GREAT RALLY BY
MCSPADEN KNOTS
OPEN TOURNAMENT

Ties Ben Hogan With Five-Under-Par Card On Last Nine; 18-Hole Playoff.

Chicago, July 3.—(U.P.)—One of the greatest stretch kicks in golfing history, or in the vast backlog of sporting records, sent the victory national open tournament into extra innings today.

After knotting the 72-hole \$10,000 medal tourney in a photo-finish yesterday, Harold (Jug) McSpaden, Philadelphia pro and the nation's top 1944 war bond winner with an intake of \$15,100 to his assets, tied off today against Lt. Ben Hogan, army air forces, in a battle to determine who would sweep the \$3,000 first prize and who would be left with the \$1,750 "pickings" for runner-up spot.

In a dramatic climax to the victory's regulation 72 holes, McSpaden showed that, like the New York Yankees and Notre Dame, it isn't smart to bet against him, when he clipped five strokes off par during his last nine holes and sank a 40-foot putt on the 18th green to deadlock his score with Hogan's, a 273 strokes, 11 under par.

The thrilling and decisive putt shaped up like this:

Hogan, leader during most of the tourney, slacked his fast pace on the final 18 holes to come home in an even-par 71.

On the 18th green, he faced a 40-foot putt, but "babied" up to the hole to two-putt, thereby losing a possible birdie-3.

A few minutes later McSpaden, who had chopped strokes off par on the 10th, 14th, 15th and 17th, approached the 18th and his ball landed in almost the exact position that Hogan's ball had been—40 feet away.

There wasn't any doubt in McSpaden's mind as he set to work. He moved swiftly and with confidence. He eyed the putt, told the caddy to hold the pin loosely in the cup, then rapped the ball before the gallery of 1,200 was aware of any action.

The ball sped to the cup as if it were radio-controlled by Jug's putter. That was all. It took a second or two for the gallery to realize the impact of that putt. When it did, the ovation grew to a din.

BOSTON NARROWS
BROWNIE LEAD TO
GAME AND A HALF

New York, July 3.—(U.P.)—The Boston Red Sox, rated only the barest chance for a first division berth in pre-season reckoning, today must be figured as a definite threat in the tight American league pennant race.

The draft riddled Beantowners, a dime store ball club compared to the "Gold Sox" clubs that millionaire owner Tom Yawkey placed on the field in peace time, have pulled themselves up by their own bootstraps into a contending position.

Under the reins of Player-Manager Joe Cronin, Boston has been in every position except first already this year and yesterday licked the league leading St. Louis Browns twice to draw within a game and a half of the spot that has eluded them.

Cecil (Tex) Hughson, one of the big reasons for the Sox success, achieved his 12th victory in the first game with a six-hit, 1-0 shutout. The nightcap went 11 innings before the Sox gained a 4-3 edge.

The Cleveland Indians swept a doubleheader from the Washington Senators, 4-3, in the 10th inning opener and 6-3 in the afterpiece.

Chicago and New York split, the White Sox winning the first, 7-3 in 10 innings. Catcher Vince Castino's wild throw in the last inning of the nightcap, gave the Yanks a 7-6 edge.

Detroit and Philadelphia swapped shutouts, Dizzy Trout whipping the Tigers to an 8-0 victory in the opener and Jess Flores hurling the A's to a 2-0 victory in the second.

The National league leading St. Louis Cardinals handed the Brooklyn Dodgers their fifth and sixth consecutive losses by winning a pair of close ones, 2-1 and 4-2.

Cincinnati and New York split. Rookie Jim Konstanty, who joined the Reds less than two weeks ago, pitched his third successive victory in the opener with a seven-hitter that netted a 4-1 win. Pitching honors of the day, however, went to 39-year-old veteran Johnny Allen, who allowed only three hits in winning the second game for New York, 7-0.

Chicago divided with Philadelphia. Rookie Bob Christman sent the Quakers down with five hits in winning the opener for Chicago, 8-1. The Phillies' prize rookie, Lefty Ken Raffensberger, came through with some nice clutch pitching in the second game to give Philadelphia a 4-2 edge.

With Nate Andrews scattering six hits, the Boston Braves defeated the Pittsburgh Pirates, 4-1 in the first of two scheduled games. The second game was called at the eighth because of Pennsylvania's Sunday law with the count knotted at 5-5.

DOODLE BOMBED
ON BUS JOURNEY

Flying Robot Hits Near Convoyance in Street; Chunks of Debris Enter Windows.

Somewhere in Southern England, July 3.—(U.P.)—I was "doodle bombed" today and it's no fun.

I was riding down a street on the top of a double-deck bus when a 2,000-pound flying bomb roared into sight, headed straight down the street toward us.

