ARCHIE F. FANGER KILLED IN ACTION IN ANZIO SECTION

The adjutant general has advised the parents of Archie F. Fanger, Jr., of Jacksonville Star Route, Box 57, that their son was killed in action on Anzio beachhead May 27. Further details are not yet known.

On entering the army last August, Fanger was sent to Ft. Riley, Kas., for basic training, then to Ft. Meade, Md., in January of this year. From there he went overseas, arriving in Africa in March. Fanger was on the Anzio beachhead about March 17, and was in the offensive in Italy prior to the fall of Rome.

The young man was wounded slightly April 21 and received the Purple Heart Medal at that time.

Born near Wolsey, S. D., on August 25, 1919, Fanger attended school there, graduating from high school at Huron, S. D., with the class of '39. The family moved to Medford that year, where the boy worked two years before entering Oregon State

college in 1939. He received his bachelor of science degree in mechanical engineering in 1943. Elected associate member of Sigma Xi in his senior year, Fanger also received two awards for one of his technical papers, one a war bond given by the Society of Automotive Engineers and the other a cash prize from the Society of Mechanical Engineers.

A member of the Methodist church, Fanger took an active part in the young peoples' organization in Medford and Corvallis.

Besides his parents, the soldier is survived by four brothers. Staff Sgt. Franklin, a radio operator in a B-24 bomber, has participated in 26 missions from his airbase in Italy, and Carleton is now at Great Lakes Naval Training Station in Illinois. The third brother, Clifford, is attending University of Oregon medical school at Portland, and Richard is at home with his parents.

NEW HOSPITALS ARE ADVOCATED UNDER G. I. BILL

Washington, July 5—(U.P.)—Brig. Gen. Frank T. Hines, veterans administrator, announced today that he had recommended \$70,000,000 in new hospital projects in 20 states to provide 16,000 more beds for veterans under the newly-enacted "G. I. bill of rights."

Hines said the program calls for three types of fireproof hospitals and would make available a total of 121,000 beds of all types.

These would include 5,000 additional beds for neuropsychiatric patients, 3,000 for tuberculosis patients and 8,000 for general medical and surgical patients.

The program has been submitted to the federal board of hospitalization, which passes on the hospitals and selects the sites, Hines said. Final approval of the sites rests with the president.

The veterans administration included hospital recommendations in eastern Montana or western North Dakota, Colorado and California.

OFFICER'S WIFE POISONS CHILDREN

Armonk, N. Y., July 5—(U.P.)—Police reported today that the pretty wife of a navy lieutenant, in service overseas, killed her two small children last night by feeding them nitric acid and then attempted to commit suicide.

Mrs. Renee Gui Hatch, 31, blonde wife of Lt. Aldis Hatch, U. S. N., was reported in serious condition in Northern Westchester hospital, Mt. Kisco.

Police said she fed acid to George, 3, and Aldis, 16 months, then took some of the poison herself. When the poison failed to react on her immediately she jumped 15 feet to the ground from an upper porch of her home.

The children were found dead in their cribs on the second floor of the large colonial house in which Mrs. Hatch and another navy wife and their children lived. Neighbors said Lt. Hatch was stationed in London.

BING CHERRY HARVEST UNDER WAY IN VALLEY

Harvesting of the Bing cherry crop of the valley is now under way. The crop is light, according to Assistant County Agent C. B. Cordy. Royal Ann cherries have started to ripen and while larger than the Bing crop, the total will also be light. Black Republicans are also on the market.

They are a small and non-commercial crop. Raspberries are appearing in local stores. The strawberry crop has passed its peak.

COTTON GOODS HELD UP

Washington, July 5—(U.P.)—Maj. Gen. C. L. Corbin, acting army quartermaster general, has expressed concern because cotton textile manufacturers, in anticipation of higher prices, appear to be withholding from sale cotton goods needed by the army.

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SIX CLEAR DAYS ON JUNE RECORD

But six days in the June just past were recorded as "clear" by the weather bureau, according to the monthly summary, while seven were recorded as partly cloudy and 17 as completely cloudy. Of the latter, eight were consecutive, from the 14 to the 21, and during that time nearly an inch of rain fell. During the month 1.51 inches of rain fell, while normal for the month is .73 inch.

Mean temperature for the month, 62.8, is among the lowest ever recorded for June, according to the weather bureau summary. An identical mean was recorded for 1941 and a mean of 62 for 1943. However, a survey of the charts since the records were started in 1911 shows that the mean temperature for June often is in the high sixties and a few times was more than 70 degrees.

High temperature for the month just past was 94 degrees on June 28.

ORDER PICK UP OF TWO IN CONTEMPT

Warrants charging Allen H. King, 23, Ashland, and Jack H. Jones, 16, Eagle Point, with contempt of court, were issued today by Justice of the Peace W. P. Tucker, following their failure to pay \$10 fines and costs imposed for reckless driving last week. Both were released to procure money for payments and failed to keep the promises.

King was arrested in this city last week by Deputy Sheriff William Grenbemer following an extended chase in which King ignored stop signs and red lights, and drove recklessly.

Jones was arrested on the Crater Lake highway by state police after he had ignored a dozen siren warnings to pull to the side of the road and had attained a speed of 75 miles per hour between the Antelope bridge and Camp White, in the face of heavy traffic. The arresting officer in his report states Jones was trying to outrun the state police car.
