Commenting on the case, Leonard Carpenter, volunteer chairman of the board, stated that in the past a very liberal attitude had been adopted towards workers in the Prospect area, largely lumbermen, but that with orders from district officials to scrutinize every application closely, more cases would be turned back for further investigation. He added that some logging firm employers had failed to cooperate in checking up on employees and that the board had many cases of persons continually changing jobs and applying for new rations on the basis of each job, some lasting but a short time.
