BUILDING SLUMPS SINCE LAST JUNE

Valuation of building permits issued at the city inspector's office in June totaled \$7750 as compared with the \$69,620 figure for the corresponding month last year, records showed Saturday.

There were 22 permits issued, 14 for residence remodeling costing \$2950, five for new private garages costing \$1100, one for a new \$3900 residence, one for a \$500 cottage and one for a \$200 shed.

First July permit was issued to H. W. Wilson of 519 Pennsylvania avenue, to remodel and repair his residence at a stated cost of 150.

PERMITS NEEDED TO BURN GRASS

Fire Chief Roy Elliott said Saturday that, effective immediately, persons in the city desiring to burn trash or grass must obtain a verbal permit by calling the fire station, telephone 3790, with information as to what is to be burned and its location.

Chief Elliott asked citizens to use extreme caution when burning trash or grass, now that the hot weather and dry season have arrived, and also asked that grass be cut away from proximity to all wooden structures.

DYNAMIC WORLD ECONOMY TO HELP ALL, PLEA OF F. R.

Bretton Woods, N. H., July 1.—(U.P.)—President Roosevelt today appealed for a dynamic and soundly expanding world economy to lift standards of all nations.

In a message of welcome to more than 700 delegates and their staffs of 44 nations assembled here for the United Nations monetary and financial conference, the president urged that artificial trade barriers be abolished to free world commerce and thus aid in bringing economic health to all nations.

His address was read to the delegates by the secretary general of the conference, Dr. Warren Kelchner, at the first plenary session of the gathering at which Henry Morgenthau, secretary of the treasury, was made presiding officer.

Secretary Morgenthau, in his address, warned that economic aggression can have no other offspring than war, and pleaded for international cooperation to solve world economic problems.

The president told the delegates that this conference should set the patterns for future "friendly consultations among nations in their common interest."

The program of the conference, Mr. Roosevelt said, "constitutes, of course, only one phase of the arrangements which must be made between nations to ensure an orderly, harmonious world."

"But it is a vital phase, affecting ordinary men and women everywhere. For it concerns the basis upon which they will be able to exchange with one another the national riches of the earth and the products of their own industry and ingenuity."

"Commerce is the lifeblood of a free society. We must see to it that the arteries which carry that blood stream are not clogged again, as they have been in the past, by artificial barriers created through senseless economic rivalries."

FORMER RESIDENT DIES IN ACTION

Pvt. William E. McCrory, 23-year-old paratrooper who formerly resided in Medford, has been reported killed in action on D-day, June 6, in France, according to a letter received here by Earl Sims from Pvt. McCrory's mother, Mrs. Susie Carroll Huitt, who now resides in San Jose, Cal.

Pvt. McCrory, who was employed by Sims at the Medford bowling alleys for four years prior to entering the army about two years ago, had been overseas for 18 months. His brother, Pvt. Clyde McCrory, also a paratrooper, was in the same company.

CANADIAN CREWS TO AID HARVEST

Washington, July 1.—(U.P.)—The agriculture department today announced plans whereby Canadian threshing outfits will help harvest the western great plains grain crops, while American machines and crews later will go to the prairie provinces to help reap Canadian grain.

Special arrangements, effective July 7, have been completed which temporarily suspend certain border crossing formalities.

SILVER STAR FOR GALLANTRY GIVEN LT. W. C. PURDIN

The Silver Star for gallantry in action and the Distinguished Flying Cross are medals to be awarded to First Lt. Worlow C. Purdin, 23, pilot of a B-24 Liberator bomber with the U. S. 15th Air Forces in Italy, he has written relatives in Medford.

Lt. Purdin, who already has the Air Medal with three Oak Leaf Clusters and the Purple Heart, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Purdin of 335 West Holly street. In his last letter he said that he had completed his 50 missions and thought he would be coming home on leave in the near future.

A Medford high graduate who also attended Southern Oregon College of Education and Composition, (Calif.) junior college prior to entering the service, Lt. Purdin was wounded while on his 47th mission, a flight over Austria on May 29. His letter indicated he had flown three more missions after recovering from his wounds.

BAD WEATHER ON NORMANDY FRONT SLOWS AIR DRIVE

Allied Supreme Headquarters, London, July 1.—(U.P.)—Bad weather curtailed allied air activity today after a night in which powerful forces of British bombers pulverized a concentration of German armor on the Normandy front, battered a synthetic oil plant in Germany and hammered a key Nazi rail junction supplying the French battle front.

It appeared likely that only limited patrols and armed reconnaissance by fighters would be possible in support of the Normandy battle, getting the July battle of the skies off to a slow start after a record-breaking month of June in which allied expeditionary air forces flew approximately 90,000 sorties.

The last full scale effort in support of allied troops was an attack Friday night by more than 250 Halifax and Lancaster bombers which dropped more than 1,000 tons of bombs on the Villers-Cocagne area where the Germans had concentrated large forces of tanks and men.

Mosquito bomber squadrons went out at night to heap many 4,000-pound bombs on a synthetic oil plant at Homberg on the Rhine and one particularly large explosion was observed. One bomber was lost. Mines were laid in enemy waters.

The 15th air force based in Italy sent up to 500 heavy bombers out in daylight Friday to attack targets in the Balkans, Hungary and Yugoslavia. The targets were military objectives in the Zagreb, Yugoslavia, and Budapest areas; Banja Luka airfield and split harbor in Yugoslavia; and Barc railbridge and Kaposvar railyards in Hungary.
