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CONJUGAL COUSINS

Some readers will be astonished to learn that a health adviser to who knows how many people, may have his qualms and tribulations, for all his forbidding cynicism.

First there is the haunting dread of typographical error. Generally this is merely irritating.

Dr. Brady sometimes amusing, but occasionally it is horrible. I once took a chance and printed or rather released for printing instructions for home treatment of tapeworm infestation. On the other hand, there is the hard decision one must make almost every day whether to try to offer an opinion, information, instruction or advice in a given case or whether to let it go as a matter outside of the province of a health column conductor. This is by no means easy to decide, in a good many instances. It might be easier if one were always strictly impersonal, but after all, we are only human, the reader and I, and I have a wretched habit of putting myself in the reader's place.

An ever-recurring query which I begin to think will always remain a problem is, as sub-

mitted by a young soldier: I am in love with a girl whose grandfather is my mother's uncle. Would it be a safe or wise marriage, in regard to having normal children?

Right away, of course, one's alleged mind becomes clouded in a baffling pursuit of the question of the degree of relationship between uncle's girl and the grandfather's mother, or whatever it may be. But presently I come to and say "Well, it is safe to assume there is a distant cousinship between the soldier and his girl. If we take it from there, it becomes a comparatively simple question, namely, should cousins marry?"

If there is no heritable taint or defect in the family, sure. If there is anything heritable, children of such union are more likely to inherit it than would be children of the union of only one member of the family with an outsider without heritable defect. If the church bans the marriage of first cousins there may be some good reason for it. But beyond that—well, somewhere beyond that we're all more or less inter-related by blood.

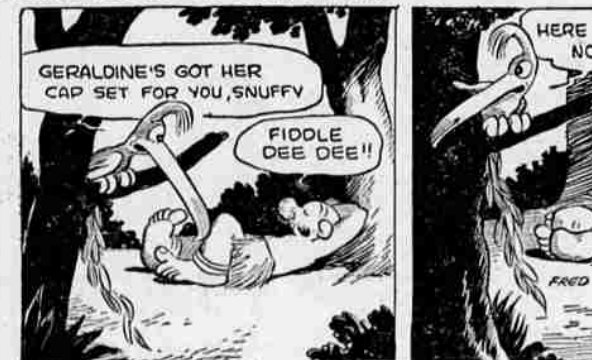