Fifty seconds later I was picking myself up off the floor of the bus, shaking glass splinters out of my hair and clothes and gradually discovering that Adolf Hitler's secret weapon—or "doodle bombs" as the British have named them—hadn't killed me.

What Happened

This is the story of what happened during that 50 seconds. I had boarded the bus to go to work and was reading the morning paper when I heard the roar of the robot plane's motor. I looked out of the window and saw the nose of the robot with death written all over it dip into a slanting dive straight for our bus.

The woman sitting in front of me screamed. A man shouted, "Geez, it's going to hit us."

I looked for one more instant and then sprawled on the floor under the seat. From somewhere in the bus came a voice: "Get on the floor—get on the floor!"

The bus stopped and then began to shudder. An RAF flight lieutenant under the same seat with me raised his face from the floor, with his hands cupped to his ears and said: "We've had it, chum."

The gears screamed and the bus lurched forward at a sharp angle. In the same moment the bomb hit with a thunderous crash followed by a landslide of brick and mortar.

My first sensation was of the bus rising up and hitting me a haymaker on the chest. Then my lips sputtered as the vacuum created by the explosion drew air out of my lungs.

Chunks of debris crashed through the bus windows. The tinkle of splintered glass resounded up and down the street for what seemed like minutes after the explosion.

We picked ourselves up off the floor of the bus and looked out at the dust and remains of a building which the bomb had dumped into the street where the bus had been only a few seconds previously.

A British sailor broke the silence: "We're lucky to be alive, mate."

Nobody on top of the bus appeared seriously injured, although several showed flecks of blood where glass splinters had cut. Some of the passengers began to cry. One woman repeated hysterically:

"I saw it coming."

I just sat there thinking how close I had been to death. I felt a curious lightness and was breathing lightly.

The girl bus conductor yelled up the stairs: "Anybody hurt?"

A man in a bowler hat nearest the stair replied: "No, nothing much."

Dallas, Texas, July 3.—(U.P.)—Anti-New Deal southern delegates to the Democratic national convention opening July 19 today planned to carry their fight against the renomination of President Roosevelt to the convention floor and scheduled meetings at Chicago for July 17 and 18.

E. B. Germany, Dallas, a leader in the Texas revolt against Mr. Roosevelt's renomination, called a caucus of anti-New Deal southern delegates for July 17 and invited all southern Democratic delegates who favor the program of anti-Roosevelt Texas Democrats to attend.

Germany said the group would attempt to formulate a platform in accord with the program adopted earlier by Democrats of Texas and Mississippi.

CONFEREES TOLD
MUST NOT FAIL
IN PEACE PLAN

Sen. Tobey of U.S. Delegation Addresses Monetary, Financial Group Session.

Bretton Woods, N. H., July 3.—(U.P.)—Sen. Charles W. Tobey, R., N. H., a member of the United States delegation, told the United Nations monetary and financial conference today that it was preparing the way for "a permanent world peace" and "we do not—we cannot fail."

Tobey addressed the second plenary session which was discussing the establishment of two world-wide financial organizations involving a capitalization of \$20,000,000,000.

Always Saboteurs
"Every great effort in human history has had its saboteurs—men who after critic peep and cynic bark," he said, "there are some of these around the perimeter of this conference. But . . .

a not—we c of fail in the high purpose which brought us together for today . . . are dyl . . . and homes are saddened for the cause of world freedom."

Tobey was acknowledging the compliment paid the United States by the Peruvian delegation in introducing a resolution . . .

marking tomorrow's anniversary of the Declaration of Independence. Passed unanimously, the resolution called upon the conference to send "greetings to the American nation in the person of its illustrious president, Mr. Franklin D. Roosevelt."

Tobey expressed "admiration of the heroic efforts which their fighting services, together with those of the other allies, are making to achieve a quick victory which will make possible a new era of world cooperation for the good of all peoples."

U. S. Share Large
Of the \$20,000,000,000, the total, the United States, under tentative plans now before the conference for approval and readjustment, would contribute \$6,250,000,000, more than 31 per cent.

The two financial organizations proposed as a part of the international effort to smooth out world trade problems and in reconstruction are:

1. An international monetary fund to stabilize world currencies in international trade. The capital of this fund now set at \$8,000,000,000 (b), but if it becomes world-wide after the war, the total may be carried up to \$10,000,000,000 (b). The United States share tentatively is set at \$2,750,000,000.

2. A bank for reconstruction and development with a capital of \$10,000,000,000 to aid devastated nations in reconverting to peace time operations. The capital of the bank tentatively is set at \$10,000,000,000 (b) of which the United States' share is \$3,500,000,000.

Delegates representing 44 nations will take up the monetary and financial bank in that order during the coming sessions, part of which will be open sessions the press admitted.
