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CLEANLINESS COSTS TIME, MONEY AND EFFORT

More irony than humor in the porter's assurance that all the germs his whisk might dust off the doctor's clothes would never hurt anybody. Asepsis means literally absence of poisoning—the methods whereby a wound, region or surface is kept free from disease-producing germs.

Asepsis and the methods, habits, technique, rules necessary to prevent contamination or infection of wound, region or surface are difficult if not impossible to understand and practice unless you have some scientific knowledge of bacteriology and some professional training in the bacteriological laboratory or in the operating room or the delivery room.

The use of "antiseptics" or "germicides," particularly those "powerful" nostrums having color or odor calculated to impress a child or a wisecracking layman, has practically nothing to do with asepsis or aseptic treatment. On the contrary, the quick healer, the near-doctor, the nurse who plays to all and sundry who accept such "medical" care, the druggist who does not hesitate to give medical advice or service if the customer looks dumb enough, these individuals, armed with a dangerous little knowledge really believe that a liberal application of some "powerful" antiseptic or germicide is the best treatment in any emergency. They're childlike faith in that quaint theory, must be held responsible for a great deal of unnecessary suffering, illness and disaster from infection, blood-poisoning, septicemia, faulty healing, excessive scarring, functional impairment and crippling which asepsis would prevent.

Some of the fundamental principals of asepsis are hard for the novice to understand for the very reason that they are so simple. They are, first, soap and

water cleanliness, and second, don't touch.

Washing anything washable, from clothing, bandage, implement or instrument to hands or wounds, is at least as effective as the use of any known antiseptic or germ-killing chemical for providing or maintaining asepsis. As an antiseptic applicable to the skin or an open wound, soap and water is second only to certain agents which only a physician can employ with safety. As an agent for disinfecting or sterilizing dressing material, bandage, instrument or implement washing with soap and water is second to steam, boiling or equivalent heat.
