State Department Helping Fascists Says Salvadorean

Miami, Fla., June 27.—(U.P.)—Raul Gamero, El Salvador delegate to the international monetary conference at Bretton Woods, N. H., charged today that the United States department of state is not fully informed of existing Latin American conditions and as a result has given lend-lease aid to fascist dictatorships. Gamero, who only recently was freed from prison after serving six months as a political prisoner, also charged that Nelson Rockefeller, coordinator of inter-American affairs, had promised El Salvadorian newspapermen that he would inform Secretary of State Cordell Hull

of El Salvadorian problems but that there had been no signs that Rockefeller ever delivered the message.

"We can not successfully fight fascist dictatorships if they continue to be supplied with United States lend-lease sums and munitions," he declared.
