

REV. RICE ACCEPTS TEACHING POST AT EUGENE COLLEGE

The Rev. Ward A. Rice, pastor of the First Christian Church for the past year, announced yesterday that he had accepted an appointment to the teaching staff of Northwest Christian College at Eugene. Rev. Rice came to Medford last September after having served as state evangelist for the state of Washington for a year and as pastor of the Christian Church in Walla Walla the previous ten years.

The Rev. Rice will take up his new duties September 1. His successor will be announced at a later date.

A spokesman for the local congregation expressed regret of the church at his leaving, but at the same time feel highly complimented that the pastor had been chosen for such an important position. Rev. Rice, who stated that he has enjoyed his year in Medford stated, however, that he feels that he can be of greater service to the entire northwest in his new work.

The president of Northwest College, Dr. Ross J. Griffith, was guest speaker at the local church yesterday, and stated that the college was fortunate in being able to secure the services of Rev. Rice. The school has an enrollment of approximately 270 students.

Rev. Rice left this morning for Turner, Oregon, where he will be one of the speakers at the annual state convention of the Disciples of Christ and the following week will serve on the faculty of the State Young Peoples' Conference.

An invitation is extended by the committee to all army wives in the vicinity to join in a vigorous

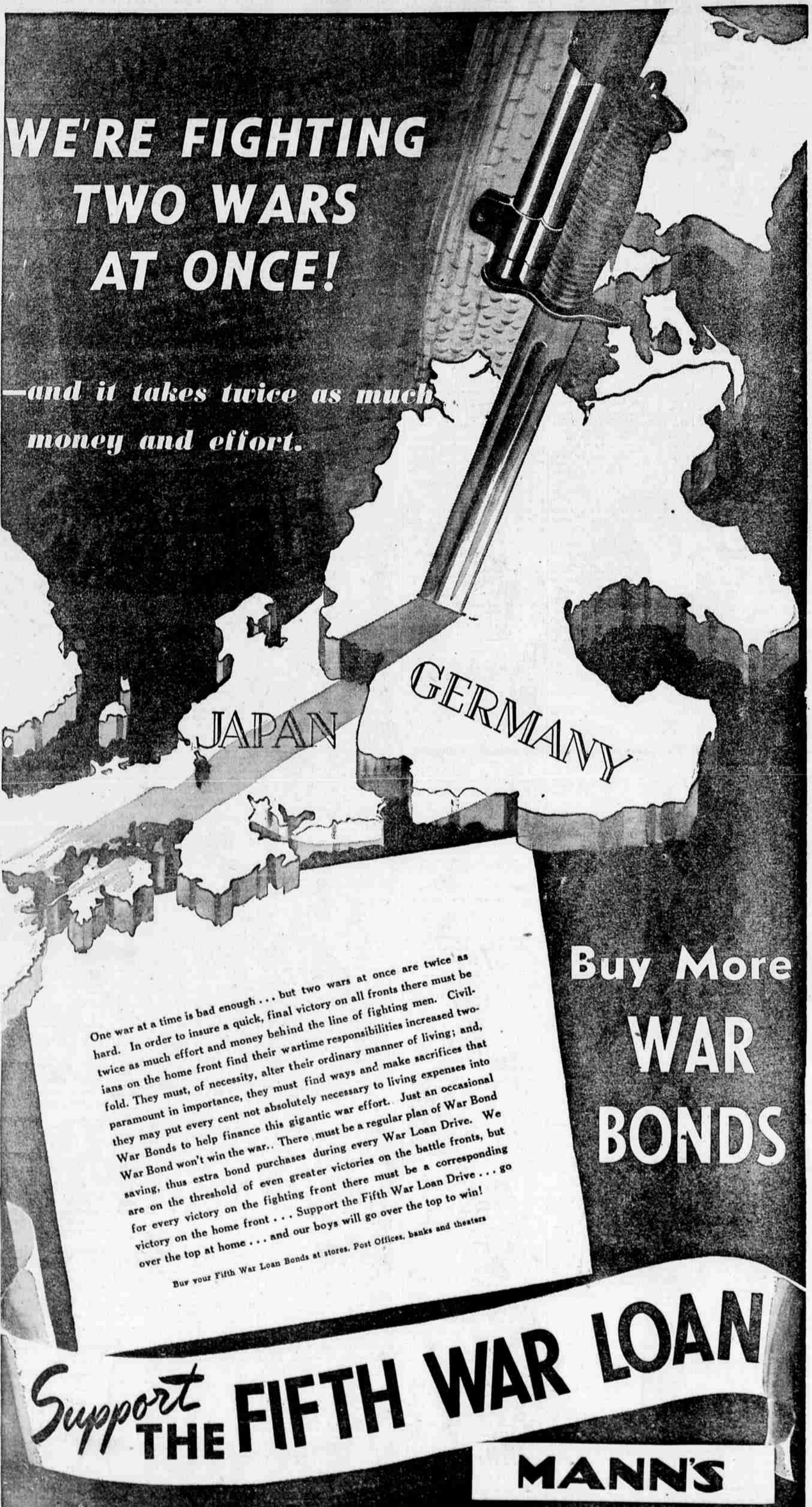
campaign to produce more Red Cross surgical dressings during the summer months.

Red Cross sewing, which still fills a very definite need for our fighting forces, is done by army wives at the Outpost on Wednesdays from 10 a. m. to 3 p. m. under leadership of Mrs. Wm. B. Clegg as chairman and Mrs. Thomas Flanagan as sewing supervisor. This activity has long been an important part of the work of the Camp White auxiliary, and new workers will be welcomed there, also.
