

4 MEDFORD BOYS NOW ATTENDING NAVAL ACADEMY

With the appointment of Lt. Lewis Russell Ulrich, USNR, and Charles Braley to the United States Naval Academy at Annapolis, the number of Medford men at the institution is brought to four. Already studying there are Midshipman Ellis McCurley, who soon completes his first year of the full three-year academy course, and Morris Leonard, Jr., midshipman, assigned to Annapolis sev-

eral months ago. Lt. Ulrich, blimp pilot, stationed at Moffat Field, Calif., for the past year and a half with the navy's lighter than air division, leaves the coast July 7 for a year's study at Annapolis in aerological engineering. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Lewis Ulrich, 839 Minnesota avenue.

Young Braley passed his last academy entrance examination this week and soon begins the regular three-year course. He graduated from Medford high school last year and during the winter and spring has had naval training at the University of Colorado and at the Great Lakes Naval Training station. The midshipman is the son of Mrs. F. C. Preston, Jacksonville, and C. Reese Braley, Valley View Drive, Medford.

Midshipman Leonard, who has been at the University of Colorado and at Asbury Park, N. J., for training and study before his Annapolis appointment, completes his course at Annapolis in September and will be commissioned an ensign. His parents are Mr. and Mrs. Morris Leonard, Sr., Wellington Heights. Midshipman Ellis McCurley completed his first year of study at the academy recently and is now on a cruise, after which he will leave for a month's vacation with his parents here, Mr. and Mrs. Paul McCurley, Rt. 2.

Medford is represented at the United States Military Academy, West Point, by two young men, both of whom are now in the city on vacation. The Medford cadets are Dan Graham, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. P. Graham, 108 Cottage street, and James Hoey, son of Mr. and Mrs. James K. Hoey, 119 Lincoln street.
