

## TWO LOCAL MEN IN WINTER PEAR CONTROL GROUP

Portland, Ore., June 27—(U.P.) The War Food Administration today announced appointment of a 1944-45 control committee to administer the federal marketing agreement regulating the handling of six varieties of winter pears grown in Oregon, Washington and California.

The control committee, comprised of 12 members, six representing growers and six representing handlers, will serve during a term ending June 30, 1945.

Grower members include: Chester Fitch, Medford; R. S. Hazeltine, Hood River, Ore.; Henry M. Smith, Dryden, Wash.; Edward A. Bannister, Yakima, Wash.; L. W. Beerkamp, Placerville, Calif.; and H. S. Anderson, San Juan Bautista, Calif.

Handler members are: S. M. Tuttle, Medford; John C. Duckwall, Hood River; Paul W. Seeley, Wenatchee, Wash.; B. A. Perham, Yakima; Calvin R. Scott, Placerville; and W. C. Day, Santa Clara, Calif.

Varieties of winter pears affected are Beurre D'Anjou, Beurre Bosc, Winter Nelis, Doyenne Du Comice, Beurre Eastern and Beurre Clairgeau.

Mr. Fitch, who resides on Route 1, is one of the valley's leading orchardists and Mr. Tuttle is general manager of the Southern Oregon Sales company, one of the district's largest fruit handling firms.

## ALLIED BOMBERS IN MAJOR RAIDS

London, June 27—(U.P.)—Anglo-American bombing fleets from Britain and the Mediterranean smashed at Nazi targets in France, Hungary and Yugoslavia today and a burst of frantic enemy radio alarms indicated that the two-way bombardment was continuing early this evening with a new American raid on southwestern Germany.

Mediterranean-based American Flying Fortresses, Liberators and Fighters opened the daylight bombardment this morning with a powerful blow at military targets around the Hungarian capital of Budapest and the Brod railway yards in northern Yugoslavia.

RAF heavies followed up with a lightning raid across the channel on an unidentified target along the northern coast of France.

Hours later, a mighty armada of heavy bombers thundered out over the southern coast of England in an hours-long procession in a southerly direction.

## RIBBENTROP GIVES FINNS AID PLEDGE

London, June 27—(U.P.)—Nazi Foreign Minister Joachim von Ribbentrop, at a council of war with Finnish government leaders in Helsinki, pledged German military aid to help stave off the new Russian offensive and keep Finland in the war, a German DNB news agency broadcast revealed today.

DNB said Ribbentrop paid a flying visit to the Finnish capital in response to an urgent appeal for military assistance.

"The German government has declared itself prepared to fulfill this wish to the Finnish government," the broadcast said.

Stockholm press dispatches said Ribbentrop and other high-ranking Nazis spent two days in Helsinki and succeeded in persuading Premier Edwin J. Linkomies' government to maintain its "solidarity" with Germany and continue the war.

## PIGEON "DODGER"

## Guadalcanal Marines Give Purse To Rebuild Missions

Guadalcanal—(U.P.)—Catholic Marines stationed on this island have established a fund to aid in the restoration of missions destroyed in the Solomon Islands campaign. With allotments for families and war bonds deducted, most leathernecks don't have any great sum of money on payday, but they are contributing generously.

The fund, which is being gathered unofficially, was the idea of several Marines who learned that plans to rebuild churches, schools, hospitals, and mission buildings were being made. Other Catholic leathernecks gladly volunteered their support, and the total of contributions has already reached a substantial figure.

The money will be turned over to the two bishops of the Solomons, Most Reverend William Bishop, of the Marist Fathers, bishop of the Southern Solomons, and Most Reverend

Thomas Wade, bishop of the Northern Solomons. Bishop Aubin's diocese takes in Guadalcanal, Tulagi, the Floridas, and adjacent islands. That of Bishop Wade includes Bougainville, Choiseul, the Shortlands, and the Treasuries.

Ending of the Solomons campaign with the capture of Green island and the consequent bottling-up of the Japanese forces to the south, makes possible the start of restoration. There still are thousands of Japanese on

Bougainville, but their escape is cut off.

Destruction of the Catholic missions on Guadalcanal was a heart-breaking blow to Bishop Aubin, for in a few months the Japanese ground to rubble his work of 36 years. But, confidently, he is beginning his work anew.

Every Catholic building on Guadalcanal was demolished. Schools, churches and dispensaries were looted. On Bougainville, Bishop Wade, a native of Providence, R. I., was in hiding in the jungle for three months until he effected an escape.

As American forces move across the Pacific, Bishop Aubin and Bishop Wade are preparing for the day when military control is relinquished and the Solomons—British-mandated possessions—are again administered by civilians.
